7	Now I'd like to introduce V.P. James Amoroso
8	to present the College Financial Reports.
9	MR. AMOROSO: Good morning. We are in a
10	unique time of the vear where we have three budget
11	vears going on right now. I will start with
12	2010/11. the previous vear, and right now we're
13	preparing the annual audit to start. The auditors
14	will be here December 5th. We should expect the
15	reports probably, if it's based on anything like
16	last vear, it will be about April or Mav of 2012
17	that we will get a report.
18	Fiscal vear 2011/12, the current vear, the
19	current monthly snapshot reflects a net positive
20	of more than \$22.000 for the vear-end reserve
21	balance. As vou know, that's based on a revenue

current monthly snapshot reflects a net positive
of more than \$22.000 for the vear-end reserve
balance. As vou know, that's based on a revenue
shortfall of approximately 2.1 million right now
due to reduced enrollment and that includes
tuition and fees and reduced bookstore commission
as you might expect in enrollment.

2	As a result of achieving ongoing efficiencies
3	that we've implemented, we expect to have 2.6 net
4	expenditure reduction, which is based on saving
5	monev on the Personnel Service Alliance, that's
6	the personnel salarv line of approximatelv \$1.6
7	million. We're also implementing a number of
8	utility and energy savings submissions, that will
9	save us \$1.4 million. And bv cutting back on
10	supplies and building repairs, approximately
11	\$200.000. The offsetting revenue expenditure item
12	there is the pension cost, which I think I
13	reported the last time, which we expect to
14	increase pension and health plans. That's about
15	\$600.000. So overall about \$400.000 will be the
16	net affect of the reserve balance this month. As
17	vou know. it changes every month because we
18	finalize different criteria and review it. So on
19	an ongoing basis, we're probably going to have a
20	different number next month, but we hope to
21	conclude on the reserve balance as vou might
22	expect.
23	In 2012/13. in vour packets there. vou
24	probably have seen the Budget Call. That letter
25	wont out vostorday. It wont around to all the

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2	president's cabinet for review, and it's calling
3	for the president required of 2.5 percent
4	reduction and in budget items. We are
5	anticipating flat or lower enrollments. The
6	budget submissions will be due in December. We're
7	going to review them in January and February. And
8	the DOT will have its, subject to approval, in
9	March or April for the county to to submit to
10	the county in April.
11	If vou have anv questions about that Budget
12	Call later. I know vou haven't had a chance to
13	review it, feel free to call me.
14	Anv questions on anv of budget vears or anv
15	of the items?
16	MR. PRESIDENT: Just to add to vour
17	presentation. we have been paving very close
18	attention to what's happening in the state and
19	countv levels. In Albanv we've seen where the
20	governor put a call across all of his agencies for
21	a reduction of 2.5 percent in this vear's budget.

2	approach to work with the governor. So in that
3	realm. the community colleges have asked for a
4	\$205 for the FDE-base increase moving forward, and
5	I believe Ellen at NIRSA is supporting that
6	approach as well and so is the faculty senate. We
7	anticipate that it's going to be a very different
8	process. What we're going to do now is take a
9	verv close look at the enrollment projections.
10	which we've seen from the IE office that savs that
11	between now and 2015. statewide receive 2.5
12	percent reduction in potential graduates in a lot
13	of high schools with a lot of students coming to
14	us. We're now mitigating a lot of those factors
15	by taking steps down. What we've done with our
16	contractor, what we've done with our efficiencies.
17	we have done this year. We are required to be
18	more prudent in doing what we do and to find more
19	efficiencies in what we do and we can at least
20	maintain the academic integrity of the
21	institution. We can now between the next month
22	or so. we'll be working on the budgets. not only
23	for this year, to mitigate the cost this year, but
24	the plan for next vear's budget as well. We plan
25	to bring that to you at an appropriate time.

