15	On the motion you just passed,
16	the new one received for
17	graduation?
18	MS. DAFNY IRIZARRY: Yes.
19	WALTER C. HAZLITT:
20	Alright. The cost is \$14,000
21	\$12,000. What would be the
22	cost if the college looked
23	into, in the future; okay,
24	purchasing of this equipment
25	that we have to rent because if

2	we're going to have to rent
3	this equipment ever year, it's
4	going to cost us a small
5	fortune.
6	SHAUN L. McKAY, ED. D:
7	This summer we looked into
8	exactly that. Everything we
9	have in the field house we do
10	an analysis, and we did a
11	survey that is conducted either
12	by the vendor or in-house
13	personnel.
14	One of the most frequently
15	reported items is the sound
16	system.
17	This summer I'm pleased to
18	report that we contracted with
19	a firm that's in state
20	contract, and we have thus then
21	since then corrected that
22	problem. That's one of the
23	items that we would no longer
24	need to lease or rent from
25	outside firms.

2	There is a contract that is
3	in place for certain services
4	in that building whether it be
5	electric, pipe and drape and
6	other items like that. Those
7	items are things that are on
8	current contract with that
9	location, so yes, we have
10	minimized some of the costs in
11	that area, but there will be
12	some costs to us to procure
13	that equipment.
14	For the sound system, we
15	have since got that fixed. We
16	should have that fully in place
17	in about a weak. They were
18	testing it yesterday, and I
19	from what I've heard in one of
20	the reports, it went very well.
21	In B105, that's electric
22	hall in that building, we've
23	had defective equipment in that
24	building as well. We also had
25	that fixed this summer. That's

2	one of the locations on this
3	campus that is heavily utilized
4	by in-house activity and
5	external activity as well.
6	So, we've moved in that
7	direction, and certainly the
8	items that we'll still contract
9	out for is your pipe and
LO	drapes, and certainly your
11	power supplies and items such
12	as that, but otherwise, we've
13	taken care of that.

25	MR. MARVIN BRIGHT: Good

3	the college association
4	financial report and the last
5	four I will give you, at this
6	board meeting the college year
7	report and after I will give
8	you a brief inform that I will
9	give you an introduction of the
10	FY11/ 12 budget which was
11	approved by the board back in
12	July.
13	If I can direct your
14	attention to column three. On
15	three, you will actually see
16	the year-to-date actual
17	revenue.
18	Looking at the campus at
19	the Emery Campus, the Eastern
20	Campus, and the Grand Campus
21	our auxiliary programs, the
22	Kids College, the Kids Campus
23	at the Ammerman, the Eastern
24	Cafe the Baker's Workshop.
25	If I can also direct your

2	attention to column five.
3	Collum five is the actual
4	expenditures which were
5	actually spent.
6	Then I would direct your
7	attention to collum seven.
8	As you can see indicated,
9	the transcripts have been made.
10	None of the accounts are
11	actually in the red.
12	The only account that
13	actually came in red, which
14	board chairperson indicated,
15	was the graduation, and the
16	board just approved to move
17	monies out of the fund voucher
18	graduation to cover the
19	\$12,000.
20	Any questions on that?
21	(No questions posed.)
22	MR. MARVIN BRIGHT: This
23	side is the actual budget for
24	'11/ '12.
25	I direct your attention to

2	column one is the actual the
3	fiscal year 2011, 2012 which
4	actual budget carried down to
5	the last row, is the actual
6	fall and spring budget fees for
7	'11/'12.
8	Column three is what has
9	been projected for each campus
10	association budget.
11	Column four are the actual
12	fees to date that have been
13	collected.
14	Column five will give you
15	the variance of those fees
16	collected based on what was
17	projected.
18	I would like to note that
19	when you see the spring 2012
20	projected the fees that will be
21	collected, please note that, of
22	course, we're not in the spring
23	enrollment at this point in
24	time, and those numbers could
25	fluctuate somewhat, but we do

2	actually put in a contingency
3	just in case we have a short
4	increase for the spring
5	semester.
6	Are there any questions?
7	MR. ERNESTO MATTACE, JR.:
8	When was this reported
9	completed because we only got
10	it last minute?
11	Because it says the 31st of
12	August.
13	When was the report
14	completed?
15	MR. MARVIN BRIGHT:
16	Yesterday, but we can get it
17	done earlier.
18	MS. DAFNY IRIZARRY: We
19	usually get it the day of the
20	meeting. This was a first in
21	providing this, and it's very
22	much appreciated.
23	MR. SHAUN L. McKAY, Ed.D.:
24	If I can speak to that point.
25	This is a report that is

2	done verbally at every board
3	meeting, and I felt it was
4	important for us that we have
5	both verbal presentation and a
6	visual presentation to the
7	board, and as of yesterday, my
8	cabinet met and we reviewed
9	this document, and we felt that
10	it was important to have that
11	sent out to go along with the
12	verbal presentation, so at
13	least both will work in your
14	analysis and your review of the
15	presentation budget.
16	Certainly this will require
17	a lot of organization between
18	multiple paths at the campus to
19	get all of this information
20	together.
21	We were still analyzing the
22	current enrollment for the fall
23	semester because then you have
24	evenings, weekends that are
25	still coming in that are part

2	of this analysis, as well as
3	regards to fees.
4	So as of yesterday, we
5	worked with our enrolment
6	management folks, our finance
7	folks, as well and Dr. Bright's
8	office to pull this together.
9	If we are able to get that
10	to you sooner, we will
11	certainly do that, but I think
12	that this was the best
13	opportunity we had to present
14	this.
15	MS. DAFNY IRIZARRY: We
16	appreciate the effort.
17	MR. ERNESTO MATTACE, JR.:
18	If you completed the report
19	last night, I thank you, and
20	for getting it to us before the
21	weekend.
22	I'm curious on how it
23	worked out, thank you.
24	MR. SHAUN L. McKAY, Ed.D.:
25	Sure. Thank you.

7	procedure based on the bylaws,
8	and I just wanted to make the
9	board aware of the fact. When
10	you when you came out of the
11	meeting, did the motion occur
12	immediately? Because it looks
13	like it started it went
14	next.
15	It doesn't show anything in
16	between.
17	MS. DAFNY J. IRIAZRRY: You
18	mean like a motion to go back
19	to the meeting?
20	MR. ERNESTO MATTACE, JR.:
21	No.
22	The motion to go back to
23	the meeting was made by a
24	trustee, okay, but a motion was
25	made by Trustee Fenchel to

3	the amendment.
4	My question is it was
5	the first thing that was done
6	right after the session
7	based on the bylaws, and bylaws
8	are bylaws.
9	That's all I'm saying.
10	MS. DAFNY IRIZARRY: Where
11	do I find that in our bylaws?
12	MR. ERNESTO MATTACE, JR.:
13	Right here (indicating).
14	It shows that on Page 8, we
15	have a right to do this, but we
16	have to wait a half-an-hour
17	after it's presented, and I
18	just don't want to see any
19	problems down the road occur.
20	MS. DAFNY J. IRIAZRRY:
21	Thank you for bringing it our
22	attention.
23	MR. ERNESTO MATTACE, JR.:
24	Okay. Your welcome.

3	James Amoroso to the present
4	the College financial reports.
5	MR. JAMES AMOROSO: Good
6	morning.
7	ALL PRESENT: Good morning.
8	MR. JAMES AMOROSO: We're
9	in the process of closing out
10	fiscal year '10/'11, as you
11	know, and we're in preaudit
12	phase, but we are presently
13	projecting that we have at
14	least \$300,000 to the good this
15	year.
16	We eliminated 1.7 million
17	dollars deficit, as you know.
18	This fiscal year 2011/'12,
19	we are in the present role-out,
20	and as we reported previously,
21	the facts from Chief Council
22	Rizzo, we had the printout of
23	the 2% verses the 0% enrolment,
24	and until the final census
25	we're going to be able to

2	identify efficiencies
3	throughout the college to
4	mitigate that problem.
5	We're presently projecting
6	2.8 million dollars in deficit,
7	but as I said, we're going to
8	mitigate that with the
9	efficiencies.
10	Any questions on that?
11	(No questions posed.)
12	Just to let you know also,
13	that I just got an e-mail this
14	morning that even though our
15	enrollment is flat, some of the
16	other community colleges are
17	reporting much bigger deficits.
18	In fact, Monroe is 8.7 percent.
19	This is a preliminary
20	survey by the CCDOA.
21	I don't think Nassau has
22	even been included yet, but the
23	averages of all the community
24	colleges is 1.3 right now.
25	MS. DAFNY J. IRIZARRY: Are

