WHEREAS, said Agreement has been set down in a Stipulation of Agreement (Attachment III), and

WHEREAS, such Agreement has been ratified by the Guild of Administrative Officers, and

WHEREAS, the College President recommends the approval of this Agreement, be it therefore,

RESOLVED, that the Agreement among the College, County of Suffolk and the Guild of Administrative Officers of Suffolk Community College be and the same is hereby approved.

STIPULATION OF AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE COUNTY OF SUFFOLK, SUFFOLK COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE AND THE GUILD OF ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICERS OF

SUFFOLK COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE

Stipulation of Agreement made and entered into this __day of July 2016 by and between the County of Suffolk ("the County"), Suffolk County Community College ("the College") and the Guild of Administrative Officers of Suffolk County Community College ("Guild").

1. Term of Agreement: The provisions of the Guild of Administrative Officers bargaining unit will be pursuant to the 1991-1997 Collective Negotiations Agreement, as updated by the 1997-2001 Stipulation of Agreement, as updated by the 2001-2002 Stipulation of Agreement, as updated by the 2002-2005 Stipulation of Agreement, as updated by the 2011-2015 Stipulation of Agreement, all of which are memorialized and updated in the draft collective bargaining agreement sent to the Guild on November 7, 2015, which will then be modified pursuant to the terms of this 2015-2019 Agreement. For convenience only, the references below to "Article" and "Paragraph" will be to the 2015 Agreement. The collective bargaining agreement is extended for a period of four years, from September 1, 2015 up to and including August 31, 2019, in all of its terms and conditions except as specifically modified herein.

2. Article II (Wages and Salary Schedules: (Guild Salary Plan, Faculty Base and Stipend Schedules)):

Effective February 1, 2016, the full-time salary schedules and the schedule of stipends, including Excellence in Education, will be increased by 1.5% at each step.

Effective February 1, 2017, the full-time salary schedules and the schedule of stipends, including Excellence in Education, will be increased by an additional 2% at each step.

Effective August 31, 2018, the full-time salary schedules and the schedule of stipends, including Excellence in Education, will be increased by an additional 2% at each step.

Effective August 31, 2019, the full-time salary schedules and the schedule of stipends, including Excellence in Education, will be increased by an additional 2.5% at each step.

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Amend Article II, Salary for all new employees as follows:

Paragraph 1, Salary, provide that, effective for all employees hired into the Guild unit on or after the date on which the new Agreement is fully ratified and approved, the salary schedule will be amended to add a new starting salary for Category IV that will be 1% less than that for the corresponding steps in the salary schedule for those hired before that date.

In addition, the starting salary for Category III will be 3% less than that for the corresponding steps in the salary schedule for those hired before that date.

In addition, the starting salary for Categories I and II will be 5% less than that for the corresponding steps in the salary schedule for those hired before that date.

For all Categories, the reduced starting salaries will be denoted as the "starting salary" and a new Step 1 will be added that will be permanently equidistant between the new starting salary and Step 2.

All employees hired into the Guild unit on or after the date on which the 2015-2019 Agreement is fully ratified and approved will remain in the starting salary for a minimum of 24 complete calendar months before becoming eligible to move to the next step; *i.e.*, the new Step 1, on September 1. Employees will become eligible to move to the succeeding steps on the September 1 occurring on or after the completion of the next 24 consecutive calendar month period. Step movement beyond Step 6 will occur after the completion of each subsequent 12 calendar month period; *i.e.*, on September 1.

4. Lag Payroll:

The Guild agrees to the implementation of a lag payroll of a reduction in pay of 6.3% of the gross pay before any deductions for each pay period commencing with the August 28, 2017 pay period and continuing until the end of the pay period in which the amount deferred in total by all full-time Guild members equals \$1,000,000.

The lag payroll will be implemented as follows:

- a) Commencing with the August 28, 2017 pay period, all Employees will have deferred 6.3% of their gross bi-weekly paycheck, before any deductions, excluding overload, are made. The bi-weekly amount deferred will include faculty base pay plus stipend or bi-weekly pay based upon the Guild salary plan. This reduction will remain in effect until the end of the pay period in which the amount deferred in total by all full-time Guild unit members equals \$1,000,000.
- b) Nothing herein will be construed as otherwise diminishing any salary or other contractual benefit set forth in the current collective bargaining agreement.

