21		want to start by thanking everyone for
22		participating in our commencement
23		ceremony last month.
24		A special thank you to the special
25		events team and the campus activities

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team for bringing commencement back in person. We were able to successfully complete two ceremonies -- we were able to successfully complete two ceremonies with approximately 1200 of our graduates participating in commencement. It was a wonderful day.

As you can see in the financial report, we continue to manage the budgets in a deficit. These deficits, as we've been discussing, were anticipated as the decision was made when fall '22 enrollment came in under the expected enrollment, that we kept the budget the same so that we would use our reserve funds, which had exceeded what was a comfortable amount for the reserve funds.

All budgets will continue to access the reserve funds through the remainder of this year, and we do anticipate a few more deficits both in athletics and graduation that you'll see in our next board meeting. There

2	is approximately \$3.6 million in those
3	reserve funds, and we will be using
4	approximately \$201,000 this year to
5	help manage the budget.
6	We do have three resolutions for
7	your consideration, but I'll just stop
8	and pause here to see if we have any
9	questions on the financial report.
10	VICE CHAIRMAN MORGO: Any
11	questions for Patty? Hold on for a
12	 second.
13	DR. MUNSCH: Sure.
14	VICE CHAIRMAN MORGO: Steve, are

21	looked at the budget and the profit,
22	and I look at, I guess, both of the
23	daycares. And I apologize if I mess
24	this up. I see campus and Suffolk
25	Kids. I think it's the daycare

DR. MUNSCH: Correct.

TRUSTEE O'CONNOR: When I see them running at, you know, substantial excess or profits, if you will. So I know when we talk about our students, and daycare is a big issue. And that's one of the things that sometimes we lose students.

Is there some way that we can offer more scholarships? Reduced rates? Things that like? I mean, this is one of the programs that you think you want to subsidize to make it break even. And again, there may be other stuff in there.

I look at that and say is that an opportunity if you can spend the \$120,000 on the one to get more children in there, then maybe we'd have more students.

DR. MUNSCH: Sure. So, again, we offer subsidies for both of the two campus childcare centers through the

2	Student Association, and the students
3	then pay a reduced price or no cost for
4	them based on their income levels
5	because of the state grants that we
6	receive and the different Block Grants
7	that we receive to fund those childcare
8	centers.
9	So the funding that you're seeing
10	in there is really based on the grants
11	that we're receiving coming in. So
12	it's not because of the cost that is
13	being incurred by students. It's
14	really about the grants that are coming
15	in. And that's why those are in the
16	positive.
17	TRUSTEE O'CONNOR: So is there
18	more opportunity to give more? I
19	just
20	DR. MUNSCH: Well, what I would
21	say is the Grant Campus childcare
22	center is almost completely full, and
23	primarily every student is free who has
24	children in that childcare center.
25	The Ammerman childcare center has

been struggling with bringing children into the childcare center. They've got approximately 24 children in the center, but most of them are part time and most of them, at this point, are children of faculty and staff. So we've continued to do some outreach to students to try and encourage them to come back to campus to have on-campus classes and use the childcare center.

So that's part of the reason why you're seeing a higher number at Grant because they actually have more children in their childcare center. So we do continue to try and keep it free for students or as close to free as possible and continue to advertise to students to encourage them to use the childcare centers to support them. So thank you.

VICE CHAIRMAN MORGO: And Patty, the grants, as I understand your explanation, are restricted. They can only be used for certain purposes.

6		VICE CHAIRMAN MORGO: Right. But
7		I'm reacting to Kevin's question.
8		DR. MUNSCH: Yes.
9		VICE CHAIRMAN MORGO: Okay. The
10		Board of Directors resolutions. Any
11		questions for Patty about those? Or do
12		you want to say anything about them,
13		Patty?
14		DR. MUNSCH: Sure. So we had
15		three resolution for this board
16		meeting.
17		The first resolution is the annual
18		reappointment for Student Association
19		employees. I just wanted to point that
20		there's an adjustment for the Peconic
21		Cafe dining manager. As we discussed,
22		most of this year the Peconic Cafe has
23		been struggling due to lower on-campus
24		student enrollment and use of the
25		Peconic Cafe.

So a decision was made to reduce the position to 40 weeks. The cafe will then only remain open when students are on campus and classes are in session. The goal for this adjustment is to reduce the cost of the cafe in order to support the '22-'23 budget. So that's the main adjustment in the first resolution.