2	you aware of how all of the
3	colleges are mitigating this?
4	MR. JAMES AMOROSO: Well,
5	right now they are all doing
6	the same thing as we are.
7	They're going to defer
8	purchases it looks like, for
9	the most part, across the
10	board.
11	They're also worried about
12	that 2 percent cap on the real
13	estate taxes, and so right now
14	everybody is scrambling to
15	figure out how they're going to
16	do it.
17	Any questions?
18	MR. SHAUN L. McKAY, Ed.D.:
19	At this point in time, we are
20	analyzing where we are, like
21	you just mentioned.
22	You have the
23	evening/weekends. There are
24	some census items that we have
25	to do. The enrolment report

2	that we sent to SUNY is done by
3	census. We have specific dates
4	on that.
5	I have Jim Lagonegro who is
6	with us here.
7	Jim, do you mind standing?
8	Jim could explain to us how
9	the census works and at what
10	point in time we send this
11	forward to SUNY, and certainly
12	we do have numbers that
13	contribute to the final census
14	which comes from the academic
15	labs, some from our ESL
16	enrollment, and other areas.
17	Jim, do you mind sharing a
18	little bit about that in the
19	census report that we sent to
20	SUNY.
21	MR. JAMES LAGONEGRO: SUNY
22	requires us to report twice a
23	semester, November 1st, and the
24	closeout of the semester.
25	November 1st is what they

2	use to calculate their basic
3	numbers which they distribute
4	throughout the system of the
5	state.
6	We do get credit for FTs
7	for the entire semester, so our
8	learning centers and noncredit
9	FTs come in at the end of the
10	semester, so really, we know
11	our FT cap when the semester
12	closes.
13	MR. SHAUN L. McKAY, Ed.D.:
14	On top of that, we do have, for
15	example, a police academy. We
16	do have all high school
17	programs.
18	The Excelsior Program and
19	the Early-College program,
20	those numbers have not been
21	tabulated as yet into the
22	enrolment FT numbers that we
23	have, so there is a potential
24	for a slight uptake when those
25	two activities occur, as well

2	as the census numbers, as well.
3	MR. JAMES LAGONEGRO: And
4	we calculated that every .05
5	percent change in enrolment
6	amounts to about half-million
7	dollars in revenue change, so
8	either way if we go up a half a
9	cent, we would have 2.8 would
10	be reduced to about a
11	half-million dollars, and if it
12	goes the other way
13	MS. DAFNY J. IRIAZRRY: We
14	also won't be able to do the
15	role calling.
16	How was the outcome of that
17	input?
18	MR. SHAUN L. McKAY, Ed.D.:
19	Oh, yes. That's right.
20	Dr. Bright, do you want to
21	speak about the efforts we
22	we did several initiatives.
23	One which we looked at,
24	students that had an
25	outstanding balance at the

2	college.
3	There was a policy in place
4	where students that owed \$50, I
5	believe was the number, would
6	be flagged for not registering
7	or getting services at the
8	college; transcripts and
9	everything else.
10	When we looked at some of
11	those students, most did not
12	graduate, but they need to come
13	back; however, they couldn't
14	register online as well.
15	That's one category.
16	We checked, and that was
17	about a total of 600 student.
18	We did contact them, we sent
19	e-mails, we sent phone calls,
20	we sent written documentation
21	to them indicating that it's
22	not to late to register, you
23	can come on in, we can help you
24	financially, we can help you
25	register.

2	We did have students who
3	were cancelled for non-payment.
4	Those who at least had a full
5	schedule, they made financial
6	arrangements, and didn't
7	satisfy the outstanding debt.
8	That number was around
9	2,300 to 2,500 students college
10	wide.
11	We also communicated with
12	those students by those same
13	mediums as well.
14	What I can't say right now
15	is how many of those students
16	from all of the activity that
17	we were involved with, actually
18	re-reregistered.
19	Now, I do know there was a
20	survey done, and at least 60
21	percent of those students that
22	took a full schedule, got
23	cancelled, do not return.
2 4	Forty percent do, and that was
25	a report that we looked at by

2	the IE office.
3	We are constantly analyzing
4	this. We have to do a survey
5	to find out exactly why they
6	don't return. It could been
7	economic factors, financial
8	factors, or otherwise.
9	Across the state, we are
10	hearing that now with the
11	insurance situation now where
12	students can stay on their
13	parents' insurance until
14	they're 26, could be a factor.
15	We are seeing more
16	part-time students enroll now
17	across the college than
18	full-time students. Continuing
19	students are down. They are
20	transferring, or they're
21	stopping out because we have
22	stop-out students as well.
23	Right now for part-time, I
24	believe, Jim, I believe we're
25	doing between 3 and 4 percent

2	part-time student enrollment.
3	MR. JAMES AMOROSO:
4	Increase; yes.
5	Mr. SHAUN L. McKAY ED. D:
6	Increase, over last year.
7	So it's turning the other
8	way, and we're not the only
9	ones doing that.
10	The form I sent around a
11	few minutes ago, show what's
12	happening across the state.
13	At the SUNY Board of
14	Trustees meeting this weekend,
15	a report we provided as to
16	what's happening across the
17	state and how they're going to
18	mitigate these factors.
19	MR. PAUL V. PONTIER: Just
20	a quick question, and I should
21	know it but I don't.
22	The part-time course for
23	credit is first for full-time
24	course for credit.
25	Is it advanced well,

2	first of all, what are the
3	different courses?
4	If you were taking 12
5	credits taking 11 credits,
6	so you're a part-time student?
7	MR. SHAUN L. McKAY, ED. D.:
8	Right.
9	MR. PAUL V. PONTIER: I'm
10	just kind of wondering whether
11	who is that, or whose income
12	you could boost to part-time.
13	MR. SHAUN L. McKAY, ED. D:
14	We looked into that last year.
15	The question was: If
16	students take 11 credits verses
17	12, or 12 verses 21?
18	Students can take from 12
19	to 21 for the same full-time
20	course.
21	We checked with the senior
22	regulations, and we checked
23	with the SUNY Lead Office, and
24	we were told that in the regs
25	that if a student is taking 12

2	or 21, it's the same number.
3	If a student is taking 11,
4	it goes by per-credit hour.
5	So there's a difference
6	between a cost in that area as
7	well, and that also impacts the
8	student fees that are collected
9	by the association, part-time
10	as well.
11	MR. PAUL V. PONTIER: I'm
12	just kind of wondering whether
13	that per-credit course, if you
14	took and you raised the
15	per-credit cost the goal is
16	full-time students, I suspect.
17	MR SHAUN L. McKAY, ED. D.:
18	Right.
19	MR. PAUL V. PONTIER:
20	Whether if you made out a cost
21	for the part-time, 9 credit, 10
22	credit-student, to where the
23	more advanced becomes full-time
24	student, or we can create more
25	revenue off the part-time

2	students and, you know, I don't
3	know if philosophically that's
4	what we want to do, but it's
5	just an idea.
6	MR. MARVIN BRIGHT: I mean,
7	historically we calculate the
8	part-time it used to be 158
9	now 167 we're about 9 dollars
10	and it corresponds to the
11	increase in the full-time,
12	\$1,995 a semester, we changed
13	that process. I'm not sure if
14	that was SUNY regulated, or how
15	you do it, but I can check
16	that, but that's how we
17	historically do it.
18	We try to round it off to
19	match the full-time rate when
20	you multiply by 12.
21	MR. PAUL V. PONTIER:
22	Right. Well, I was kind of
23	wondering whether you want to
24	go a higher number or part-time
25	then you do on

2	MR. SHAUN L. McKAY, Ed.D.:
3	Well, again, the point is
4	raised, and you go back to the
5	discussion of the HEPI; Higher
6	Education Price Index. You go
7	back to the varying cost
8	factors.
9	If we are seeing less
10	students coming to us for
11	varying financial reasons, and
12	the part-timers are coming to
13	us, they're taking two and
14	three jobs.
15	There are other mitigating
16	factors that are happening with
17	those students in the
18	environment.
19	Now, if you go the other
20	way with charging more there,
21	the reverse can hold true; That
22	you'll see less students coming
23	to us on a part-time category.
24	We have to study that, and
25	at the same time tot. The SUNY

1	SCCC Board Meeting
2	Board of Trustees do have a
3	requirement that if we are
4	going to increase tuition and
5	fees by a certain percentage,
6	on the charter, even $1/3$, $1/3$,
7	1/3, you've got a full
8	opportunity situation with the
9	college.
10	Now the State is supposed
11	to pay 40 percent. Well,
12	they've exempted themselves
13	from the 40 percent, and that's
14	on the revenue side. They're
15	not meeting the 33 percent as
16	they should. They are around
17	26, 27 percent. Our students
18	are closer to 49 percent.
19	So if you look at raising
20	the tuition and fees, that
21	could tip the scale to going
22	above 50 percent, and SUNY did
23	say that also in the FOP, that
24	students should not go beyond a
25	certain number or percentage in

