3	these resolutions yesterday,
4	disappointed about the timing, but I
5	would like to acknowledge these
6	resolutions are important and
7	significant to the college and
8	because of that we'll take a vote.
9	Can we please have someone reporting
10	on this significant resolution?
11	DR. McKAY: Absolutely, Madam
12	Chair. I'll ask that Executive
13	President George Gatta at this point
14	speak on both resolutions to the full
15	Board.
16	DR. GATTA: Good morning.
17	First, with respect to 2012.24 goals
18	I think it will be important to
19	follow-up on the presentation and
20	briefings that I provided at the last
21	two Board meetings to share with the
22	Board where we are at this point and
23	what the road ahead looks like in
24	terms of adopting the plan.
25	Certainly the adoption of the

2	institutional goals is a major
3	component within that process. Just
4	to quickly recap the college
5	community affirmed our mission and
6	vision statements, which were adopted
7	a number of years ago, back in
8	October. Following that the
9	Strategic Planning Council
LO	immediately began reviewing
11	discussion of drafting institutional
L2	goals. These are goals developed
L3	back in 2007, 2008. It involved the
L 4	Strategic Planning Council at the
15	time, a broad-based committee of
16	faculty and staff and administrators
L7	in the college, also there is student
L8	input along the way in the adoption
L 9	of those interim goals. The
20	Strategic Planning Council broke into
21	working groups, discussed them in
22	different settings on two different
23	dates, made some suggestions, and
24	those goals were forwarded to the
2.5	college community and the college

2	president in January when the
3	semester and the students came back
4	and the faculty came back from the
5	semester break.
6	We also engaged in a future
7	planning workshop which met following
8	the January meeting for a couple of
9	days. That set the Foundation on a
10	number of the individual data
11	gathering elements for the overall
12	future plan. We have a document in
13	front of you called Groups of the
L 4	Strategic Planning Council and
15	Planning Timeline. That goes through
16	each of the elements of the data
L 7	gathering starting with focus groups.
18	This is to report that the focus
19	groups have been conducted on all
20	three campuses. We have also reached
21	out to external constituencies and
22	that report is complete and is posted
23	on the college website.
24	We do plan on utilizing focus
25	groups on an ongoing basis to ensure

2	our plan is up to date and that it's
3	relevant, and we're hearing what our
4	constituents, both internal and
5	external, are feeling and thinking
6	and giving us input regarding our
7	operations here at the college.
8	Second, the Environmental
9	Scanning Data Gathering Report should
10	be finished by the end of this week.
11	We did have a meeting yesterday and
12	there are a couple of small elements
13	that need to be finalized for that
14	into quantitative data gathering
15	associated with the overall scanning
16	that we're doing.
17	SWAT report threats
18	document. That work was done and the
19	groundwork was laid back at the
20	Strategic Planning Workshop in
21	January when we brought in external
22	consultants that worked with about 60
23	faculty staff and administrators to
24	lay the groundwork for the SWAT
25	analysis. That work continues and

3	the end of this month.
4	Turning to the second page,
5	we have a working group currently
6	that convened yesterday working on
7	drafting institutional objectives.
8	That would be the next step following
9	the adoption of the institutional
10	goals which we hope the Board will do
11	today.
12	Finally, the last element
13	would be a gap analysis group that
14	will be working, they will take the
15	draft of the institutional objectives
16	and quantify the measurable
17	objectives so we can assess where we
18	are and move forward, and they will
19	work those drafts organizational
20	and at that point we'll be able to
21	share them with faculty governments
22	and consult with, seek input and the
23	adoption of our work by faculty
24	governments is one of the reasons is
25	why you're receiving the resolution

2	this morning on institutional goals
3	was that the draft goals went to all
4	three government's bodies. The
5	Eastern Campus adopted it about two
6	weeks ago, the Grant Campus about two
7	weeks. The Ammerman Campus has some
8	questions. They did not adopt it,
9	they tabled it at their meeting about
LO	two weeks ago. They reconvened in a
11	special meeting on Tuesday afternoon.
12	At that point the goals were
13	unanimously approved by the Ammerman
L 4	Campus.
15	So, that's where we are at this
16	point. We anticipate switching back
L7	to the objective, the objective to go
18	to the Strategic Planning Council at
19	their meeting in May. Assuming that
20	the Planning Council is comfortable
21	with them, recommend them going
22	forward and then send them back to
23	the governments at all three
24	campuses, but recognizing that we are
2.5	at the end of the semester we