The second resolution to provide a modest 2 percent cost of living increase for two Student Association employees who are currently at their final step on the salary scale.

And the third resolution is the '22-'23 Student Association budget.

This budget is based on a flat or zero enrollment growth for the upcoming academic year. We made some very strategic and tough decisions within this budget to support the areas that had the highest level of student engagement because there was between a 10- and 15-percent cut for most areas

17	need for cost of living increase for
18	those two employees; however, we also
19	recognize that the budget was very,
20	very tight, and so we really couldn't
21	offer any more than that without moving
22	into a reserve fund area that would be
23	uncomfortable for the budget. And so
24	really it was all that could be offered
25	at this time because of the budget

2	concerns that we're seeing for the
3	upcoming year.
4	VICE CHAIRMAN MORGO: Does that
5	answer your question, Gemma?
6	TRUSTEE DELEON-LOPRESTI: Yeah. I
7	just I think that calling it a cost
8	of living adjustment might be a
9	misnomer, but I guess I'll approve
10	the
11	VICE CHAIRMAN MORGO: Yeah.
12	Considering today, yes.
13	DR. MUNSCH: Given where we are
14	with inflation, it's certainly
15	modest is the best way that I could
16	describe it. We needed to offer them
17	something, but if you start looking at
18	the Association budget and all the cuts
19	that we needed to make to it, we really
20	were trying to minimize any kind of
21	added expenses for the upcoming year.
22	One of the things to note, in
23	addition to the enrollment challenge
24	that we're having, is that the student
25	activities fee has traditionally been

\$105. When we moved into the pandemic, we made a decision to shift it to \$90, and we've stayed at \$90. So in addition to there being the enrollment decrease, which has created a challenge, we're also collecting less money from every student.

And so we really had to be very, very strategic in what we could offer people. And these are folks who are very willing and understanding of the fact of where we are with the budget. So it's not where we'd like to be, but is where we can be.

VICE CHAIRMAN MORGO: Okay. Thank you for the question, Gemma, and thank you for the explanation, Dr. Munsch.

We already voted on the resolutions, and they were already approved for the Association. I'm advised by counsel that I have to make the -- I should make the announcement that the public feed -- we can be seen by the public and we can hear the

16		I'd like to call on vice president
17		for business and financial affairs,
18		Dr. Mark Harris, to present the budget
19		and college financial records.
20		Dr. Harris?
21		DR. HARRIS: Good morning,
22		trustees, members who are here. So the
23		financials that we present represent
24	×	three-quarters of the fiscal year
25		ending August 2022.

If you recall -- and we have provided some discussions in prior month -- that we were anticipating or we budgeted about \$4.9 million use of fund balance, but based on some transactions and reconciliation that we explained last month, that we were able to recognize some additional revenue primarily from HEERF because of how we did the calculation based on projection estimate versus the actual numbers.

Also in the budget that we presented for fiscal '22, we had about \$9.8 million use of HEERF funding, but based on the change of the reconciliation, we have since recognized \$12.3 million, about \$2.5 million higher. So that means that once we completed the reconciliation and the analysis in the month of May, we're anticipating using about \$3.14 million of fund balance compared to \$4.95 million, a

Just keep in mind that we have three more months to go. There's still some outstanding reconciliation that we need to do in terms of revenue loss recognition in certain areas, especially when we look at overall services, so there's an opportunity for us to potentially recognize some additional revenue from HEERF. As of today, we have about \$6.8 million of unspent HEERF funding on the institution side, of which \$5.1 million we were anticipating to roll into the fiscal '23 budget.

So we do have some latitude, about \$1.7 million of HEERF funding that we potentially can use in fiscal '22, provided that we do have those eligible expenses and are able to successfully calculate loss revenue on the auxiliary side.

In terms of the components that are really impacting the anticipated use of fund balance, the net tuition is

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about \$3.6 million less than budget,

net fees is about \$3 million less than

budget, and then the miscellaneous, as

I indicated before the HEERF funding,

is about \$2.5 million better than what

we anticipated.

In terms of the cost side, the personnel services is about 4.9 less than budget. And when we talk about supplies, it's not just papers and pens, but we're talking about postage. We're talking about printing, etc.

It's about \$1.5 million less. And then certain contractual expenses were about 600,000 above.