1	SCCC Board Meeting
2	regards to tuition and fees.
3	That's something we are
4	going to have to look at
5	certainly, and we will do our
6	best.
7	The high school enrollment
8	in regards to graduation for
9	the next two years, is trending
10	down at this point.
11	There will be some factors
12	we will have to look at, and in
13	the fall, this fall, we are
14	going to spend some time taking
15	a look at that on the
16	enrollment side in regards to
17	recruitment efforts, and also
18	on the retention and persistent
19	side because that also has to
20	be talked about, which is;
21	completion, graduation,
22	transfer, retention. Those are
23	the discussions we have to have
24	that are germane to the
25	activity of our students in the

1	SCCC Board Meeting
2	system.
3	So, one is on the revenue
4	side to sustain the operation.
5	Two is getting our students to
6	be successful coming through
7	the process.
8	We are looking at the whole
9	picture at this point in time.
10	Walter?
11	MR. WALTER C. HAZLITT:
12	Yes, one of the questions that
13	Trustee Fenchel brought up
14	during the month was the
15	remedial activity that we're
16	facing, and it seems to be
17	exacerbating and getting bigger
18	and bigger and problematic all
19	the time.
20	MR. SHAUN L. McKAY, Ed.D.:
21	I'll ask for two statements on
22	that.
23	Could Jim and Marlene step
24	forward on that?
25	Jim Lagonegro forwarded a

2	report to all of the trustees,
3	and I'll ask him to speak on
4	that and make a preliminary
5	analysis on the report.
6	It showed exactly what the
7	number of legal students were
8	at the college, how they were
9	persisting. It also show the
10	tuition and fees that were
11	collected for those students,
12	and it talks about at the end
13	of the day, that revenue that
14	comes in from that.
15	We also have a report that
16	talks about the students and
17	how they persist if they take
18	one remedial course, two,
19	three, four, or five. We do
20	have that report as well.
21	I'll have Jim speak first
22	about the enrollment, the
23	revenue side of the equation,
24	and also in Title III, we have
25	Dr. Marlene DuBois, who is with

2	us, that will talk about the
3	foundation courses, D, W, F's
4	and I's, that were in the
5	Title III Grant that we are now
6	looking at.
7	They've done a lot of work
8	with Title III in that area.
9	Jim, would you mind taking
10	us through the report that was
11	distributed, and then we will
12	do Dr. DuBois on Title III.
13	MR. JAMES LAGONEGRO: As
14	you can see in the report,
15	there is a chart on the first
16	page that details ten years
17	worth of remedial student
18	enrollment.
19	There is little outline.
20	For the most part it's
21	trending upward.
22	The completion rates,
23	again, there is a small table,
24	obviously, the more remedial
25	courses they have to take, the

1	SCCC Board Meeting
2	less well they do. They do not
3	persist, they do not transfer,
4	they generally drop out.
5	So as far as the financial
6	impact, FTE's we can calculate
7	directly. I had to make some
8	assumptions about salaries for
9	faculty, and for the tuition.
10	If you direct your attention to
11	the footnote, that's how the
12	calculations were made, but
13	generally speaking, the college
14	gains from the remediation
15	program.
16	MR. SHAUN L. McKAY, Ed.D.:
17	We also send a Full Opportunity
18	Document to you in regards to
19	the regulations. If we are not
20	under that Full Opportunity Act
21	regulation, certainly it
22	requires the county to assume
23	the full 40 percent verses the
24	State, and both the county and
25	the State, when you look at

2	what the regulation states, the
3	State maintains that 40 percent
4	obligation under the Full
5	Opportunity Act; open access.
6	If that is the change by
7	regulations, or if the board
8	and the county, because the
9	county has to also adopt that
10	modification, the county is
11	assuming the responsibility of
12	40 percent, and the county is
13	currently around 23 percent at
14	this point.
15	So by State regs and the
16	Full Opportunity Act, which was
17	distributed by the Chairwoman
18	to all of us, that statement
19	also took into consideration as
20	well in regards to the issue of
21	access and remediation.
22	MS. DAFNY J. IRIAZRRY: So
23	in short, the remedial program
24	is not a financial burden to
25	the college.

2	MR. SHAUN L. McKAY, Ed.D.:
3	We have a social, moral, and
4	ethical responsibility when it
5	comes to providing access to
6	all students, and this is how
7	the admissions of community
8	colleges were founded across
9	the country, and we have some
10	systems that have over
11	80 percent of students
12	remediating in some campuses,
13	80.
14	What we have at this campus
15	is; in math, English, reading;
16	the basic fundamentals to get
17	the students successful
18	throughout the process.
19	In 2007 when middle states
20	was here, the discussion was:
21	Are these students persisting,
22	are they making their way
23	through the foundation courses?
24	We've proven with the correct
25	mediation measures that are in

2	place, that they do persist.
3	Now, we also went further
4	to see if you have one course
5	in remediation, how many will
6	persist? That was hovering
7	around 40 percent of those
8	students that are coming in.
9	So we have a chart that
10	shows all of that.
11	I'll ask Dr. DuBois to
12	speak a little bit about the D,
13	W, F's and I's in Title III and
14	what we've done with the recent
15	federal grant here at the
16	college and how faculty across
17	the entire system are involved
18	in that.
19	We saw Elaine Preston here
20	a few minutes ago here, and
21	she's in the English
22	department.
23	On this campus in the
24	English department, all
25	full-time faculty will be

2	teaching at least one
3	remediation course, and that
4	has always been the focus here
5	for the faculty.
6	DR. MARLENE DuBOIS: What
7	you have in the document I
8	hope you can hear me.
9	I drew some excerpts from
10	the Title III Grant
11	application, so in the
12	narrative, it includes the
13	abstract that you see at the
14	beginning of the document.
15	That would be Student
16	Engagement through Informed
17	Support, and it describes what
18	we're doing in short, but then
19	if you skip town to the part
20	that starts from Table 2
21	Academic Strengths, in that
22	section of the grant as it was
23	written, we cite open access as
24	one of the academic strengths,
25	so that we can take any student

2	and take them farther than
3	they've been in the K through
4	12 system and not deny anyone
5	admission to the college, so we
6	cite that. We address that in
7	the academic weaknesses.
8	How do we take them there?
9	Well, the area that we're
10	falling short in achieving that
11	mission are outlined in the
12	Academic Weaknesses in Table 5
13	of the grant.
14	The grant is addressing all
15	of these weaknesses,
16	specifically, so if you look
17	down in the weaknesses that are
18	cited in the grant;
19	"Enrollment, counseling, and
20	advising services are
21	splintered, different on each
22	campus", etcetera, etcetera,
23	etcetera.
24	Title III's activities
25	intend to remedy each of these

1	SCCC Board Meeting
2	weaknesses.
3	Over a period of five
4	years, our research specialist
5	in Title III, will be tracking
6	the progress of each of the
7	activities, so you'll be able
8	see how well we're addressing
9	these weaknesses.
10	And again, I would read
11	that there is an ethical issue
12	here. We don't want students
13	showing up here, failing, and
14	leaving.
15	There is also student
16	satisfaction that comes out
17	when they do accessing surveys
18	and that sort of thing, so it's
19	pretty obvious when we're
20	falling short. It doesn't feel
21	good to the faculty, it doesn't
22	feel good to the student, and
23	anyone who works on campus.
24	What Title III should do,
25	and you should be able to see

2	this progress, one-by-one in
3	all of these activities, is to
4	improved student satisfaction
5	in all these areas, and
6	hopefully, we'll be successful.
7	MR. SHAUN L. McKAY, Ed.D.:
8	The other part of it, we do
9	have the mission review too
10	where the State where there
11	are certain bench marks that
12	are established.
13	Internally here, with do
14	have certain metrics that we
15	utilize to access the student's
16	performance.
17	Later on, you'll hear a
18	discussion on the Counseling
19	Task Force and what they've
20	recently done across the entire
21	institution; faculty, staff,
22	students.
23	So simultaneously, what we
24	are doing here is doing a
25	self-review of what's happening

1	SCCC Board Meeting
2	at the institution by involving
3	all the faculty, students, and
4	staff, and recommendations are
5	brought forward.
6	Going back to 2007, these
7	were the exact same things that
8	middle states cited.
9	We have to do a
10	comprehensive review of the
11	institution, look to see where
12	our strengths are, how we can
13	expand what we do.
14	The student population
15	demographics have changed.
16	Students are coming to us now
17	with more needs. As an
18	institution, we would have to
19	find a way to meet those
20	students where they are,
21	provide the requisite services,
22	and help them to move forward
23	and be successful.
24	We have students coming
25	back to us now with Masters and

2	Bachelors Degrees trying to get
3	into nursing, veterinary
4	science, all the technical
5	programs, or even to change a
6	career in criminal justice.
7	On the other side of the
8	spectrum, you have students
9	that are competing.
10	I met a student this
11	morning that is here trying to
12	get into the nursing program.
13	The nursing program has a
14	certain amount of seats every
15	single semester, and you have
16	students with a 4.0, with a
17	Masters Degree trying to get
18	into the nursing program. We
19	have so many seats.
20	We just did the EMT program
21	at the college. Well, that's a
22	brand new program that we've
23	just put some resources
24	towards. It's going to out
25	now. What's going to happen

2	for those that can't get into
3	nursing? We'll try EMT. You
4	can't get into nursing, why not
5	veterinary science, health
6	informatics, you know those
7	programs.
8	Why not transfer? Get into
9	a transfer tracking the
10	sciences and the stem areas and
11	transfer into a Bachelor
12	program because in nursing, you
13	don't have to get a Bachelor's
14	Degree now. That's the new
15	approach in the hospitals.
16	So there is a lot of
17	different things happening in
18	the environment with Title III.
19	I think we can certainly
20	address and mitigate the
21	factors of D, W, F's and I's
22	that students will have in the
23	foundation courses of history,
24	psychology, and some of the
25	foundation courses.

