CHAIR MURRAY: I'm going to ask Gordon to lead us in the Pledge.
[AFTER RECITATION OF THE PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE, THE MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE SUFFOLK COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE WAS CALLED TO ORDER BY THE CHAIRMAN, E. CHRISTOPHER MURRAY.]

CHAIR MURRAY: Do we have any guests to acknowledge?

PRESIDENT BONAHUE: Are there any guests who are not unusually with us? Can you identify yourselves?

Mr. Chairman, I don't think we have any guests today.

CHAIR MURRAY: Okay.
If someone is online, welcome.
So at this point in time I'm going to ask for a motion to adjourn the Board of Trustees meeting and call the Board of Directors meeting to order. Do I have a motion?

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: So moved.
CHAIR MURRAY: Second?
VICE CHAIR MORGO: Second.

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CHAIR MURRAY: All those in
favor?
COLLECTIVE RESPONSE: Aye.
[WHEREUPON THE MOTION MADE AND SECONDED WAS VOTED ON AND CARRIED. THE MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE SUFFOLK COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE WAS ADJOURNED AND REOPENED.]

CHAIR MURRAY: So we're now back into the Board of Trustees meeting.

At this point $I$ would like to request a motion for the approval of the minutes of the December 16, 2021, Board of Trustees meeting. Would someone like to make that motion?

VICE CHAIR COVERDALE: So moved.
CHAIR MURRAY: Second?
TRUSTEE ZARATE: Second the motion.

CHAIR MURRAY: Thank you.
All those in favor?
COLLECTIVE RESPONSE: Aye.
CHAIR MURRAY: Any opposed?
(No response.)

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CHAIR MURRAY: Motion is carried.
[WHEREUPON THE MOTION MADE AND
SECONDED WAS VOTED ON AND CARRIED.]
CHAIR MURRAY: At this point I
would like to introduce Vice President for Business and Financial Affairs,

Dr. Mark Harris, to present the
College's budget and college financial records.

VICE PRESIDENT HARRIS: Thank
you, Mr. Chair, members of the Board of Trustees, and all present today.

Just wanted to give an update on the Fiscal 21 year-end. Last meeting we had we indicated that our goal was to have the fiscal audit or the financial audit completed and presented hopefully during this month's meeting, but unfortunately we were not able to get it completed, primarily because there are some outstanding items that the external auditors are waiting to get verification, primarily from the County. So the audit is about 95 percent

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 complete. We're still working with them to finalize those few items with the intention of having it completed and ready to be presented to the board at the next meeting.

In terms of the Fiscal 22 updates on our operating budget, the financial statements that we included capture the month of January. And again, we made some assumptions based on revenue costs, based on what actually came in, and based on what some of the projections or the obligations are with respect to that.

As you recall, when we presented the budget last year, we included the use of fund balance for almost \$5 million, about $\$ 4.95$ million, and also included in the revenue projection was the use of about $\$ 10$ million, a little bit less than $\$ 10$ million from HEERF, specifically HEERF II funding.

But based on where we're trending right now given where enrollment is and

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 based on what we were able to draw down, we're about $\$ 2.6$ million shy of that $\$ 10$ million. So when we look at our revenue slash our fund balance projection, it seems as if we were supposed to close today, we were going to be using about $7, \$ 7.6$ million, give or take, of fund balance, but $I$ caution that we are still in the very early stages of the budget. There are still a lot of moving pieces. One of the factors that we need to reconcile is what our spring numbers will be in terms of $F T E$ and then do a calculation based on the revenue loss model that we developed to see how much of that revenue we can recapture, and then also look at some additional auxiliary revenue from Workforce Development and the Continued Education Program, and then see from the HEERF funding how much of that we can really capture.

So as we progress through the fiscal year, we will keep the board

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 updated as to the financial position, mainly on the use of fund balance with the goal of hoping that it will be significantly lower than what we budgeted, if at all.

With respect to the Fiscal 23, we are in the process. We have completed most of the budget reviews with the departments. I believe we have one or two left.

So the next step in the phase is really to look at those items that have been submitted, specifically those that are tied to Student Success, with the caution, of course, that we are not able to fund every single project given where enrollment projections may be, but also where we may be fiscally. We're working with the OPIE department to look at those factors that may influence our FTE enrollment.
In terms of one of the
assumptions that we used -- and early March we're going to be meeting with the

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Budget and Finance subcommittee to really lay out those assumptions. For the Fiscal 23 component of our revenue really includes the State, and based on what the governor has proposed if the legislature passes that, then it would mean that we would get flat funding from last year which would be good for us especially in light of any decreases.

And then the other factor which is a significant portion of our revenues, really the funding from the County. And we're not sure where they would come in in terms of increase, whether or not it would flat or whether or not they will be generous and give us 3 percent, 4 percent. That would be good.

So we'll be meeting with the Budget and Finance Subcommittee around the first week of March and really lay out those assumptions and then get some guidance from the members on how to finalize the budget. And once we have

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 done that, tie that budget nicely and then present it to the board around April.

Cash flow we have done exceedingly well last year and this year primarily because of some of the cost mitigation steps that we have taken, but also we have benefitted tremendously from the cash itself from HEERF. So a combination of cost mitigation and then some additional influx from HEERF. We're still able to meet those short-term obligations so we are working on keeping it that way so that we're able to make payroll, those category deductions, and those other committed costs that we have.

Before I get to resolutions I would just like to talk a little bit more about HEERF. So as you recall, we as a college received quite a bit of funding from US Department of Education. So from the last go-around which is, ARP, the American Rescue Plan, we have

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 about 13 million that we're eligible to drawdown on behalf of students. And then we have about $\$ 10$ million leftover to be drawn down provided that we have those eligible expenses and we have the lost revenue calculations to drawdown as well.