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2	MR. AMOROSO: And the president addressed
3	that we do a budget gap analysis for next year
4	using those factors anticipating hopefully a \$205
5	increase, but possibly not getting that with the
6	county being flat, the increase in the health
7	plans and factor all that in and see what the
8	picture will be next vear.
9	MR. MATTACE: Were vou able to, as per the
10	last meeting, look at the computers and see if

MR. MATTACE: Were vou able to, as per the last meeting, look at the computers and see if anything could be done with the computers instead of selling them for \$10 apiece?

MR. AMOROSO: Well. right now we're selling the computers to a company and we're getting not much more than that. We are selling the monitors for a dollar. I think, because they are old. But we are trying to generate as much revenue as we can.

MR. MATTACE: I thought the idea was, if they're feasible to be used, there are many organizations out there that can possibly use them for children. That was my concern. I've got to be honest with you. I was just visiting my grandchildren down in Georgia and every kid in their class has their own computer. My grandson

1 2 up here savs. Grandpa, we've only got three 3 computers in our class. So it kind of makes me a 4 little bit -- vou know, I think the availability 5 is there and if they're functional, you know, if we can get \$10 for them or give them to a kid for 6 7 six months that they can work them. I think that really should be looked into. 8 9 MR. AMOROSO: I will discuss that with the IT 10 department. 11 MR. MATTACE: Thank vou. 12 MS. ALVAREZ-GRONEMAN: Thank you. 13 MS. CHAIRWOMAN: Any more questions? 14 (No response.) MS. CHAIRWOMAN: 15 Thank vou. 16 At this point I move to the Committee Reports beginning with the Economic Affairs and Student 17 18 Services, which I happen to be the chair on. There is no report at this time. 19 20 I will move to the next committee, Facilities 2.1 and Technology. The chair is not here. 2.2 MR. LILLY: Pat is not here, but Pat and I and Vice President Gatta and President McKav had a 23 24 meeting last week about the projects coming going

forward. And also, we got this, I guess,

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<u> </u>	notification that the Montaukett Learning Center
3	was on the cover of Choice magazine with reviews
4	for the academic libraries. And we're hoping
5	moving forward that the Learning Center will also
6	get subject because, vou know, going forward and
7	trving to make it as neat and certified as
3	possible.

There was also some mention when I spoke to Vice President Gatta before about this, the use of interns on some of the mapping that the facilities managers are doing now, because when you go out in the field and you look for where all lines are. whether it's electrical, whether it's gas, whether it's any sort of utilities, where things are, they used to have -- or thev still do have a room full of maps that they have to go back to. With today's technology, you could use GPS to locate it to ping it, so the next time you send somebody to a section. they will know exactly where the line is instead of pulling out the old maps. They were using interns to basically log this in. Trustee McMahon and myself made mention -actually should be making -- that using that as a public relations going forward that students

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coming into a college, if they can get real-life
experience going out into the field with

professionals doing certain projects instead of

iust sitting in a classroom, it makes the programs
that much more attractive. So whether we use it

on this or on the mapping, I think the aerial --

DR. McKAY: It was the Greenerv Review Energy Program that we have that we are now putting in front of potential donors where students from the architectural program and others and engineering as well worked with Paul Cooper and others to create a similar version of the entire building.

MR. LILLY: And going forward, if we can get that, whether it'd be on the website or on printed materials, it would be beneficial tactics for students. But also, then we went on some of the deferred maintenance projects that are going on. As we speak, you know, Lou's office was being worked on when we had that meeting. All these things. 13 we won a paramount of awards in two major

14 categories. That's a national and international

15 program as well. The team actually has done a

16 great job there. And we will continue to market

it and put it out. So, thank you.

13 MS. ALVAREZ-GRONEMAN: Yesterday's meeting 14 was not a College Foundation meeting. It was 15 actually a Chairman Council meeting. I'm not quite sure exactly when we're meeting again.