2	I think what you're going
3	find at the same time with the
4	Counseling Task Force is to
5	look to see how we've aligned
6	ourselves across the system.
7	Are we meeting the students
8	early enough? Are we providing
9	the requisite advice, the
10	requisite supports?
11	That report you will hear
12	later will help us to get to
13	that point in time as an
14	institution because, again, we
15	have 26,500 students. You're
16	looking at a campus that has
17	3,000 students, and the
18	percentages that go up or down,
19	certainly would move in
20	different directions depending
21	on the size of the institution,
22	so we have to then take our
23	time, study every single
24	program, every single area of
25	the institution, and take the

1	SCCC Board Meeting
2	right steps to move forward.
3	MS. DAFNY J. IRIAZRRY:
4	Looking at efforts to
5	communicate with high schools
6	or create stronger partnerships
7	with high schools and
8	communicate what our students
9	come in with in terms of
10	deficiencies or strengths.
11	MR. SHAUN L. McKAY, Ed.D.:
12	In the Larachi (phonetic)
13	Group, the Larachi Group has
14	presidents of the community
15	colleges and four-year on
16	Long Island, and the
17	superintendents.
18	We do have that discussion,
19	but it has to go below that.
20	It has to get to the guidance
21	offices to the principals, and
22	that's the very next level.
23	Certainly it must begin
24	with the superintendents and
25	the presidents in Larachi.

2	We do have Roger Tilis
3	(phonetic) who attends those
4	meetings, and we do have that
5	dialogue.
6	We met about two months
7	ago, and that was the focus of
8	the discussion.
9	How do we get 123 districts
10	across Long Island to focus on
11	the very same thing you are
12	talking about?
13	It needs a collective
14	approach, and SED; the State
15	Education Department, is
16	talking about it, our SUNY
17	Chancellor is talking about it
18	through the education pipeline.
19	So yes, you're correct, but
20	now it needs to go to the other
21	levels. Those who are advising
22	the students, and before you
23	get to that, for example, in
24	mechatronics, I remember with
25	Brentwood and CI, Three

2	Village, and other districts
3	that the faculty in those high
4	schools were coming to the
5	campus, and we would look at
6	the curriculum together, we
7	shared with them what the
8	students would be required to
9	do here, and in tern, they
10	would help modify some of what
11	they're teaching in the high
12	schools before the students get
13	here.
14	Now that's just a few
15	areas, so it requires, for
16	example, in math, I know, in
17	the Eastern Campus, we have the
18	academic chair working with one
19	of the superintendents of
20	curriculum in Hampton Bays to
21	look and see how we can then
22	help the high school there to
23	get the students ready to come
24	into math, and not remediate in
25	math.

2	MS. DAFNY J. IRIAZRRY: How
3	long has that been in place?
4	MR. SHAUN L. McKAY, Ed.D.:
5	There, about a year-and-a-half.
6	MS. DAFNY J. IRIAZRRY:
7	Have they made any assessment
8	of the effectiveness of that?
9	MR. SHAUN L. McKAY, Ed.D.:
10	They're assessing it now, but
11	it requires at least three or
12	four it's like fall to fall,
13	spring to spring, so you need
14	to have like two matching time
15	periods to evaluate that, so
16	we'll report on that when we do
17	have some data.
18	Walter?
19	MR. WALTER C. HAZLITT:
20	This problem is escalating, and
21	not to mention, you're paying
22	almost 70 percent of your taxes
23	for education, and we're
24	falling short, and you have a
25	challenge here that is, I would

1	SCCC Board Meeting
2	say, it's insurmountable
3	because it is a challenge that
4	is going to take a lot of
5	attention.
6	It's a shame.
7	MR. SHAUN L. McKAY, Ed.D.:
8	And that why, again, for all
9	the faculty and staff that are
10	here, they are so involved in
11	this process because we need
12	everyone here with the
13	requisite skill sets to help us
14	get through that process.
15	Externally, we are working
16	with the high schools and
17	superintendents, and at the
18	State level, there's some
19	policy issues that are involved
20	here as well that would have to
21	be addressed, so we'll
22	certainly do the best we can,
23	Walter.
24	MR. PAUL V. PONTIER: You
25	know, on a local level,

1	SCCC Board Meeting
2	Mr. President, it isn't a
3	question of money because every
4	year your school tax seems to
5	go up, your local school taxes
6	etcetera, etcetera, etcetera,
7	and we're not getting any
8	better.
9	I don't envy you.
10	MR. SHAUN L. McKAY, Ed.D.:
11	I know. I don't envy me.
12	DR. MARLENE DuBOIS: I'd
13	like to address the question of
14	the connection between high
15	school and college readiness.
16	When students come to us,
17	they take a test. You bring
18	them in in the intake process.
19	They go through things that are
20	a little unfamiliar to them.
21	A lot of the suggestions
22	that are coming out of the
23	Title III groups are, in
24	particular, the faculty member
25	and student engagement groups.

2	Our team is suggesting that we
3	create learning objects that
4	will help students determine
5	their college readiness.
6	A lot of the of principle
7	that is coming out in their
8	learning objects that have
9	already been created for
10	college seminars; time
11	management, a video on
12	procrastination; on how to
13	overcome common problems.
14	There isn't universal
15	access to the VLCs right now,
16	but on the 16th, it's going to
17	be made available to all
18	students that are in college
19	seminar, and also some of the
20	math classes.
21	That will be very
22	interesting because we'll be
23	able to track their progress
24	and responses, and if it's
25	encouraging enough these people

1	SCCC Board Meeting
2	can get to work right away on
3	college readiness learning
4	objects.
5	MR. SHAUN L. McKAY, Ed.D.:
6	Thank you.
7	MS. DAFNY J. IRIAZRRY:
8	This was a discussion that went
9	on during the month that as I
10	share with my fellow trustees
11	on open enrollment, I believe
12	Suffolk Community College
13	should continue to provide
14	education to all, and I
15	emphasize that, all students
16	who come here seeking to
17	transform and empower their
18	lives.
19	Anything else?
20	(No verbal responses.)
21	MS. DAFNY J. IRIAZRRY:
22	Now, we'll move to the
23	committee reports beginning
24	with the academic affairs of
25	the Student Services Committee,

1	SCCC Board Meeting
2	which I have the privilege to
3	chair.
4	I know at the last meeting
5	it was requested by the
6	committee that Social Security
7	number of the scholarship
8	application for new students be
9	removed.
10	We're looking forward to
11	this change being implemented.
12	We did receive some
13	preliminary information on the
14	number of scholarship
15	applicants.
16	We look forward to a more
17	detailed report on the number
18	of applicants per scholarship.
19	With that, I move to
20	facilities and technologies.
21	MS. PATRICIA McMAHON:
22	Nothing to report.
23	MS. DAFNY J. IRIAZRRY:
24	Thank you.
25	Advocacy committee?