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- c) All monies due to employees and which are deferred by the implementation of the lag payroll will be paid to the employees as follows:
 - i. Employees will receive from the College any deferred monies due to them upon separation from employment.
 - ii. Deferred monies will be paid to the affected Employees at the salary rate of pay in effect when it was earned.
- d) While the parties intend for the deferral to be pension neutral, they agree that only the Retirement System can make that determination, and that affected Employees will be bound by the Retirement System's determination. If a determination is adverse to an affected Employee, then the parties will meet to discuss whether and how to address that determination on a unit-wide basis.

5. Adjuncts: (Article II, 6.):

Wages and Salary Schedules: Adjunct/Overload Rate will be increased at the same time and in the same amounts as the full-time salary schedules.

6. Article II, 8 (b) Evening Coverage:

Effective September 1, 2016, amend to provide that coverage will be provided through adjustment of hours on the day of the evening assignment.

7. Article III, Conditions of Employment:

A Labor-Management Committee will be formed consisting of the College President or designee, one additional member designated by the College President, the Guild President or designee and one additional member designated by the Guild President to study and provide a recommendation to the parties by no later than August 31, 2017, with regard to addressing the inequity for Chairs and Assistant Chairs of large departments compared to Chairs and Assistant Chairs of small departments. Any recommendation will be non-binding until it is reduced to writing and ratified by the College President and the Guild President.

Article V, Paid Holidays:

Delete Paragraph 4.

9. Article VI, Insurance:

Delete Paragraph 6.

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10. Article IX, Other Benefits:

- a) Amend Paragraph 4 (Overtime) to change "All employees listed in Group I of the Stipend Schedule" to "Guild members working in Facilities and Maintenance, Security and Networking and Telecommunications."
- b) Amend Paragraph 2 (Conference Attendance): effective September 1, 2016, increase by \$200. Effective September 1, 2017, increase by an additional \$100.
- c) Amend Paragraph 10(h) (Professional Development/Retraining) to increase funding from \$20,000 per year to \$30,000 per year effective September 1, 2016.

11. Amend Article X, Administrative Status as follows:

- a) Delete Paragraph 6.
- b) Delete Paragraph 8(a, b) (Notice of Termination) and replace with the following language: "Annual letters of appointment or letters of intent to fulltime Employees will be issued by April 1 of the first year of employment; February 1 of the next three years of employment; and by December 15 of the fifth year of employment, or by May 30 for Employees hired in mid-year for the first year of employment. These letters of appointment are to be signed and returned to the President within 30 calendar days. Full-time Employees entering their sixth year of employment with the College will be granted continuing appointment. Prior to being granted continuing appointment, fulltime Employees will be considered to be on a probationary status. The termination or non-reappointment of a full-time Employee during the first three years of the probationary service will not be subject to review pursuant to the grievance and arbitration procedure of this Agreement. During the next two years of the probationary period, any termination, non-reappointment or failure to award a continuing appointment may be raised as a grievance, but may not be referred to arbitration pursuant to this Agreement, with the terminal step of the grievance being the College Board of Trustees.
- c) Amend Paragraph 9(c) (Disciplinary Procedures) by changing "Stage 3" to "Article XIII(2)(Step 3)."
- d) Delete Paragraph 9(d) (Disciplinary Procedures).
- e) Delete Paragraph 9(e) (Disciplinary Procedures) and amend to provide that any tenured Employee accepting appointment to a new Guild unit title by promotion or appointment will serve a probationary term of two years. A non-tenured Employee will have the Employee's term extended by two years. Failure to successfully complete the probationary term when the Employee is tenured will require the College to appoint the Employee to another position

that is in the same pay category as the position the Employee held just prior to accepting the new position.

12. Amend Article XIII, Grievance and Arbitration Procedure:

Effective upon the complete ratification and approval of this 2015-2019 Agreement, amend Paragraph 2, Step 5, by deleting "or by the College (if the grievance was initiated by the College)."