2	anticipate the governments will not
3	be able to fully deliberate and
4	consider those objectives until they
5	reconvene in the fall semester at
6	which point following their review
7	their input will be forwarded to the
8	Board.
9	So, that's the overall process
10	of where we are in terms of the
11	strategic plan and the reason why the
12	institutional goals and objectives
13	came through today. It was only on
14	Tuesday that the Ammerman Campus
15	finally endorsed it.
16	THE CHAIRWOMAN: Are the
17	institutional goals different from
18	the prior institutional goals?
19	DR. GATTA: The overall
20	categories are exactly the same. I
21	do have a document here that shows
22	you side by side what the draft goals
23	were that we're working under. There
24	are very minor changes, not in the
2.5	overall categories of the goals, but

2	in some of the descriptive language
3	that it describes, that describes the
4	goals.
5	If you look at the first goal
6	student success there is some wording
7	in terms of the first goals sound
8	academic and student services.
9	The new language says excellent add
10	rigorous academic programs and
11	(inaudible) student services. You
12	get to the second one is community
13	goals site and improvement. It takes
14	out the word college, just leaves the
15	words social and economic government.
16	Community we serve, community meaning
17	the entire community both college and
18	regional community. When you look at
19	access and affordability the temporal
20	barriers where temporal is changed to
21	time barriers. Number four, instead
22	of monitoring and improve the levels
23	of success that's monitor and
24	impress the institution to
25	interpret to ensure continuous

2	improvement. Based on input from
3	faculty there were some additional
4	words were added resolution. You
5	will see at the end of number four
6	with input from faculty governors it
7	now reads monitoring assessment
8	performance of the institution to
9	ensure continuous improvement goals
10	of the college. There is a minor
11	change under communication. Those
12	are the basic differences.
13	THE CHAIRWOMAN: I know that
14	one of the commitments that the
15	College has is diversity. How would
16	that be addressed with these
17	institutional goals?
18	DR. GATTA: If we look at the
19	input from the focus groups, and
20	there were upwards of 300 individuals
21	within the college participating, one
22	of the themes that came up in terms
23	of the strength of the institution is
24	diversity, and that information will
) E	he accounted for ac we develop the

2	institutional objectives, not just
3	the objectives but the action plans,
4	the initiatives, the various
5	projects, that we use to support the
6	achievement of the objective that
7	supports the goal that also supports
8	the vision. So, diversity is
9	certainly something that is embedded
10	in the SWAT analysis and focus groups
11	in terms of strengths of the
12	institution and may even be special
13	needs within that area. So, that's
14	how we address it.
15	THE CHAIRWOMAN: So under which
16	goal would it come?
17	DR. GATTA: It would probably
18	be under every goal.
19	THE CHAIRWOMAN: Did I hear
20	correctly you said that is a
21	strength?
22	DR. GATTA: Absolutely.
23	Regarding the second resolution
24	to award contracts for the renovation
25	of the Southampton Building this is a

2	project that we received bids from
3	the four contractors on Monday.
4	Those bids were reviewed. They were
5	within budget. Three of the four
6	contractors we had worked with in the
7	past and have had a very good
8	positive working relationship with
9	them. The fourth we are aware of,
LO	they have done many public works
11	projects. While we have not worked
12	with them we checked references and
13	made sure that everything in the
L 4	submission was in order, and when
15	that was completed on Tuesday
L6	afternoon that's when the resolution
L7	was drafted and forwarded, presented
18	to Counsel so that it can be
L 9	submitted. In the past because of
20	timing issues this project needs to
21	be completed this summer. The
22	Southampton Building is in use every
23	semester. It is not a building we
24	can shut down for a semester or a
25	wear due to renovation. The

2	renovation is to install central air
3	conditioning, to make modifications
4	in terms of ADA requirements. There
5	will be new ceilings. There will be,
6	for the first time, a new fire
7	distinguishing system for the
8	building, new windows, for the first
9	time in its existence since 1975 or
10	so. So, it is a major renovation.
11	It needs to be done this summer. It
12	needs to be ready to go by the end of
13	August, and given a timeline of how
14	projects progress rather than
15	submitting this to the Executive
16	Committee for the Executive
17	Committee's approval and then
18	following the application by the
19	Board since we have all the
20	information we felt it important to
21	get it to the Board today so that we
22	can work on some of the items that
23	require extensive lead time for the
24	applications of the building.
25	THE CHAIRWOMAN: Questions?