And while it's showing as expenses, one of the things that we have to do in order to satisfy, especially the COVID testing, is really use our budget. So that's what's really being reflected in that line. So that's the net change in the fund balance, use of about 3.1.

In terms our fiscal '23 budget

update, so the county already has approved the '22-'23 budget. We went to the legislature -- Education

Committee of the legislature yesterday to discuss that with them, and then by August 5, we are required to submit our budget proposal to SUNY for review and approval.

Just one more discussion on HEERF, in terms of the institution portion of HEERF III. The college was eligible to receive about \$22.5 million. We have used most of the proceeds for loss revenue in terms of tuition and fees reduction, but one of the components of that -- and we committed about 5 percent use of HEERF III for mental health support.

So we did complete a mental health support plan, Dr. Munsch and I in consultation with Angelica Rivera from HR presented to Dr. Bonahue, and then submitted to -- submitted it to SUNY for review. So we're committed to

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using about 1-point -- almost
\$1.2 million of HEERF funding for
mental health support, not just for
students, but also for faculty and
staff.

On the cash flow side, last time we spoke, the county did not provide us with any funding of the 46 for fiscal '22 as of last month. However, based on the schedule that we received, as of Friday, we're up to about \$7 million in cash funding. So there's about — there's another \$39 million that the county will be providing to us by July 15. So at some point, we will see additional funding coming in at a faster pace.

So before I touch on the two resolutions that I have, I just wanted to see whether or not there were any questions on the financials that I discussed.

18	students would receive from
19	individuals, and then any other mental
20	health support requirements that would
21	support those.

16	resolutions number 2022.31 to 2022.44,
17	I want to give the Facilities Committee
18	report because item seven is a pretty
19	substantial change order request of
20	\$242,310. This all comes from the
21	report I gave two meetings ago talking
22	about working with the architect on the
23	job for the STEM building on the Grant
24	campus, and the many requests for
25	change orders and the reaction to it.

Since that meeting, things have gotten better. We continue to make steady progress on the STEM center project, inclusive of change order approvals. The main change order resolution today includes 20 individual change orders. 20. And that's a significant quantity. If you look at one of the where as clauses, they list all the things being considered, things like telecommunications changes, building exteriors, steel -- they're all there.

Overall, the current status of change orders is as follows. There are now 83 known change orders. That's down considerably since the last time I reported. The college estimates that an additional 10 change orders will be submitted based on recent communications with the contractors, including the major change order resolutions being brought today to the board.

We have approved 34 change orders and rejected 6. As originally submitted by the contractor, the total of those 40 change orders was \$494,734. By comparison, those approved is \$335,445. This represents a reduction of 159,289. That's about a 32-percent reduction.

The project remains within budget based on the known submitted change orders. This is positive news, obviously. The review of the remaining change orders, as well as response to any critical requests for information will continue to be prioritized by the college and, as such, communicated to AECOM. That's the architectural folks on the job.

The latest project's substantial complete date ranges now from October to early November, depending on how quickly technical issues and change orders are addressed by the architect of record, AECOM.

6	possible. John Demaio and his staff
7	are keeping us abreast of how it's
8	going. They've really done a superb
9	job of vigilance, and the report is
10	very different from the one I made two
11	weeks ago two meetings ago.

Thank you, Trustee Morgo, for commenting on the change orders. Just yesterday, I'll mention in my report, Trustee Pagdanganan and I had an opportunity to walk through this building as it's going up. We had a visit from some folks from National Grid, and Paul Cooper, likewise, reported that communications with the architect and with contractor are going much better than they were a month ago, and that John Demaio, in particular, continues do great work managing this contract.

Trustees, I just want to point out that items 9 and 10 are directly related to our strategy of really focusing on enrollment and retention.

We're getting some support from SUNY in terms of some planning monies for planning grants, both in terms of traditional enrollment management and

BOARD OF TRUSTEES - 6/16/2022 in terms of more outreach to adult learners and bring them to workforce certificates.

You'll also see in item 10, if you had a chance to look at the backup, the college is coming together around a plan to have -- to hire some additional part-time enrollment aides. And the way this has been conceptualized is that we have many -- many folks who would be outstanding ambassadors in the college, especially recent graduates, for example, who know each campus intimately. They have -- they are very well acquainted with what the college does and all the things that we're trying to bring to the community.