> DR. McKAY: The Foundation report -- and I will talk a little bit more about this. We're currently right now with the Chairman's Council and the Foundation. we are meeting with potential donors on an ongoing basis. And to date, I believe we have 370,000 to date in receipts. have over a million-plus out in pledges. There are many major donors that we've been meeting with recently. We are looking at several options.

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2	Greenerv Review Energy Project is also out in
3	front and that has been getting a lot of
4	attention. We're looking at naming rights. We're
5	looking at the guilts gueets and wills (phonetic)
6	and everything else. We've recently received
7	I believe it's in vour a packet that was brought
8	in a few minutes ago where we had a donation
9	from an individual of \$70.000 to the college. So
10	that continues and we're up to high gear. And as
11	we go down into the end of this period. we're
12	visiting with multiple succlusits on some of the
13	acts. So before we anticipate by next quarter, we
14	should see more action in regards to donations
15	comina in.
16	MS. CHAIRWOMAN: That action. I have shared
17	in the past, will also include the Board of
18	Trustees. We are anticipating in the upcoming
19	week to meet with Serranio (phonetic) to see how
20	we can cultivate and solicit some pledges from our
21	trustees, therefore, have a hundred percent
22	participation.

MS. ALVAREZ-GRONEMAN: The next meeting I will have a report for vou.

MS. CHAIRWOMAN: Sure.

2	Okav. At this point I will move to the
3	Chairwoman's Report. On November 3rd. we had our
4	Board retreat, one of Michael, as a
5	chairperson. he is to keep the Board of Trustees
6	fully informed so they can make better decisions.
7	We had the Deputv Counsel from SUNY. She had an
8	opportunity to New York State Education Law and
9	Community College Regulations. I thought it was
10	verv productive. There was a sermon at the end of
11	the retreat, and for the most part, people wished
12	to have more information or a follow-up in the
13	spring. So we will be working on that shortly.
14	We also received from ACCT, the opportunity
15	to submit a grant proposal. It's called a Trust
16	Fund Board Grant. It's for the amount of
17	\$10.000. I know some of vou Board of Trustees
18	received that e-mail. And as a result, we reached
19	out to the college and Lori and Chris and
20	President McKav helped us put together a
21	proposal. And this point I would like someone to
22	tell us more about it. You have a copy of it in
23	front of vou. It is due tomorrow. I just got the
24	e-mail that said by midnight tomorrow we must
25	submit the proposal. So feedback is appreciated

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UNKNOWN SPEAKER: This is an annual grant sponsored by the ACCT. As the Chairwoman said, it's a \$10.000 grant. The organization is looking for projects that incorporate three components: Innovation; impact, a broad impact across many Board members: and scalability, something that can be taken beyond the initial project to nationwide.

The proposal that you have in front of you proposes a web-based site for access by the Board members. It would be a secured site that will centralize three major components. One would be a web-based site for access to professional development opportunities, another would be centralized college-related resources, such as the bylaws, the college budget, anything that the Board may need to reference in its work on behalf of the college, and then finally the most innovative portion would be the social networking capability for enhanced communication and interaction among Board members in between their monthly meetings. And also, as part of their committee work, they will be able to share

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In terms of the scalability, we're looking to work with the New York Community College Trustees

Organization to bring this model statewide to all of the members of all the Boards in the state, and also, hopefully to enable statewide dialogue among Community College Board of Trustees.

As the Chairwoman said, it is due tomorrow. It's a very short turnaround time. I will say historically, the ACCT Organization has given the grant to either a community college board of trustees association or a district, so it's important that we have this New York CCT Organization to show that we're looking to do a statewide initiative, which I think will be looked on very favorably by the Review Committee.

If there are any questions. I will be happy to answer them.

MS. CHAIRWOMAN: I know that a lot of times we do not have the opportunity to attend the different conferences at the state or national level. and I think this is a great opportunity for us to. again. continue to be fully informed and to continue the dialogue. not just amongst ourselves.