3	First, on the institutional
4	goals resolution talking in terms of
5	the different goals, quite frankly
6	these seem to be very broad
7	platitudes to do good things. We're
8	resolving to do good things? I fail
9	to see the whole concept on the
10	resolution.
11	DR. GATTA: The goals are the
12	overall of the institution. As I
13	mentioned the next steps are to craft
14	objectives to ensure that we achieve
15	the goals and support the mission and
16	vision which are already in place.
17	So, they are lofty, they are broad
18	based, but they are the collective
19	recommendations of the entire college
20	community. We communicated with not
21	just faculty government, we've been
22	on campuses, we talked to students,
23	we've talked to faculty, we've talked
24	to administrators, and this is the
25	recommendation from the college

3	TRUSTEE FENCHEL: Were there
4	any budget considerations taken into
5	account with these grand goals?
6	DR. GATTA: Absolutely. When
7	you look at access and affordability
8	affordability goes to the bottom line
9	of the institution. How do we
10	achieve our mission of being open and
11	affordability, have open access,
12	serving the entire population that
13	can benefit from a higher education
14	provided by this college and maintain
15	affordability? That's tied directly
16	to the budget, and as the president
17	briefs you on budgets going forward
18	you will see that we are very, very
19	committed to maintaining
20	affordability.
21	TRUSTEE FENCHEL: Then what are
22	we voting for? We're voting to make
23	education more affordable? Is there
24	anybody in the United States of
25	America who wants to make education

2	less affordable? I don't understand
3	what the whole purpose of the
4	resolutions are other than to say we
5	want to do as much as we can. It
6	seems so amorphus and platitudedness
7	(sic), if there is such a word.
8	DR. GATTA: Again, this is part
9	of the planning process. As you
10	begin to see the measurable
11	objectives that can support the goals
12	you will be voting on something that
13	is much more concrete, much more
14	quantitative, much more will be
15	measurable, and in fact, will set the
16	structure over the next five years in
17	terms of how do we achieve our
18	mission.
19	TRUSTEE FENCHEL: So it
20	seems whether this resolution is
21	passed or not is meaningless.
22	DR. GATTA: No, we really can't
23	go forward with the planning process
24	until the Board endorses the
25	institutional goals

2	TRUSTEE FENCHEL: It seems the
3	institutional goals are set.
4	DR. McKAY: If I can interject
5	for a minute, Trustee Fenchel.
6	Part of the accreditation
7	process, when we went back to 2007 it
8	indicated that we needed to have
9	institutional goals that are aligned
10	with the mission and vision of the
11	college, that sets a clear direct
12	pathway at the micro level, and the
13	entire college community both
14	internal and external were involved
15	in the process. This is a
16	recommendation for the Board. That
17	is part of the process. It is only a
18	recommendation. The Board does have
19	the opportunity, if it so determines,
20	to make an adjustment to the
21	language. However, by June 1st when
22	we submit the periodic review report
23	which one of the items that needed to
24	be addressed was the institutional
25	goals hegause we did not have those

2	before, we were told in a report that
3	we need to have institutional goals
4	and submit it back. That is what
5	drives the planning process of the
6	college. That is what helps the
7	direction of the institution as DR.
8	GATTA suggests. It is the beginning
9	process either at the very core of
10	the institution. It's the light,
11	mission and vision. The very next
12	steps that we are going to go
13	through. Which will talk about
L 4	objective and action plans and
15	everything else, that will be more
16	specific and it will go right back to
17	these items that we have before us.
18	All institutions of higher education
19	do submit these to the accrediting
20	bodies, and certainly the Board sets
21	the direction for the college, and
22	this is one of the many items that
23	the Board will review and either
24	adjust or recommend changes, but we
25	work from these documents to kind of