So these part-time positions will add to our capacity to do recruitment and outreach and to work with -- especially much of it on the traditional side of the house, to work at college fairs, for example, but not exclusive of that. We can also do more

2	community-facing work. And, again,
3	these are folks who would be, again,
4	helping us with some additional
5	part-time help.
6	Then, you'll see that we have the

I also want to recognize from our AME White Collar Group, Josephine Makowski is here with us today.

Josephine, thank you for representing AME today.

Trustees, as Dr. Harris mentioned, he and I visited Hauppauge yesterday to present the college budget to the education and labor committee. We expressed our continuing appreciation for the support of that committee for everything that the college does. We did not have Kevlar vests with us, but we -- we had a few tough questions.

In spite of that, certainly the committee is very strongly behind the college. The committee, of course, is cognizant that all community colleges, as was reported in Newsday and as we make no secret of -- all community colleges are struggling with enrollment

right now, and they want us to be good stewards of the resources that they have. The resources that we have received from them.

They asked us about outreach.

They asked us about retention. They asked us about enrollment. They also asked questions about our own staffing levels, cost control. And we assured the committee that this is not business as usual, and that we are scrutinizing every cost, every position that becomes open to be sure that all of the investment that we have, all of the public trust that comes to the college is invested wisely and according to our mission of student access and student success.

I also had an informal conversation with John Kennedy about the debt that we had removed from our balance sheet, and I believe we're actually headed in a good direction.

And that -- just informally, as an

BOARD OF TRUSTEES - 6/16/2022 update, the college is looking at that, but I think as we continue to communicate about that, I think that the county understands our perspective on that matter.

I emphasized to the county and to the education and labor committee that we have really used the strategic planning process as an opportunity to recommit ourselves to outreach, to equity, and to student success. We've discussed that a little bit here today.

I also want to share with the committee that from the college advancement office, Marylou Araneo and Drew Fawcett had commissioned a study of brand awareness of Suffolk Community College in the area. They worked with Cox Media Group, a friend of the college, who did a very strong survey, and the results are fascinating.

We should dig into it at another opportunity, perhaps when we have an opportunity for our retreat. But the

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perception of the college is very

strong. Awareness of the college is

strong. Associations of the qualities

of the college and the way that we

offer strong educational opportunity

and good value to the community are

very strong.

I'll pass it around, just the results of that study, but we came away very confident that the public understanding of Suffolk Community College is very strong. The challenges that we are experiencing, we believe -- as we've commented previously -- have to do with converting those perceptions into action, into behavior, into enrollment.

So just passing this along, but please take a look at it when you have a moment, and we can certainly send it out -- if you're interested, we can certainly send it out to the whole board for you to take a look at in your own time.

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I want to also share that one of the themes that we discussed in the budget planning process and, in many ways, the way in which fiscal '23 is going to be a pivotal year for us has to do with the focus on retention. So on one hand our enrollment strategy is to attract as many students, right? And those are inputs.

But we know that we need to retain the students that we have. And I've invited the entire college to come together to a retention workshop next Thursday. So far we have about 60 RSVPs from cabinet, from guild officers, from faculty leadership, both on the association side and on the -- and on the governance side.

Our focus will be on all those tiers, Trustee Morgo, of retention that we've discussed previously. The classroom level, getting students out of prep, into college gateway courses, encouraging student persistence from

the fall semester into the spring semester, thinking about what areas of professional development we all continue to need to encourage a growth mindset among students. To be focused on student pathways, ourselves, on our advising processes and the way we're trying to help students establish strong relationships with the college that help them learn to reach out for help.

So this workshop will be -- will help us move to the action plans that we've talked about that convert our strategic goals into more specific action steps that we'll be able to implement both for the fall and throughout the year ahead.

Our academic program remains
exceptional, as you know. Yesterday we
concluded an American Bar Association
site visit on our paralegal program.
The visiting committee heard, no
surprise, that the biggest strength of

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the program is the quality and support that our students receive from the faculty, and they -- the visitors remarked that this is a purposeful program where every student finds employment, which is always great to hear.

One student simply said that this program is where -- quote -- I have found my place -- end quote -- giving a sense that the student feels that they really have a sense of belonging and a sense of purpose leading to employment, and that's always great to hear.

Also this week, received reaccreditation for our health information technology degree, which includes the stackable medical coder, biller certificate within it. Once again, our focus on workforce programs and the alignment with employment opportunities is what really comes out. This is another program where every student finds employment after they

BOARD OF TRUSTEES - 6/16/2022 complete.