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but with the other 350 trustees across the state. I think President McKay, Lori and all the staff who put this together in such a short time is greatly appreciated. So if you want to take a look at it at your convenience and get back to us before noon tomorrow, that will be great. it will part of the year and hopefully statewide and another opportunity to be pioneers in the state.

DR. McKAY: The pioneering of times are a wonderful thing. But certainly, when we look at this, no other system has planned what we've done here. I met with George and Lori and a couple of us to sort of bring this up, and Lou and others. Jeff as well. The repository could allow the trustee to be at home and if you want to be on the computer and you click on one of the media pieces and just the review of a targeted subject. And what hope to do afterwards, after today's meeting, is reach out to Mary Adams over at Nassau to get a letter of support from NYCCT saving that they will be willing to scale up this approach to a statewide model. I guess we're the first in the country. We haven't seen anything like this. We

1 2 just developed this ourselves for the trustees. 3 It's a recommendation. If you see any items that we have not added that we should add, please share 4 5 that with us and we'll make the changes and get it 6 submitted on behalf of the Board tomorrow, by the 7 deadline. MS. 3 DR. McKAY: Thank vou.

I just want to inform the members of the 4 5 Board that we have concluded a series of town hall meetings of all three campuses and certainly 6 7 Walter's sentiments we've heard were similar and a few of the things we will be working on as well. 8 I also want to thank Ellen again. We have a lot 9 of work ahead of us. Ellen and Kevin and Tom and 10 11 others who advocate with us and certainly most of vou. We're entering a very difficult budget cycle 12 13 and certainly require a lot of negotiation. 14 vear for the first time we are working as a unified group in Albany. In the past, we would 15 16 lobby on different dates with different documents and most often we were lobbying against 17 18 ourselves. Now we're working together as a unit. I believe that this year, for the first time, the 19 20 Governor's office will be hearing from all sectors 21 with one message and the focal point is on 2.2 community colleges. So that's what will be advancing at this year. 23

I want to ask Phil to step forward for a minute. The last time we talked about Middle

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2	States it was on warning and getting us off
3	warning. We've been working recently on a
4	periodic review report that is due July 1. I want
5	Phil to just walk us through the process involved.
6	where it is now, and the timelines.
7	Phil. do vou want to take us through this?
8	MR. EPSTEIN: Good morning. As many of you
9	know. Suffolk County Community College is
10	accredited by the Middle State's Commissioner of
11	Higher Education. That accreditation both ensures
12	the integrity of our programs. our degrees and our
13	certificates, and also the eligibility of our
14	students for federal title for funding for
15	Financial Aid and various grant programs. So it's
16	critical to the health of the institution.
17	Our last self-study visit was in 2007. A
18	team came to the campus. And as Dr. McKav
19	indicated a moment ago, by in large, the college
20	received accolades. in particular for a process
21	that involved over 150 members of our community.
22	It was broad-based It was collaborative and dug

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2	June of 2012, we are required to submit a midpoint
3	report, that is midpoint between 2007 and our next
4	accreditation visit in 2017. Middle States
5	defines this as an accreditation event. which has
6	three components to it. As a midpoint report, it
7	is retrospective in that we are invited to look
8	back over the last five vears and to assess how
9	we're doing, how far have we come as an
10	institution. particularly in the areas of concern
11	or recommendation that were first voiced during
12	that team visit. We are asked to looked at our
13	current operations. We are also asked to take a
14	prospective look at where we would like to be five
15	vears from now, and as we look strategically
16	towards the next five vears. what will be some of
17	the significant challenges or opportunities that
18	we will be facing in moving forward as an
19	institution of excellence.
20	When Dr. McKav pulled together a group of
21	leadership from this institution to begin the
22	process of looking at the periodic review report.
23	he gave us a very strong charge. He said to the
24	Committee, I not only want you to look at all of

the recommendations that came from Middle States.