13. Editorial Change:

All references to the Board of Trustees' approval will be amended to the President's approval.

14. New:

Commencement. Effective September 1, 2015, all employees will attend Commencement in full academic regalia at least once every other year with a schedule that is established by the College President or designee.

15. New:

Paperless Payroll. Effective September 1, 2015, the College may implement the distribution of paychecks by direct deposit for all Employees. The pay stub will no longer be distributed in a hard copy and, instead, will be available to Employees on the secure College web page.

16. New:

Tobacco Free Campus. Effective September 1, 2015, the College may implement and enforce a policy of a tobacco free campus. This Agreement satisfies any duty the County may have with regard to the decision, and the impact of the decision, to implement a tobacco free campus.

17. New:

Weather and Other Emergencies. The implementation of the parties' agreement to Guild proposal # 4, as modified, regarding non-essential full-time 12-month employees and their potential excusal from work when the College cancels classes due to weather or other emergency will be referred to the contractual Labor-Management Committee for resolution by not later than October 15, 2016. Issues to be discussed and agreed upon include those related to oversight and record-keeping to ensure that affected employees make up all time from which they are excused from work pursuant to this provision.

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18. New:

The draft 2011-2015 collective bargaining agreement sent to the Guild on November 7, 2015 will be finalized by the County and provided to the Guild for signature. The Guild will sign the agreement and return it to the County for signature.

The County will then prepare a draft 2015-2019 collective bargaining agreement by not later than 30 calendar days from the date on which the 2015-2019 Agreement is completely ratified and approved or 30 calendar days from the date of approval from the Guild of the 2011-2015 collective bargaining agreement, whichever is later. The Guild will, within 30 calendar days from its receipt of the draft agreement, provide the County with any objections that it has to the draft.

The provisions of this Stipulation of Agreement are subject to ratification by the Association membership, ratification by the County Executive and the College President and, for those provisions requiring the appropriation of additional funds, the approval of the College Board of Trustees and the County Legislature.

RESOLUTION NO. 2016.76 - Authorizing the Commencement of Litigation

WHEREAS, based on the advice of the College General Counsel and the Vice President of Business and Financial Affairs, and the recommendation of the College President, the Board of Trustees has determined that it has a valid claim arising from the contract between Suffolk County Community College and Dover Hospitality Services, Inc., and

WHEREAS, the County of Suffolk Department of Law, pursuant to the terms of the Sponsor Services Agreement, will represent the College in the prosecution of this claim, be it therefore

RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees hereby authorizes the commencement of litigation against Dover Hospitality Service, Inc. for any and all relief deemed necessary in order to enforce the College's rights, and be it further

RESOLVED, that the College President or the College General Counsel be authorized to execute any and all documents to effectuate the purposes of this resolution.

RESOLUTION NO. 2016.77 - Awarding a Contract for the Design of the Renewable Energy and STEM Center on the Michael J. Grant Campus, CP 2141

WHEREAS, the design phase of capital project No. 2141 has been approved by Suffolk County and the State of New York for funding, and funds have been appropriated by the Suffolk County Legislature, and

WHEREAS, proposals for the design of the Renewable Energy and STEM Center on the Michael J. Grant Campus have been solicited and reviewed by the College, and

WHEREAS, the College design committee has determined that the proposal submitted by AECOM best meets the needs of the College, be it therefore

RESOLVED, that the College President or his designee is authorized to enter into a contract with AECOM in the amount of \$900,000 for the design of the Renewable Energy and STEM Center upon such terms and conditions as shall be approved by the College General Counsel.