3	TRUSTEE FENCHEL: It seems to
4	me the purpose of this resolution is
5	simply that Midstates can check off
6	that we have given them the
7	resolution that we have these
8	grandiose which we have which
9	are inherent in the institution any
10	way. It is just a matter of
11	bureaucratic requirement by Midstates
12	or some other supervisory body. It
13	almost seems like it's a vote which
14	is an exercise in vacuisisms
15	(phonetic spelling). How you vote
16	against it? It doesn't matter even
17	if you vote for it. Is there anybody
18	that would be against these wonderful
19	goals? What is there to modify, what
20	is there to say no to? Sure you want
21	education for most people, you want
22	education to be effective. Think
23	about the negative. Could it be
24	possibly put in something that we
25	want education to be unaffordable

3	Midstates wants, fine, but it seems
4	it is essentially bureaucratic
5	exercise.
6	SPEAKER: I may add it effects
7	the credibility of the institution.
8	We are saying that there are five or
9	six institutional goals that we
10	certainly want to accomplish. Now at
11	the end of time of the day or period
12	of the five years did we do that, and
13	if we did do that how much can we
14	show creating the body, based on
15	data, based on evidence, that we can
16	make a compelling argument, yet we
17	were able to accomplish that goal and
18	this is how we did it, and this is
19	the elements to establish the fact
20	that we did it. It's a matter of
21	institutional integrity. I think
22	you're right that the way the
23	resolution says it only asks the
24	Board headed, but in the final
25	analysis of the thing is we have to

3	say we have, in fact, as an
4	institution that we have accomplished
5	that goal.

11	SPEAKER: That's my point,
12	correct.
13	TRUSTEE FENCHEL: So, why is it
14	even before the Board? But that
15	being so apparently Midstates has its
16	bureaucratic requirements. I
17	understand why it's being done purely
18	for bureaucracy. Is has no
19	substance. So, that is the extent of
20	my inquiry. It seems to be something
21	which I don't understand why there
22	would be a resolution. I don't
23	understand why there is anything in
24	there that requires a judgement. It
25	is a resolution that's, it's a

12	to give. This ensures that we're
13	saying to those that we lead, and

20	responsibilities are to give
21	direction to the college. I look at
22	number four, institutional
23	effectiveness, is probably the key
24	one out of all of them in a sense
25	that it really gives direction to

19	sentence is what I call it. But my
20	point is I think whether we agree
21	with the goals themselves, or we
22	think they're shallow, or whether
23	it's a piece of cheesecloth we pull
24	the water out of the other end the
25	bottom line comes out that there are

3	an important one, because it says to
4	us and the community and to the

12	shallow, it can be considered weak,
13	it can be considered a lot of things.

20	the staff has to fall back on or the
21	president. Sometimes we agree and
22	sometimes we don't. I think there is

19	judgeable.

21	Hazlitt?
22	TRUSTEE HAZLITT: I agree with
23	everything you said, but the process
24	is that what's followed here gives
25	everybody in this institution an

25	will be presenting them to the Board

12	graduating from Long Island high

19	reviewing all the expenditures, like
20	this year we're down about \$3,000,000
21	in expenditures based on what we

24	do that evaluating, but that's an
25	ongoing process.

6	indicated a 2.5 percent reduction be

10	first give the numerical value of 2.5
11	percent. Jim, the number was?
12	V.P. AMOROSO: 2.6 translates
13	into about 3.15 million dollars

11	seeing different numbers coming out
12	of that. That would certainly impact
13	our projections. We are hoping to
14	have an early budget from the state.
15	Certainly that would change how we
16	present our projections in regards to
17	both expenses and revenues going
18	forward. On the enrollment side our
19	IE office and Student Effectiveness
20	office constantly looks at the number
21	of the students graduating from what
22	high school, what district, and the
23	projection of those students that
24	will attend Suffolk over a period of
25	years. There's a lot of analysis, in

3	there. We're constantly monitoring
4	that. We're looking at the number of
5	students that potentially will

12	consideration and subsequent adoption

L2	those students do have awards from
L3	other institutions to leave early?
L 4	That is part of the recruitment

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
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