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but I also want vou to look at all of the concerns 2 and recommendations that came internally. 3 T must tell vou, Middle States was much easier on us than 4 5 We are much better at criticing our own 6 shortcomings and we're quite comfortable often 7 talking about them. While Middle States gave us four recommendations, our own colleagues gave us 8 60 or 70 recommendations and concerns to look at. 9 And Dr. McKay said, I want the team to look at all 10 11 of these, and we have.

The first part of the periodic review report to be completed is a summary of the process of going through and responding to each of those concerns and recommendations. And later this week Dr. McKav is going to be sending an invitation to all members of the college community to visit at MvSCC. the home page, a draft of this document so that all of us who are involved with this institution, whatever our capacity, have an opportunity to read the document and to provide feedback to us. This is open. This is a collaborative process. We don't want anyone not to know what's going on. We want them to be engaged and we want them to be involved.

2	As a second piece of this process, we're
3	going to be holding a forum next week on Wednesday
4	in our Distance Learning classrooms at all three
5	campuses. And also, members of the Periodic
6	Review Committee will be invited to each of the
7	campus governance sessions. Next week we will be
8	at Congress at the Eastern Campus on Tuesday. We
9	will be at the Ammerman Center on Wednesdav, and
10	then a week later we will be at the Grant Campus
11	Assembly. So we're getting the message out and
12	individuals will have a wonderful opportunity to
13	respond to the report in its current forum.
14	A similar process will be engaged in the

A similar process will be engaged in the spring, at which point the other pieces of the PRR will also be folded into the report. There's a section on challenges and opportunities, which will grow in part out of the summary report. There's a section on planning and budget development. There's a section that we're working on on finance and enrollment. All of these pieces will be folded into the report. There will be a second final review. And following a review by Dr. McKay, by the Board of Trustees, the document will be approved and forwarded to the Middle State

2	Association with a due date of June 1st.
3	DR. McKAY: This, again, is a very pivotal
4	document for the college nationally. The whole
5	discussion of student persistence. student
6	success, what colleges are being faced with.
7	financial and academia. There are campuses that
8	are closing programs. There are so many things
9	happening across different parts of the country.
10	We certainly have regarded what we have done. as
11	Walter mentioned. but it's good to look at who we
12	are so that as we assess what we do. we can look
13	at things that we can strengthen and the things we
14	need to focus on as an institution and also
15	looking forward as to what we should be engaged
16	with when going forward. The entire college
17	community is involved in this process. And I want
18	to commend Phil and Dan Sheppard and the entire
19	team for working on this report and we will get
20	that to vou after the college community had a
21	chance to really take a look and provide
22	recommendations and we will forward that to vou so
23	vou can at least give us vour recommendations and
24	observations as well, and then we submit that to
25	Middle States.

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2	Anv questions on that document?
3	(No response.)
4	DR. McKAY: Thank vou.
5	I also want to take time to applaud the
6	Ammerman Campus math team. As vou know, there's a
7	statewide math competition and the Ammerman Campus
8	math team placed first. That is a major, major
9	award for the students that are in the
10	competition. because vou have a statewide
11	competition, vou have a regional competition. And
12	I saw vesterdav that thev won the math
13	competition. Similarly, a program we have at the
14	college was featured on the National Foundation
15	front page for the work that's being done here at
16	Suffolk. So there's a lot to be proud of. and I
17	think at this time of the vear when we celebrate a
18	lot of the things. we're going to celebrate our
19	students and our facultv and the fine work that
20	thev do here at the college.
21	Dr. Mazzarelli started last week and we
22	welcome her again. I know it's been a verv busv
23	week for her, a verv engaging week. We certainly
24	certainly certain embrace her because some of
25	mv desk has been shifted to hers. But certainly

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2	in regards to just moving along, her associate for
3	vice president of Academic and Affairs search is
4	on the wav and that closes in Januarv. ACCT is
5	still working at that with us. and however anv
6	chance to work with them on getting her a deputy.
7	And for the legal deputy general counsel, that
8	search is certainly on the way. Certainly, you
9	will get from us two packets very shortly once the
10	searches are completed.