RESOLUTION NO. 2016.78 - Approving a Major Change Order to the Contract with Mt. Olympos Restoration, Inc. for Additional Waterproofing Work on the Ammerman Building on the Ammerman Campus, Project CP 2177

WHEREAS, Capital Project No. 2177 has been approved by Suffolk County and the State of New York for funding, and funds have been appropriated by the Suffolk County Legislature, and

WHEREAS, by a resolution duly adopted on May 19, 2016, the Board of Trustees authorized a contract with Mt. Olympos Restoration, Inc. in the amount of \$718,000 for the waterproofing of the Ammerman Building on the Ammerman Campus, and

WHEREAS, additional waterproofing work not included in the original contract, including removing four courses of brick above 112 windows, replacing existing steel lintel with new galvanized steel lintel, and replacing the brick, is necessary in order to complete the project,

WHEREAS, including the additional work described herein increases the contract with Mt. Olympos by more than thirty-five thousand and one dollars (\$35,001.00), thus constituting a major change order as defined by the College's *Procurement Policy*, and

WHEREAS, pursuant to such policy, all major change orders require the approval of the Board of Trustees, and

WHEREAS, there is sufficient monies in the budget for this project to permit this change order, be it therefore

RESOLVED, that a major change order in the amount of \$118,500.00 to the contract with Mt. Olympos Restoration Inc. for additional waterproofing work is hereby authorized and approved, and be it further

RESOLVED, that the College President, or his designee, is authorized and empowered to execute the necessary documentation, as approved by the College General Counsel, reflecting the change order and the nature of the additional work so authorized.

RESOLUTION NO. 2016.79 - Making A SEQRA Determination for the Construction of the New Plant Operations Building on the Michael J. Grant Campus (CP 2144)

WHEREAS, the College Board of Trustees serves as Lead Agency for determinations issued pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA") (NYS Environmental Conservation Law, Article 8) and its implementing regulations at Title 6 NYCRR Part 617, and

WHEREAS, under Capital Project 2144, the College will be constructing the new Plant Operations Building on the Michael J. Grant Campus, and

WHEREAS, this project is subject to review under SEQRA as both the State of New York and the County of Suffolk have the authority to issue approval for the funding of this project, and

WHEREAS, the College recommends that this project be considered an "Unlisted Action," pursuant to 6 NYCRR §617.2(ak), as this project neither meets or exceeds a threshold contained in the list of Type I Actions in 6 NYCRR §617.4, nor meets the definition of any listed Type II Action in 6 NYCRR §617.5, and

WHEREAS, a Short Environmental Assessment Form (SEAF) was prepared by the College, as shown in Attachment IV, attached hereto, to ascertain the environmental impacts of this project, as per 6 NYCRR §617.6(a)(3), and

WHEREAS, the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (NYSDEC) EAF Mapper Application was used to populate answers to geographic or place-based questions on the SEAF, and

WHEREAS, the results of the EAF Mapper Application are consistent with other available sources that identify environmentally sensitive conditions with the exception of the relative location of wetlands to the project site which requires a check of other available sources to confirm or refute the finding, and

WHEREAS, the NYSDEC Environmental Resource Mapper indicates that no wetlands are located on the Grant Campus, nor near the project site, and

WHEREAS, the College's review pursuant to SEQRA has indicated that the construction of the new Plant Operations Building on the Grant Campus will not have a significant adverse impact on the environment, be it therefore

RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees hereby finds and determines that the construction of the new Plant Operations Building on the Michael J. Grant Campus constitutes an "Unlisted Action," with no significant adverse impacts on the environment pursuant to 6 NYCRR §617.2(ak), for the following reasons:

- 1. The action will not exceed any of the criteria contained in 6 NYCRR §617.7(c) which sets forth thresholds for determining significant adverse impacts on the environment;
- 2. The action does not adversely impact surface or groundwater, traffic or noise levels, nor increase erosion, flooding, leaching or drainage problems as the topography remains flat, the building will be sewered, and storm water will be managed with the existing Campus storm water sewer system;
- 3. The action does not remove large quantities of vegetation, does not impact a significant habitat area, and does not impact a threatened or endangered species of animal or plant;
- 4. As the action does not adversely impact groundwater, the action does not impair the environmental characteristics of the state listed Critical Environmental Area (CEA) identified by the EAF Mapper Application as SGPA nor the CEA listed under NYSDEC Critical Environmental Areas in Suffolk County as Oak Brush plains;
- 5. The action does not conflict with the College's Master Plan;
- 6. The action does not impair the character or quality of important historical, architectural or aesthetic resources as the site does not contain a structure that is listed on either the State or National Register of Historic Places;
- 7. While the site is located in an archeological sensitive area, there is no record of any significant archeological findings within the Campus property and therefore the action does not impair the character or quality of important archeological resources;
- 8. The increased use of electricity and natural gas associated with the action is not significant relative to the rest of the Michael J. Grant Campus;
- 9. The action does not create a hazard to human health;
- 10. The action is consistent with the current use of the land as a community college;
- 11. The action does not attract a large number of people to the Campus compared to the number of people who would come to the Campus absent the action;
- 12. The action does not create a material demand for other actions that would meet one or more of the criteria in 6 NYCRR §617.7(c);
- 13. The action does not result in changes to two or more elements of the environment that when considered together result in a substantial adverse impact on the environment;
- 14. There are no related actions to this action that when considered cumulatively would meet one or more of the criteria in 6 NYCRR §617.7(c);
- 15. All necessary State and County approvals will be obtained.







RESOLUTION NO. 2016.80 - Making a SEQRA Determination for the Construction of the New Warehouse Building on the Eastern Campus (CP 2145)

WHEREAS, the College Board of Trustees serves as Lead Agency for determinations issued pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA") (NYS Environmental Conservation Law, Article 8) and its implementing regulations at Title 6 NYCRR Part 617, and

WHEREAS, under Capital Project 2145, the College will be constructing the new Warehouse Building on the Eastern Campus, and

WHEREAS, this project is subject to review under SEQRA as both the State of New York and the County of Suffolk have the authority to issue approval for the funding of this project, and

WHEREAS, the College recommends that this project be considered an "Unlisted Action," pursuant to 6 NYCRR §617.2(ak), as this project neither meets or exceeds a threshold contained in the list of Type I Actions in 6 NYCRR §617.4, nor meets the definition of any listed Type II Action in 6 NYCRR §617.5, and

WHEREAS, a Short Environmental Assessment Form (SEAF) was prepared by the College, as shown in Attachment V, attached hereto, to ascertain the environmental impacts of this project, as per 6 NYCRR §617.6(a)(3), and

WHEREAS, the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (NYSDEC) EAF Mapper Application was used to populate answers to geographic or place-based questions on the SEAF, and

WHEREAS, the results of the EAF Mapper Application are consistent with other available sources that identify environmentally sensitive conditions with the exception of the relative location of land that has been the subject of remediation for hazardous waste which requires a check of other available sources to confirm or refute the finding, and

WHEREAS, a search of the NYSDEC Spill Incidents Database, Remedial Site Database, and Bulk Storage Database indicates no record of any hazardous waste remediation on the Eastern Campus, nor near the project site, and

WHEREAS, the NYSDEC Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Maps indicate that no environmental remediation sites are located on the Eastern Campus, nor near the project site, and

WHEREAS, the College's review pursuant to SEQRA has indicated that the construction of the new Warehouse Building on the Eastern Campus will not have a significant adverse impact on the environment, be it therefore

RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees hereby finds and determines that the construction of the new Warehouse Building on the Eastern Campus constitutes an "Unlisted Action," with no significant adverse impacts on the environment pursuant to 6 NYCRR §617.2(ak), for the following reasons:

- 1. The action will not exceed any of the criteria contained in 6 NYCRR §617.7(c) which sets forth thresholds for determining significant adverse impacts on the environment;
- 2. The action does not adversely impact surface or groundwater, traffic or noise levels, nor increase erosion, flooding, leaching or drainage problems as the topography remains flat, the building will generate no wastewater, and storm water will be managed with the existing Campus storm water sewer system;
- 3. The action does not remove large quantities of vegetation, does not impact a significant habitat area, and does not impact a threatened or endangered species of animal or plant;
- 4. As the action does not adversely impact groundwater, the action does not impair the environmental characteristics of the state listed Critical Environmental Area (CEA) identified by the EAF Mapper Application as the Central Suffolk Pine Barrens Aquifer Overlay District;
- 5. The action does not conflict with the College's Master Plan;
- 6. 