I mentioned that yesterday, Bel and I, together with Marylou Araneo, Sylvia, and several visitors from National Grid, had a tour of the STEM center already under way. We remain very grateful to the -- to National Grid for the long-term partnership that they're entering into with the college. Again, National Grid has provided support of \$250,000. And so it will be our pleasure to acknowledge that long-term commitment with a naming opportunity for National Grid inside the building.

Also, I've previously reported on how the college has entered into conversations with Northwell Health.

After a long series of conversations on how to bring scholarships to students from two underrepresented, underserved high schools in Suffolk County, Bay Shore and Brentwood, we're now moving forward. And we learned yesterday

BOARD OF TRUSTEES - 6/16/2022 we're nearing the completion of this project.

Northwell is awarding Suffolk
nearly \$20,000 per student, which will
include up to -- include 85 percent of
their tuition and fees. So students
will have a little skin in the game,
but in addition, funding for basic
needs, books, transportation,
wraparound services, any meal vouchers,
any tutoring.

So the idea is not just to support students through scholarship, but to acknowledge that in our conversations, as we've learned about basic needs, that that is often an area of student need, as well. So the commitment from Northwell is not only for tuition, but also to fund those wraparound services.

Northwell will provide a success coach for all students in the program, and the upshot is that we can expect 53 new scholarship students this fall.

This was a heavy lift, and I want to

especially thank Carol Wickliffe
Campbell, Marylou Araneo, the
advancement team, Sylvia Diaz, and the
Foundation, Alicia O'Connor in the
legal team because the relationships
with Northwell and the Long Island
Community Foundation have been complex.
But the bottom line is this will bring
a new audience of scholarship students
to the college for this fall.

Finally -- and I should have mentioned this earlier. At your place, trustees, you'll find both the original artwork for some of our newer outreach and recruitment materials, the original out -- the original artwork. And if we could show it. Thank you for displaying.

It was a display ad that Drew
Fawcett in our advancement team was so
inspired by the speeches, the graduates
that we all got to take part in last
month, he took a lot of photos. He
assembled some of those photos. The

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future is in their hands, I think is a great phrase. We also are doing our first bilingual, el futuro está en sus manos. And we corrected the typo -- we corrected the typo when we actually went to the formal printed item. Yes.

We don't view this as a one and done. We view this as an opportunity to continue to use these kinds of flyers, these cards to raise visibility and raise awareness everywhere in the community. One of the -- in conversation with Trustee Zarate, we look forward to additional collaboration with the Long Island Latino Teachers Association, to extend our outreach to students who are not always well represented in higher education.

And under the leadership of Christina Vargas and, again, with our advancement team, we know that this is not sufficient in and of itself. It's a good -- it's a good outreach for our

2	students, but we're now also looking at
3	the translation of our web pages, our
4	enrollment and registration web pages
5	to better explain to students, to
6	better explain to families who may not

19		that we have about 24 at Ammerman and a
20		slightly lower number at Grant.
21		VICE CHAIRMAN MORGO: Okay. I
22		wonder if the public knows about the
23		availability and the success of that
24		program.
25		PRESIDENT BONAHUE: It's one of

3	in terms of making these employment
4	opportunities visible is realizing that
5	students are not only looking for
6	baccalaureate programs, right? They're
7	not only looking for the first two
8	years of university education, but that

10	that one-year certificate that's going
11	to lead directly to employment or
12	two-year degree that's going to allow
13	them to have an entry-level job as a
14	professional.
15	So as we think about, for
16	instance, our landing page, our
17	advising processes, we need to be sure
18	that these career-facing opportunities
19	are just as visible and easily
20	available for students to navigate as
21	the first two years of our transfer
22	program.

24	precisely what I was thinking.
25	Exactly. And I missed when you said

3	You gave a number of how many it
4	would be how many students in Brentwood
5	and Bay Shore?
6	PRESIDENT BONAHUE: Yes. It was
7	designed to be 25, each but we're
8	probably going to get a few more
9	students than that, so it will be 53 is
10	what we're looking at so far.
11	VICE CHAIRMAN MORGO: I thought
12	you said 53. Any other questions?
13	Trustee Coverdale?
14	TRUSTEE COVERDALE: How long is
15	the paralegal program? Is that a
16	two-year program? Or is it a
17	certificate?