We worked with the collegewide community on an academic calendar from now through the fall of 2014. I believe it was. We have the unions, we have all the faculty, the Calendar Committee, everyone looked at it. It's a very complex thing to develop, an academic calendar that will focus on allowing the students to have more seat time, more face time and to cut back on the breaks between the academic calendar, and we were able to get that resolved a week ago. So that's going to go into the catalog as we speak.

This afternoon we're meeting with the Strategic Design Planning Committee. That is another element that was decided in Middle States. We're meeting around 3:45 on this campus

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2	to go through a process. A lot of work has been
3	done in that area and we hope that with this
4	afternoon's meeting it will take us to the next
5	level of the planning process. We will be coming
6	to vou at some point in time with the draft of
7	institutional goals that came out of all that
8	work. The mission we envision, as we discussed at
9	the last meeting, was reviewed by the college
10	community and also the SPC Committee and was
11	brought forward. That has already been advanced.
12	Now we will work on the institutional goals. That
13	will come to vou and we'll brief vou on that and
14	give vou time to review them before thev're placed
15	for approval and adoption by the Board. That will
16	happen early spring semester.
17	That's all I have on mv end. Are there anv
18	questions? If not, I wish vou all a happy
19	holidav. I will see some of vou at the Facultv

MS. CHAIRWOMAN: Thank vou.

Association event on Fridav and I'm looking

forward to another successful year. Thank you.

MR. MANGUAL: Just to sav. the food event

2	that took place on November 20th, it was a pretty
3	successful event. Mainly, I think the student
4	participation was major. We had members of the
5	Business Club put in a lot of time, vou know,
6	learning how to run an event of this nature.
7	which, of course, is a not-for-profit. I kind of
8	tugged on Belinda's ear enough because she kind of
9	maiors in this. We took the kids out. They did
10	cold calls. They did sales pitches to other
11	business to give donations towards raffles and
12	things of that nature for the event. We also had
13	a lot of them come out. probably 30 to 40
14	volunteers came out, students to come and help
15	with the food, help with the event. A whole other
16	list of students came out to participate in the
17	races. We had a mile and a half and a mile and a
18	half come out because that took place inside by
19	South Side, plus a walk event. All these took
20	place with prizes for everybody who came in. You
21	know, as well, we collected about four table
22	lengths' worth of donated food, not to include the
23	frozen turkevs and other items that came in as
24	well. We haven't calculated exactly how much that
25	would have been, but, vou know, we're still

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2	working on that number. It was pretty successful.
3	though. I was a little disappointed. I wanted
4	like 3,000 people to come out. We were knocking
5	on 300. I think, as far as the registration forms
6	went

I do want to thank the members of the Board that showed up here and showed their support. had members of also the President's Cabinet also show up, faculty members that came, appreciative of everybody. And also just to bring us -- the President said the math team did their thing. also had the flag football people from all three campuses' teams. They did very well. Thev participated. They had a great time. Some of the students came with a bunch of feedback how they a great time and experience of going to the University of Marvland and meeting. Our actual team here played against Morehouse. they had a great time talking trash across the field, whatever the case is. But Selden did place in the final round and like the last day. So that's just another piece. That's it.

DR. McKAY: If I can just ask John Corrado -
this morning Trustee Sanders is at an event at the

Oheka Castle where (inaudible) and I worked on to support that event and that's why she isn't here today. But John just came back. He accepted the award on behalf of the college.

John. would vou mind just saving a few words on that?

MR. CORRADO: Yes. The only downside was I told my daughter I was going to work until I'm 100 so she can get married there. It's an incredible yenue. It was very nice. Thank you.

MS. CHAIRWOMAN: I also wanted to add that I did have the opportunity to attend the event that

MR. MANGUAL: I used to work at that place.