2	MR. SPEAKER: Nothing to
3	report.
4	MS. DAFNY J. IRIAZRRY:
5	Thank you.
6	Personnel committee?
7	MR. PAUL V. PONTIER: I
8	need to set up an appointment
9	with the president to talk
10	about the issue of future
11	evaluations.
12	I'll get a hold of your
13	office maybe next week.
14	
15	MR. SHAUN L. McKAY, Ed.D.:
16	Sure, sure.
17	MS. DAFNY J. IRIAZRRY:
18	Budget committee Trustee
19	Fenchel is not in attendance.
20	MR. ERNESTO MATTACE, JR.:
21	Just one question because we
22	haven't had a report.
23	What's the status of the
24	new science building, as far
25	as; anything happening with

2	that at all?
3	MR. SHAUN L. McKAY, Ed.D.:
4	The new science building, have
5	we received the drawings on
6	that and the designs?
7	MR. SPEAKER: We have
8	drawings for the new science
9	building. We're currently
10	reviewing them. They're a
11	rather large set, as you might
12	expect, so that's proceeding
13	well.
14	We're also meeting with the
15	consultants over the next
16	several weeks to review our
17	comments of the building.
18	The programming is set.
19	Site work, that's all been
20	included in the construction,
21	so we're doing that currently.
22	MR. ERNESTO MATTACE, JR.:
23	It's on track?
24	SPEAKER: Yes.
25	MR. ERNESTO MATTACE, JR.:

2	Is there any discussion about
3	I know you talked about it
4	at one of your meetings
5	about the foundation and where
6	it's sitting, and what has to
7	be done with it.
8	MR. SPEAKER: That is
9	resolved at this point.
10	We did additional drawings
11	to collect new information to
12	supplement the information we
13	already had to make sure that
14	the technical approach was
15	sound. We would get good
16	information from both the
17	structuring sub-consultant and
18	the engineer of record that
19	support the foundation it is
20	on.
21	That's moving forward, and
22	actually, that design along
23	with other co-compliance
24	drawings have been submitted.
25	MR. ERNESTO MATTACE, JR.:

2	Thank you.
3	MS. DAFNY J. IRIAZRRY: Any
4	more questions?
5	(No verbal responses.)
6	MS. DAFNY J. IRIAZRRY: At
7	this point, I move to the
8	Chairwoman's report.
9	On August 22nd, I met with
10	the College Foundation Chairman
11	Robert Walter, and
12	President McKay to learn more
13	about the Subcommittee College
L 4	Mission 2018 Campaign, which is
15	to raise \$7 million dollars.
16	We discussed the objectives
L7	of the campaign.
18	Number one, scholarship
L 9	endowment for deserving
20	student. Two, create initial
21	sustainability. Three, College
22	Priority Empowerment Endowment
23	Fund. Four, improving student
24	learning through technology.
25	We also discussed reaching

2	100 percent board
3	participation, and for the
4	board to consider a pledge to
5	be paid over a three-year
6	period.
7	I look forward to
8	discussing more of this in the
9	future.
10	I'd also like to take this
11	opportunity to say that while
12	the Hurricane Irene or later,
13	Tropical Storm Irene is now
14	history in our region, it did
15	hurt many communities hard in
16	other parts of New York State.
17	I hope we all safely weathered
18	the storm, and physical damages
19	experienced by the campus were
20	minimal, and inconveniences to
21	our faulty, staff, and students
22	were minor.
23	I want to express on behalf
24	of the board our deepest
25	gratitude to the collaboration

2	of our emergency alert team and
3	their staff for they're very,
4	very, very well coordinated
5	efforts in protecting the
6	college's facilities, and
7	providing safety to shelters
8	assigning residents with
9	special needs and as well as
10	residents.
11	Because of their staff's
12	collaborative efforts, our
13	students and staff were able to
14	return to our college.
15	Thank you for their
16	diligence and professionalism.
17	Additionally, I want to
18	express a special thank you
19	also to our Grant Campus
20	personnel who assisted LIPA
21	with the post-storm recovery by
22	providing shelter to up to 1000
23	out-of-state workers. It was
24	indeed a privilege and an honor
25	to acknowledge that Suffolk

3	continue its community efforts
4	and its history of assisting in
5	any way possible our community.
6	Also, I'd like to report
7	that last September 13th, we
8	hosted the Long Island Region
9	Economical Development Council,

L 4	We look forward to reporting on
15	that at the next meeting.
L 6	That's all I have to report
L 7	for now.
18	At this point, we'll have
L 9	the President's remark.
20	MR. SHAUN L. McKAY, Ed.D.:
21	I would also like to
22	acknowledge Trustee Pat McMahon
23	who serves on the, we call it
24	the LEDC; Long Island Economic
25	Development Council, and who

2	was at that meeting hosted at
3	the Eastern Campus, and I would
4	like to say that we turned that
5	room into what I believe was
6	unbelievable spectacle by
7	hosting that many individuals
8	in a room.
9	The Lieutenant Governor was
10	very pleased at how we were
11	able to accommodate that many
12	individuals.
13	If you have not attended
14	one of those meetings, the
15	public does have a voice in
16	this discussion.
17	It is something that would
18	help this entire region compete
19	against nine other regions for
20	what the Governor has done and
21	has set aside for economic
22	development throughout the
23	entire state.
24	The public does have a part
25	in this. Each Council will

2	have an opportunity to grade
3	certain projects.
4	Up to 20 percent of the
5	points will come through the
6	Development Councils. The
7	other 80 percent will come
8	through some metric developed
9	by the Governor and his staff,
10	so this is a very, very
11	significant opportunity for all
12	stakeholders to be involved in
13	this process, so again, Trustee
14	McMahon is serving on that
15	panel, and I'm on one of the
16	task force that comes
17	underneath that council, which
18	is the Education Economic
19	Development Task Force, which I
20	serve, so we have two members
21	of the college community on
22	that important team.
23	MS. PATRICIA McMAHON: We
24	fit a lot of folks into that
25	learning center room. It was

2	very well attended, and I think
3	Suffolk shined our facility.
4	It was great. We have a lot of
5	work to do between now and
6	November; strategic plans and
7	projects, and so forth because
8	five regions will get awarded
9	\$40 million each.
10	So it's a lot to be
11	selected out of the nine, but
12	we've got a lot of work to do.
13	MR. SHAUN L. McKAY, Ed.D.:
14	I also received from St.
15	Joseph's College we worked
16	with them in the stem area.
17	As you know, we have a very
18	active stem program at the
19	college. We've presented here
20	before on that. Eight of our
21	students, the most in SUNY and,
22	I believe, nationally were
23	awarded summer internships at
24	laboratories across the
25	country; seven right here at

2	Brookhaven National Labs.
3	In working with
4	St. Joseph's, Dennis Reissig,
5	the Academic Chair of the Math
6	Department in Ammerman, has
7	been working with St. Joseph's,
8	and we sent a letter of support
9	for a grant opportunity through
LO	the NSF; National Science
11	Foundation, to help our
12	students to receive
13	scholarships to transfer into
L 4	stem initiatives and stem
15	programs.
16	I'm pleased to say that we
L7	received a letter indicating
18	that that grant was funded to
19	the tune of \$1.2 million for
20	St. Joseph's to work with our
21	college to get students to move
22	and an transfer into that area.
23	Again, it's a lot of
24	positive news in that area and
25	across the college and working

2	with our institutions, we are
3	working to find scholarships in
4	key areas, as you know,
5	science, engineering,
6	technology, and math are some
7	of the areas that we don't see
8	a large number of students
9	coming through the system and
10	into in the pipeline to move
11	into those major areas, key
12	areas here on Long Island in
13	regards to career pathways.
14	This is another indication
15	of positive movement towards
16	getting more students into the
17	stem areas.
18	All college day will be on
19	the 20th. Again, this is a day
20	where our faculty, staff,
21	students, and all of us will
22	gather together to spend some
23	time looking at the
24	institution, and certainly
25	talking about what we've

2	accomplished over the last
3	year, talk about what we are
4	looking forward to in this
5	academic cycle, and then to
6	have a professional series with
7	all of our faculty and staff,
8	getting together in specific,
9	topical areas. I believe we
10	have between 16 to 20 breakout
11	sessions on that date. So far,
12	the last report I saw we have
13	over 600 plus individuals that
14	have registered to attend that
15	event, and that is right around
16	where we normally are at this
17	point in time in registration
18	for the event. We hope to
19	continue that.
20	For those staff members
21	that, unfortunately, will not
22	be with us, there will be on
23	the campuses regular
24	activities will happen.
25	Students are aware that

2	there are no classes that are
3	available for that day.
4	That is the one day we set
5	aside in the fall semester
6	every year to bring faculty and
7	staff together so we can talk
8	across the disciplines and talk
9	across the campuses at one
10	location at the start of the
11	semester, so that's on the
12	20th.
13	I'll be in Buffalo on the
14	25th and 26th. I'll be with
15	the Chancellor and some
16	scholars across the country
17	looking at Education and
18	Workforce Development, and a
19	number of other breakout
20	sessions, I've been asked to
21	lead a panel discussion in
22	Buffalo on that date.
23	The Chancellor is hosting
24	these sessions all around the
25	state, and this one is in

2	Buffalo, and I've been asked to
3	lead that panel as well.
4	At this point in time, I
5	have three presentations, as I
6	frequently do, to bring the
7	college community to the Board
8	of Trustees meeting to share
9	with you things that are
10	happening actively within the
11	college and across each campus.
12	I will have John Lombardo
13	first speak on Workforce and
14	Development in the area where
15	we have a manufacturing
16	symposium on October 21st.
17	Then I will have Richard
18	Britton to talk about the
19	articulations that we have
20	within SUNY and also within all
21	other higher education
22	institutions that we constantly
23	work on updating and helping
24	our students with a seamless
25	pathway to continue their