19	degree program is a two-year AAS
20	degree. Medical coder, biller, in
21	contrast, is a one-year program, and
22	then there is an AAS degree that stacks
23	on top of it that gives students a
24	fuller survey of health information

21		Correct.
22		TRUSTEE CANARY: who had a
23		tragic gun violence situation on their
24		campus. And I brought back from that
25		that they had presented a how-to for a

And when you listen to the actual administrators who had to deal with the situation, it was, like, just -- it blew my mind because I said to myself my God, all of the nuances and all of the parts of a puzzle and everything that had to come together in order to deal with that tragedy on that campus, I think it's something that would be worthwhile for us to revisit and see about us having a playbook on the shelf, God forbid -- I pray to God we will never, ever, ever have to use it, but who knows in this crazy world that we live in.

And if we did have a tragedy like that, we really need to know how to deal with it quickly, effectively, efficiently. And, again, all the communication that has to go on, it just -- it all brought that back to mind. This was a few years ago, and I

2	think I reported when I came back from
3	that ACCT conference about how much
4	that impressed me.
5	So I bring it up again because I
6	think it's something that we need to
7	take a look at.
8	VICE CHAIRMAN MORGO: You want to
9	react?
10	PRESIDENT BONAHUE: Thank you,
11	Trustee Canary. We received a variety
12	of calls, suggestions, requests to
13	update our training from college staff
14	in the wake of, again, two mass
15	shootings, Buffalo and then the
16	Uvalde the Uvalde incident.
17	I've we have an emergency
18	management plan that includes active
19	shooter scenarios, but I think we need
20	to update that. We have not offered
21	my understanding is that we haven't
22	been offered haven't been able to
23	offer training during the last few
24	years during COVID, and everyone has
25	been remote. But as we come back to

BOARD OF TRUSTEES - 6/16/2022 campus, as we have more density on campus, I've asked EVP Petrizzo and Fideli to -- to reintroduce some training for the fall semester.

There are a variety of resources out there that are well known, but I think when it comes down, like you said, to the nitty gritty of incident response, it'll be helpful for all of us to have a refresher of the best way to respond during a true emergency.

Lou, is there anything that I -- I know you're working on that. I think we've done training in the past, and we'll be able to update that training moving forward.

MR. PETRIZZO: That's correct. We have trained in the past. Obviously the past couple of years, COVID has interfered with that kind of training, but it's always good to go back and take another look at what you have or what you thought was adequate before and make sure that it's current and up

2	to date and it can be executed in the
3	current environment. We had a couple
4	of scares
5	VICE CHAIRMAN MORGO: Hold on for
6	a second.
7	MR. PETRIZZO: Sorry. We had a
8	couple of scares several years ago, and
9	those scares caused us to really sit
10	down and to game out what needs to be
11	done in those circumstances. And as
12	the president indicated, recent events
13	and the return to campus have motivated
14	us to come back to the campuses with
15	training, which will be ongoing,
16	probably starting late August and going
17	through the fall.
18	TRUSTEE CANARY: So has SUNY
19	issued guidance on this or suggestions
20	or recommendations to the SUNY schools?
21	MR. PETRIZZO: Not recently.
22	PRESIDENT BONAHUE: To my
23	knowledge, we've received no technical
24	guidance. No.

11	potentially be at risk and may end up
12	in the situation so kind of like a
13	prevention plan, also creating a threat
14	plan within the emergency
15	MR. PETRIZZO: I'll
16	PRESIDENT BONAHUE: Please.
17	MR. PETRIZZO: let Dr. Bonahue
18	speak, but we do have
19	VICE CHAIRMAN MORGO: Dr. Bonahue,
20	and then
21	PRESIDENT BONAHUE: You're exactly
22	right. We do have a way of kind of
23	connecting the dots between students
24	who what might be a conduct issue,
25	but then we realize there could be

something more substantive there. And there is an interdisciplinary team, that I'll ask Lou to speak about, that connects the dots on conduct, maybe mental health, and possible just kind of awareness of a potential threat.

VICE CHAIRMAN MORGO: Go ahead.

MR. PETRIZZO: Briefly, the committee is called students of concern. They -- we have them on each campus. Whenever a faculty member, a staff member, another student raises a concern or an issue about a student, these groups are assembled, and with a multidisciplinary approach, examine what's going on.

Is it a real threat, is it something other than that, is there a mental health issue, exactly what is the problem. And we try to determine what steps to take to protect the college community and to help the individual, if it is a mental health issue.