25 trustee Manqual organized. I thought it was verv

1 2 well organized and very, very successful. You did 3 a great job and also all the students. I believe 4 that that was the first time that that was 5 organized. So hopefully it will become a 6 tradition. 7 MR. MANGUAL: Hopefully, ves. We're already talking of plans for next year. Speaking, as a 8 matter of fact, Dr. Puter (phonetic) and I 9 actually made mention that he would like to see it 10 11 happen at both campuses at least to see something a lot bigger involved. 12 13 DR. McKAY: At all three? 14 MR. MANGUAL: That would be ideal. 15 MR. MATTACE: I also attended the 16 Manufacturing with Trustee Mangual and Trustee Hazlitt. I thought it was very impressive. 17 18 thought it showed what we can do for the community, not only for our students, but for the 19 20 residents. I was able to attend the CNN Black in 2.1 America No. 4. I enjoyed it in the sense that it 2.2 was very informative. Trustee Sanders made the

presentation and put it on. I wish there were

more people there to see and appreciate what's

happening. And I also attended the town hall

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2	meetings at the Ammerman campus. I'd love to see
3	that presented here, but we only have so many
4	hours in a dav. If we put that on the table once
5	a month, some of our trustees might get upset.

Lastly. I was hoping Trustee Fenchel was here. I'd like to express to the Chairwoman my concerns about when we talked about in the minutes about having the Budget Committee with all nine members. First, we can't do all nine members because you can't have more than five. I would like to volunteer on it. And he suggested that we start small and start streamlining it and because of all the information we've gotten over the last two months on traveling expenses. I think we should start with that, as a suggestion.

MS. CHAIRWOMAN: I appreciate vour concern and vour suggest as per our or my understanding was that the Budget Committee is the only committee that all ten trustees are to be part of. Can you clarify that?

MR. MANGUAL: That's correct.

MS. CHAIRWOMAN: That's the reason why it is the way it is.

MR. MATTACE: That's fine.

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2	MS. CHAIRWOMAN: So we all have the
3	opportunity to participate.
4	Is there anvthing else?
5	MR. LILLY: One of the resolutions we voted
6	on was the accepting a donation from the Estate of
7	Cathv DeBellis. I just wanted to give
8	recognition. It was almost \$70.000. That's it.
9	MS. CHAIRWOMAN: That was a verv generous
10	donation. I understand that the other half of her
11	will was donated to Saint Joseph's as well.
12	DR. McKAY: Her daughter attended the college
13	and was an alum and also at Saint Joseph's. Her
14	daughter unfortunately passed before her and then
15	she passed, but in her will she had donations.
16	MS. CHAIRWOMAN: At this time I'd like to
17	MS. ALVAREZ-GRONEMAN: I just have one thing.
18	MS. CHAIRWOMAN: Sure. I'm sorrv.
19	MS. ALVAREZ-GRONEMAN: That's okav.
20	Once again, vou did a great job at the Turkey
21	Trot. I actually met Marvanne Ellinger and she
2.2	actually gave me some information for you if, in

fact. vou and whoever else decides to do this next

vear, about having a separate account with what

vou're looking to do. Thanksgiving Day Trot of

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2	Long Island gave out 600 hot meals. I want to
3	thank Anthonv for showing up and for participating
4	in our efforts.
5	This evening. I have a holidav concert at
6	Pronto. I do have information if anybody is
7	interested in attending. I know that someone
8	asked me if I'm still the president. The answer
9	is, ves, I am still president of Pronto. I want
10	to tell everybody here to a great holiday and
11	thank vou again for everybody who has supported me
12	with mv efforts with Pronto.
13	MS. CHAIRWOMAN: We are happy you are still
14	the president.
15	(Laughing.)
16	MS. CHAIRWOMAN: Thank vou.
17	Anvbodv else?
18	(No response.)
19	MS. CHAIRWOMAN: At this I would just motion
20	to adiourn.
21	MR. HAZLITT: So moved.