2	educational pursuits.
3	Then I will have Mary Reese
4	and Cheryl Every-Wurtz to speak
5	on the Counseling Task Force,
6	and where we are to date that.
7	That final report is due to my
8	office in about a month or so,
9	and this is the preliminary
10	report. We'll get th final
11	report to you as well.
12	MR. JOHN LOMBARDO: Good
13	morning, everyone.
14	As a community college, I
15	just want to start by saying
16	that Suffolk County Community
17	College has been successfully
18	involved in Workforce
19	Development and training and
20	responds in a very positive way
21	to whatever the regional needs
22	are.
23	What we've done over the
24	past year is formulated an
25	approach and developed an event

2	called the Long Island
3	Manufacturing Symposium.
4	There are a lot of rumors
5	about the demise of
6	manufacturing, which are
7	exaggerated. Yes, it's
8	changed. It's not as large as
9	it used to be, but we still
10	have over 3,000 companies. We
11	still have over 80,000 jobs
12	currently filled, and it still,
13	no matter how much we talk
L 4	about it, it's still seems to
15	indicate to the region that
16	manufacturing isn't vibrant.
L 7	Well, that's not true.
18	One of the things that is
19	interesting about this region
20	is that we have a wide variety
21	of manufacturing disciplines or
22	clusters.
23	Medical equipment being
24	developed, manufactured, and
25	shipped all over the world by

2	Biodex, that's at exit 69 by
3	the way.
4	The wide variety of
5	products produced and developed
6	by Northrop Grumman. Data
7	System and Data Center,
8	products developed by APCO
9	Systems in Farmingdale,
10	BioScience is within Forest
11	Laboratories, and a huge amount
12	of products for aerospace and
13	defense systems, that's an
14	asset to the region.
15	This showcase, this
16	symposium, is developed for
17	many reasons.
18	We need to show off what we
19	do on Long Island. We need to
20	see the economic impact of
21	manufacturing. For every
22	dollar they invoice to their
23	customer, they spend \$1.75 into
24	the regional economy.
25	Manufacturers need to learn

2	about each other, the new
3	innovative trends. This
4	symposium will showcase that,
5	and the value of these public,
6	private partnerships will be
7	showcased this particular day.
8	I mean, we currently have
9	within our manufacturing
10	technology program, over
11	\$65,000 in scholarships that
12	have been provided by industry
13	people who have been involved
14	with our Mechatronics Programs
15	and our team programs, and our
16	the variety of programs where
17	we've raised federal money and
18	provided training to the region
19	at no cost, so companies still
20	don't know about that. They
21	still don't know about the fact
22	that they could send their
23	workers here, they can be
24	trained in welding, they can be
25	trained in C&C machining, and

2	essentially that's at no cost.
3	The other value of this
4	symposium is to network with
5	other industry people. There
6	are some supply-chain
7	opportunities, and this
8	awareness of career
9	opportunities to the Long
10	Island college students and
11	universities, I think, is
12	really the essence of this
13	event.
14	We need to retain our
15	students. We talk about it,
16	but what Suffolk County
17	Community College is doing is
18	essentially showing how we can
19	retain them.
20	We need to open up the eyes
21	of our students to see the
22	career path opportunities that
23	are available, and essentially
24	look at what we do. Look at
25	the fact that there is a lot of

2	things going on, and most
3	importantly is to respond to
4	the needs of regional
5	businesses.
6	Our programs are successful
7	because we listen to industry.
8	We find out what their needs
9	are, and we provide programs
10	relevant to the skill gats in
11	their companies, and we
12	certainly do a great job, I
13	think, in the awareness that
14	these workforce and careers
15	program, that there is a job at
16	the end of the day. That's the
17	most important thing; that
18	there are jobs.
19	The symposium is geared
20	towards students. Our academic
21	chairs, our campus deans, are
22	all talking about this.
23	We want to be able to show
24	our students firsthand what is
25	available to them

2	The two-plus-two programs
3	developed and put forth by
4	Dr. McKay show a career path
5	progression.
6	These students have
7	credentials, and another thing
8	about the day is that 50
9	percent of the fees that are
10	collected from the
11	manufacturers that are going to
12	be here, are going to go
13	directly into the scholarship
14	programs.
15	One of the things that we
16	discovered in talking and
17	working on the statewide
18	committee, the \$52 million
19	grant, was that, unique to Long
20	Island were 15, 16 industry
21	clusters that have a direct
22	relationship to the academic
23	programming at the college.
24	We wanted to bring
25	workforce and industry and

2	academics together, so we're
3	focusing on the clusters like
4	the biosciences and what this
5	slide indicates is that these
6	are courses within that program
7	that have a direct relationship
8	to jobs at the end of the day.
9	We'll have some major food
10	service manufacturers on the
11	Island will be here, there will
12	be IT people here, homeland
13	security, but in the food
14	service area, there are jobs on
15	Long Island for our graduates,
16	and those jobs are not just in
17	restaurants and hotel
18	management.
19	There are major
20	manufacturers on the Long
21	Island that ship products
22	manufactured on the Island,
23	frozen, and shipped all over
24	the country.
25	Recently a company in Islip

2	called Whitson's Foods earned a
3	\$27 million contract with the
4	school system in Boston.
5	The product is being
6	manufactured here for the
7	school systems throughout
8	Boston and shipped up to that
9	region.
10	As we develop these
11	programs and we desensitize our
12	approach to industry needs,
13	we've gained some notoriety.
14	We have not only Computer
15	Numerical Control; that's CNC
16	machining training, fundamental
17	machining process as well, Auto
18	CAD; 3D prototyping.
19	What we've been able to do
20	is take these skill sets, and
21	take them to the next level.
22	We are the only welding
23	certification center for the
24	American Welding Society in New
25	York State.

2	If a company has five
3	welders, and they are not
4	certified and they need
5	certification through new
6	government contracts, they come
7	to us, and we take care of it.
8	Also the National Institute
9	of Manufacturing Sciences;
LO	NIMS, is another certification
L1	we have, so you take that
L2	certification, marry it with
13	the Associates Degree in
L 4	manufacturing technology, and
15	you have the best, employable,
16	manufacturing, entry-level
17	worker anyplace you can find.
18	The credit program came
19	into effect right around the
20	time that we launched the new
21	building. It's growing. I
22	think that the quality of what
23	is happening within that
24	program is gaining notoriety,
25	and a total employee will

2	graduate from that program that
3	has many levels of entry into
4	the manufacturing processes on
5	Long Island.
6	We talk about student
7	retention, we talk about
8	pipeline of training workers,
9	we talk about economic
10	stability.
11	What this symposium is
12	going to showcase is that there
13	are career paths, alternative.
14	Those career paths, by the way,
15	are not just on the floor of
16	manufacturing.
17	Our business students have
18	opportunities, our accounting
19	students have opportunities,
20	and I think this couldn't have
21	happened any better.
22	IT and graphic design; I
23	get job opportunities all the
24	time, and I send them out to a
25	variety of campus disciplines.

2	Most recently, a company that
3	is on Congressman Israel's task
4	force, which I'm on, said, I
5	need graphic artists, so I sent
6	a blurb out to the executive
7	deans. They all responded that
8	they would be sending that
9	around, and I acknowledged
10	Dr. Walters in particular
11	because he sent it out right
12	away to his Graphic Arts
13	Department, and here's the
14	connection. The faculty chair
15	went through the students that
16	they had, and she choose four
17	students that best fit the
18	skill set looking from the
19	company.
20	The president of this
21	company, Larry Lieberman, had a
22	very specific set of skills
23	that he needed to design
24	products within his company.
25	Now, four of these students are

2	now candidates for paid
3	internships.
4	We were fortunate enough
5	recently to have a Newsday
6	article that talked about the
7	programs that we have, and from
8	that article, mainly it
9	interested companies in
10	attending this symposium, but I
11	think the most important
12	inquiry was from a company on
13	exit 69 in Calverton that took
14	over 192,000 square foot
15	Grumman/Calverton facility and
16	manufactures custom made
17	windows and doors for the
18	world, and he needs, over the
19	next four months, 30 workers
20	starting from entry-level
21	assemblers to pickers,
22	packagers, finishers, quality
23	control people, and CNC
24	machinists to work on these
25	very fancy windows and doors

2	that they manufacture.
3	We have an impact. I just
4	want to thank the
5	administration for the
6	confidence that they instill in
7	us to enable us to go out and
8	do what we do.
9	Does anyone have any
10	questions?
11	MS. DAFNY J. IRIAZRRY:
12	Have you noticed an increase in
13	growth in terms of enrollment
14	for these type of programs in
15	the college?
16	MR. JOHN LOMBARDO: On both
17	the credit and the noncredit
18	side, there's been growth in
19	enrollment.
20	On the noncredit side, we
21	get a great deal of referrals
22	from the Department of Labor
23	who are training a lot of
24	displaced workers; providing
25	them with new skills and

2	opportunities, not only in
3	manufacturing, but on the
4	soft-skill side within
5	corporate training as well.
6	MS. DAFNY J. IRIAZRRY:
7	Could we get a chart showing a
8	trend here that this program
9	has been getting more and more
10	interest.
11	MR. SHAUN L. McKAY, Ed.D.:
12	Sure.
13	MR. JOHN LOMBARDO: We can
14	provide that.
15	We do regular, quarterly
16	reports to the Federal
17	Department of Labor where we
18	have to track those trends, so
19	can get that to you.
20	MS. DAFNY J. IRIAZRRY: Are
21	there any efforts, again, as an
22	indicator to reach out to high
23	schools to highlight these
24	programs.
25	Sometimes a lot of

2	counselors might not know all
3	these possibilities that our
4	students have.
5	MR. JOHN LOMBARDO: Yes.
6	Several years ago, we
7	implemented a manufacturing
8	academy in the high schools.
9	We trained 27, as Dr. McKay
10	indicated earlier, 27 high
11	school vocational teachers on
12	how to deliver the five-module
13	mechatronics program.
14	Two school districts right
15	now have engaged in that.
16	Three Village being the most
17	prominent; graduating 22
18	students this spring from that
19	program.
20	The other thing that has
21	evolved from that is that
22	industries' interest in getting
23	involved in that five-point
24	early, we currently have four
25	students from Three Village who

2	are interns in a company in
3	Nesconset for Key High Vacuum
4	who was recommended to us by
5	Legislature Kennedy.
6	Those partnerships continue
7	to grow.
8	MS. DAFNY J. IRIAZRRY:
9	Thank you.
10	MR. SHAUN L. McKAY, Ed.D.:
11	Richard.
12	MR. RICHARD BRITTON: Thank
13	you.
14	I want to come back and
15	train in one of John's
16	programs.
17	This morning I'm just going
18	to be talking to you briefly
19	about the articulation transfer
20	process. It's not terribly
21	glamorous, but it's an
22	important part of what the
23	college does.
24	Any student who leaves here
25	with an Associates in art or an

2	Associates in science, is
3	prepared to go to another
4	institution. They've taken
5	their general electives, their
6	general studies requirements,
7	and they are ready to go.
8	The issue then becomes:
9	How do they make a decision of
10	where they are going to go, and
11	what can we do to help them get
12	to that place?
13	Well, they can, of course,
14	just apply to colleges. They
15	can look on any number of
16	websites, they can make phone
17	calls, and they can go to any
18	place that will accept them.
19	What is helpful to them is
20	that the college maintains a
21	transfer site because we have
22	agreements with a variety of
23	schools.
24	This is not to say that the
25	student can't go someplace

2	else, but we've selected
3	schools, either we reached out
4	to them, or they reached out to
5	us, and we have agreements in a
6	variety of areas.
7	What I've just given to you
8	is a screen shot of what the
9	students can see two clicks
10	from the homepage, and what
11	this enables the student to do
12	is look, for example, at
13	Hofstra or at SUNY Stony Brook.
14	Look at programs we have. Look
15	at the programs that they have.
16	There is a PDF file in most
17	of these with the agreement on
18	it.
19	Candidly, the students are
20	not going to read the
21	agreements. The agreement,
22	however, is there so that the
23	counseling staff can look at
24	the agreement, and it becomes a
25	valuable document in the

1	SCCC Board Meeting
2	students making a decision
3	about where to go.
4	The site changes on, at
5	least, on a monthly basis
6	because programs come to us,
7	we're solicited by schools to
8	add them.
9	We screen the schools to
10	make certain that, in fact,
11	we're going to have enough
12	students that will actually go
13	there. I get about seven or
14	eight requests a month from
15	schools who target us because
16	we are the largest community
17	college in the state, and
18	they're looking for students.
19	Some of them are
20	proprietary schools, which does
21	not dismiss them automatically,
22	but it does mean that we look a
23	little bit harder at them.
24	Some of them are schools that
25	we don't believe our students

2	would have much interest in,
3	but the ones that are on this
4	list are schools that our
5	student do, in fact, transfer
6	to.
7	Now even with all of this;
8	the information that the
9	student can get from us, the
10	information the transfer
11	counselor can get from us,
12	there still are additional
13	issues that occur.
14	A student, for example, may
15	decide that they are
16	transferring to Oswego, and
17	there are agreements that we
18	have with Oswego, and they get
19	up to Oswego, and they are
20	talking to the counselor there.
21	The counselor there is
22	reviewing what they've taken
23	here, a says, you know what?
24	We don't like this Psych 101,
25	so now you're going to have to

2	take our Psych 101 instead.
3	Well, the student is now
4	300 miles away from home. They
5	are not going to call us and
6	say, what's the story here?
7	They're going to grumble,
8	They're going to complain, and
9	they're going to take their
LO	Psych 101.
L1	What we are currently
L2	doing, and we'll roll this out
13	in February, in addition to
L 4	this site, there is a second
15	site that Dr. McKay and I
16	worked with earlier and that's
L7	a syllabus project.
18	What we are taking is every
19	syllabus for every course in
20	the college, putting it online
21	in an abbreviated form, so it
22	has the description as it
23	appears in the catalog, it has
24	a learning outcome we call the
25	course objectives, and we will

2	advise the student and the
3	transfer institution that this
4	site is available so that when
5	that counselor says, we don't
6	like your Psych 101, the
7	student can say, okay, let's
8	click on it. Let's look at it,
9	and the will discover, of
10	course, it's identical to the
11	Psych 101 at the transfer
12	school.
13	That project has taken a
14	great deal of work, a great
15	deal of collaboration from the
16	academic side.
17	It required each discipline
18	to meet together, which is you
19	can imagine, like hurting cats,
20	and we've asked them to agree
21	on all of the course objectives
22	and everything else concerning
23	each course.
24	We have about 900 courses,
25	so we're about 600 through the

1	SCCC Board Meeting
2	process. We have another 300
3	to add to it. In February that
4	site will be available.
5	Any questions?
6	(No question posed.)
7	MR. SHAUN L. McKAY, Ed.D.:
8	Just so you know, this is an
9	evolving process.
10	This has been a discussion
11	with this board. It's a
12	discussion happening within
13	SUNY, with all SUNY systems.
14	The chancellor has raised that
15	discussion. The presidents are
16	discussing it, and you know,
17	Richard and I talked about
18	this. If we are within the
19	SUNY system, the State
20	Education Department reviews
21	the curriculum that has worked
22	its way through governments all
23	way up through SED and through
24	SUNY, and got its approval that
25	another SUNY sister campus

2	should not be reviewing the
3	curriculum again to tell the
4	student this course should not
5	be transferrable.
6	There are states that do
7	have a seamless transfer system
8	in place; Maryland, Florida,
9	New Jersey, and others that do
10	have this system where one
11	course code applies no matter
12	where you transfer.
13	The transfer counselors,
14	Richard's office, we are all
15	working on trying to help our
16	students move through. This is
17	a very, very, very important
18	process, so thank you, Richard.
19	MR. RICHARD BRITTON: Thank
20	you.
21	MR. SHAUN L. McKAY, Ed.D.:
22	At this time, I'd like to ask
23	Mary Reese the Assistant Dean
24	of Student Services at the
25	Eastern Campus and Cheryl

2	Every-wurtz to join us.
3	They've been working on the
4	counseling task force across
5	the college, and their report
6	will be due imminently.
7	This is a preliminary
8	report with where they are to
9	date with their work, and we
10	will share with you the final
11	report once it's completed.
12	Please, go ahead Mary.
13	MS. MARY REESE: Thank you
14	for your time Chairwoman.
15	Thank you for offering us a
16	moment just to share with you
17	what we've been working on.
18	What has happened this
19	morning is that this is
20	energizing to hear all the
21	levels of conversation that
22	have been going on in the room
23	because the Counseling Task
24	Force has been looking at all
25	of these perspectives as it

2	relates the work of the
3	college.
4	The Task Force has a pretty
5	massive charge, and it was to
6	look at all of the ways in
7	which counselling around the
8	college is understood, and the
9	way in which we participate in
10	the success of our students,
11	and the way in which we support
12	the college in it's mission.
13	Just as a reminder, the
14	last time we were together, we
15	spoke about the areas that
16	we've been examining. It
17	ranges from admissions work,
18	like Chairwoman, you were
19	speaking of before about our
20	recruitment, outreach from
21	admissions, and what is
22	schedules, so all of these are
23	being surveyed and matrixes;
24	our advising work, our general
25	ed requirements, our transfer

2	work, disability services,
3	international students, honors
4	programs, financial aid,
5	counselling. All of the ways
6	in which the counselors are
7	involved around the college.
8	This is what we've been
9	looking at. We've had a very
10	productive summer which is
11	sometimes difficult to produce,
12	but we really did, and I want
13	to thank our IE teams both
14	under Dr. Pews (phonetic)
15	oversight and Dr. Schultz.
16	They worked with us very
17	closely to try to nail down
18	these charge questions to
19	understand; what do we know,
20	what don't we know, what do we
21	need to know?
22	That's what the final
23	report will be able produce in
24	really understanding the
25	baseline of what it is that

2	we're doing to support the
3	students.
4	We've got our updated
5	organizational charts, our
6	survey of hours of operation
7	around the college. What are
8	those summaries of outreach
9	efforts, what are the programs
10	that are offered college-wide,
11	what is the adjunct overload
12	within particular areas, what
13	are our traffic patterns, what
14	are the systems, the services,
15	and the staffing that is
16	present to support those
17	students, and how do the
18	decisions get made in how we
19	staff those moving forward?
20	We've extensively assessing
21	the student-opinion surveys,
22	the FOE, the middle states, and
23	all of these documents are
24	coming together to try to bring
25	some recommendations to the

1	SCCC Board Meeting
2	president and the board can
3	consider in how we support this
4	large group of people who are
5	coming into our buildings and
6	into our classrooms; some that
7	are coming in under prepared,
8	some that are coming in and
9	excelling. How do we send them
10	off to the Cornell
11	environments?
12	That's the way in which we
13	do our work, and the
14	undertaking has been pretty
15	revealing. We needed a lot of
16	people around the table. We
17	had the FA President and the
18	Guild President. We had
19	counselors from all of those
20	areas I mentioned so that we
21	could bring the pieces together
22	to say, what are we doing, and
23	what makes sense, what doesn't
24	make sense, how do we make
25	decisions moving forward?

2	I think one of the things
3	that's coming clearer is that
4	we do a lot to serve our
5	students, but do we do then in
6	concert? Do we have a
7	first-year experience mission
8	and model? Do we understand
9	that what happens during the
10	testing/advising process or
11	when we reach out at the high
12	school level that it's followed
13	up in admissions and goes over
14	to testing and advising and is
15	picked up by orientation and
16	goes over to the freshman
17	center? Do we understand that
18	all of that information that
19	has been started then
20	continues. Priority
21	registration for the spring
22	term, what's our outreach?
23	As Title II continues its
24	work and it's talking about its
25	early-intervention strategies,

2	who is picking up the
3	early-intervention notations,
4	who is going to be that
5	population of people that are
6	going to be providing that
7	outreach to the student to,
8	you're struggling, talk to me,
9	what's going on?
10	Are we concerted, are we
11	doing what we need to do in an
12	educated way, in a smart way,
13	in a forward-thinking way to
14	support this growing number of
15	students who have come to our
16	doors?
17	I think I heard us say that
18	we're at a flat enrollment, but
19	as you drive through the
20	parking lots on some of
21	campuses, you can't find a
22	spot.
23	If you look at the
24	utilization rates in our
25	classes, they're full today. I

2	don't know what they are going
3	to look like in eight weeks.
4	We fight hard to hold on to
5	them, but they're full, and so
6	how do we help those students
7	get to the most successful
8	place they could be and launch?
9	That's the work of the Task
10	Force.
11	We have had two subgroups
12	that have been meeting
13	consistently. One of the them
14	is to really look at the
15	support programs that the
16	college has for students who
17	are deemed at risk.
18	Are they coming in with
19	these developmental courses
20	that they need to satisfy?
21	Our college has offered
22	three concerted programs. Two
23	are grant funded; the
24	Educational Opportunity Program
25	and the TRIO program are both

2	grant-funded programs that
3	support students who are deemed
4	to be at risk in some way.
5	Both have different
6	classifications as to how they
7	are made eligible for those
8	programs, but those are
9	grant-funded programs with
10	college support.
11	The other program, the
12	College Success Program, that
13	was started under a previous
14	administration, and it was
15	designed to support students
16	who were at risk in a certain
17	way. They had interventions
18	that were made available to
19	those students, and those
20	students were case managed as
21	they progressed through their
22	studies.
23	That was not a grant-funded
24	program, and what we wanted to
25	do was just look at what are,

2	the interventions that are
3	offered at those programs, what
4	are the potential successes,
5	who is determining what success
6	is?
7	I think at the college we
8	always struggle with somebody
9	else's definition of success;
10	is it graduation rate?
11	Often times we're about
12	helping people get ready to
13	launch, and they go, and we
L 4	dont' get to celebrate their
15	graduations with them.
16	Anyway, we use that
L7	graduation rate as a measure of
18	success until we looked at
19	that, and I think,
20	statistically, we can't use
21	that as a side-by-side for
22	validity purposes, but it gives
23	you some description as to what
24	perhaps interventions work and
25	what proves successful for

2	these students.
3	Those hardy conversations
4	continue, but as I listen to
5	the board meeting this morning,
6	and I listen to the questions
7	being posed, these are the
8	things that we are talking
9	about on these ongoing
10	conversations. How does the
11	college out of our four or five
12	campuses, our three primary
13	campuses work in concert to be
14	as successful as we can be with
15	our students?
16	That was the moratorium
17	conversation that continues,
18	and recommendations will be
19	forthcoming.
20	We also understand that
21	there is a new college
22	leadership for those programs.
23	We are looking forward to
24	debriefing Joanne Braxton. She
25	will be serving as the

2	college-wide overseer for EOP
3	and TRIO and those support
4	programs; College Success.
5	We'd like to get with her
6	over the next week or so and
7	debrief her on what we've been
8	discussing.
9	Another subgroup that has
10	been meeting Cheryl has been
11	working with the mental health
12	support at the college.
13	It's a very important
14	component that comes to us, and
15	so our population of people are
16	needing us in some way, and
17	we're trying to discover and
18	find what way we can be of
19	service.
20	MS. CHERYL EVERY-WURTZ:
21	Especially as our populations
22	increase and the needs of our
23	change, so does the mental
24	health component of the
25	counselling aspect. We're

2	looking at that. We have
3	looked at it pretty thoroughly.
4	What we do in terms of
5	policy and procedure across all
6	three campuses, they are
7	different, so we have evaluated
8	and assessed that. We've also
9	compared what the current
10	policies and practices are
11	across other similar
12	institutions of size and
13	configuration to see what their
14	best practices are.
15	We have also looked at the
16	majority of the SUNY Community
17	Colleges to see what the range
18	is. Thr range is very
19	dissimilar in terms of what is
20	offered. There are some
21	campuses that have very little
22	services and some that have
23	full-blown mental health
24	clinics on their campuses, so
25	we've taken all of that into

2	consideration. We've looked at
3	all the legal and ethical
4	models and standards that are
5	out there in terms of
6	practices, and we are looking
7	at if we stay with what we do
8	currently, what are the
9	advantages, disadvantages,
10	liabilities, etcetera for that?
11	We are also proposing
12	progressive-type models to deal
13	with mental health on all three
14	campuses in a similar fashion.
15	MR. SHAUN L. McKAY, Ed.D.:
16	As you can see, this is a very
17	comprehensive process, and a
18	college of our size requires
19	that we do a review of
20	ourselves and show that we do
21	have the requisite services for
22	all students who come to us.
23	We've had a discussion this
24	morning on the intake process,
25	but you can see that while they

2	are there that there is a
3	comprehensive attempt by all of
4	us at the college to meet all
5	of those students where they
6	are and have the requisite
7	services.
8	I want to thank, again,
9	Mary and Cheryl for taking on
10	this task because, again, this
11	is the first time in the
12	history of the college that
13	this activity has occurred.
14	We've heard that stated by
15	several individuals before how
16	important it is for counsellors
17	to be able to help define what
18	happens with the students that
19	they see every day, and who
20	best to ask to look at that but
21	the folks that are directly
22	involved with that, and I thank
23	you for your work because,
24	again, the presentations you've
25	heard this morning, these folks

2	are doing their regular jobs as
3	well as taking on these
4	assignments on top of that, and
5	trying to have the individuals
6	who are actually doing the work
7	step outside of what they do
8	every day to look at it from an
9	institutional perspective,
10	which is different, and to come
11	up with a pathway for us to
12	take a look at what we do and
13	to make it better; define ways
14	in which we can do best
15	practices and beyond that and
16	how we can transform ourselves.
17	Thank you Mary and Cheryl.
18	I appreciate it.