So Dr. Munsch and I have been working and doing a no-cost extension for one year specifically to give us a little bit more latitude on how we use the institutional funds with respect to say mental health support, but also in the event that we have to continue the COVID testing beyond spring of 2022. So we should have some additional information from US Department of Education once they have reviewed that no-cost extension for us. So we're hoping that takes place.

Before I move on to the three resolutions that $I$ will present, I just wanted to find out whether or not there are any questions based on the

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 financials that have been presented. CHAIR MURRAY: The fund balance at the end of last fiscal year, what was that?

VICE PRESIDENT HARRIS: So fiscal
2020 we had a little bit over $\$ 20$ million. So we're waiting to get final calculation or approval from the auditors to see what Fiscal 21 will be. CHAIR MURRAY: Okay. Do you have an estimate because I thought it was -would the fund balance be increasing?

VICE PRESIDENT HARRIS: We
anticipate that it will increase. Again, until we have finalized what the numbers are because there are some numbers that they need to verify. So we should know very shortly what that final number will be, but yes, the number will be higher than Fiscal 20.

CHAIR MURRAY: So even in the
worst case scenario of having to tap in at 5 and then another 2.5, we're still going to have a relatively healthy fund

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 balance.

VICE PRESIDENT HARRIS: Yes. So one of the things I would like to stress with that as well, so especially the past fiscal year the step that really helped us -- so the HEERF did one thing. It reimbursed us for lost revenue. So it made us whole from that respect.

But in terms of being able to add money to fund balance, it's really going through and looking at some of these positions. And $I$ know we have had discussions with multiple areas about positions especially after attrition, retirement, whatever steps those were, and we went through the process of evaluating what positions were needed, were critical, but more importantly, what the college needed to do to ensure that every single employee who was employed at the time remained employed. And that when, you know, college aids, full-time, part-time, all the employees that we had starting

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 pre-pandemic who decided to stay, we were able to keep but also make payroll every single two weeks. So the personnel line in terms of really assessing what we must have versus what we can delay, but what really helped us add some money to fund balance.

VICE CHAIR MORGO: So you would say the federal program worked?

VICE PRESIDENT HARRIS: The
federal program worked.
CHAIR MURRAY: Does anyone have any other questions for Mark?
(No response.)
CHAIR MURRAY: So there are some resolutions?

VICE PRESIDENT HARRIS: Yes. The first resolution is the standard resolution dealing with employee health insurance. Just to note that for the month that we're presenting, for December costs, it's about 800,000 lower than what it normally would have been and 2 reasons, 2 factors that are

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 driving that.

One, the quarterly Medicare payment that we receive normally from the County is about $\$ 365,000$. And then there is an additional $\$ 390,00$ that we received from the County for the IRMAA, which I indicated they were about 2 years behind.

So based on that the amount that we're presenting to the board for review and approval to be paid to the county for the month of December is \$2,760,235.68.

And in item number 2 are the budget transfers. The first -- the total of the transfer that we're asking for review and approval is for $\$ 366,000$. And really what we're doing is really funding telephone and equipment maintenance and purchases for the IT department.

And then there is one item for $\$ 22,932$ that is included in that which is really supporting our energy

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efficiency through the charging station for the electric vehicle.

And then the third item that I have, the third resolution, is the agreement between the college and the Guild Administrative Officers for the period of September 1, 2019, to August 31, 2023. The original term was September 1, 2019, to August 31, 2022.

So the 1-year extension just on base would be about $\$ 315,000$, but when we look at the contract over the 4 -year period just on base, it's a little bit over $\$ 1.2$ million, $\$ 1,229,567$.

So those are the 3 resolutions I'm putting forth for review and consideration.

CHAIR MURRAY: Any other questions?
(No response.)
CHAIR MURRAY: Thank you, Mark.
VICE PRESIDENT HARRIS: Thank you.

CHAIR MURRAY: Prior to going to

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 the resolutions, I'm going to ask -since one of them revolves around the capital projects, capital program, I'm going to ask Jim to give his report for the Facilities Committee.

VICE CHAIR MORGO: I will give the whole thing but I'll emphasize the ones that we're going to vote on today. The Facilities Committee met yesterday morning via Zoom. Trustee Canary, Trustee deLeon-Lopresti along with Lou Petrizzo, Paul Cooper, Jon Demaio, Ben Zwirn, and Gail Kenehan were all participating.

The meeting focused on capital projects and was divided into three distinct types of capital projects. The proposed, those are the ones we have to vote on today to include in our capital program, the advancing, and the existence.

I should tell you, all are detailed comprehensively in this booklet. So it's more interesting than

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you might think when you see some of the things that were done with the budget and what had to be done because of contingencies.

Jon began with a review of the two new proposed capital programs, the Caumsett Hall partial renovation and the South Cottage renovation. Both of these are on the Grant Campus. They are item 6 among the resolutions today.

The Caumsett Hall project will reconfigure and relocate 21,600 square feet of existing space to centralize critical students services. And without getting into all the details, it will make the student entering experience streamlined and we will be more welcoming at Caumsett Hall.

Gemma asked during the discussion what about the two other campuses, and we were told that they already have these processes there.

The South Cottage renovation will transform the now vacant building into

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 the campus Health and Wellness Center and the emphasis here will be on mental health issues so that they could be done with confidentiality and privacy.

Obviously I think we all know, some of us from personal experience with children and grandchildren, that the pandemic has caused severe mental health problems with our kids. The South

Cottage will be transformed so professionals can deal with our students in privacy and with confidentiality. Those are the two that are going to be voted on.

I asked Chris if $I$ should keep going through the report, and he said I should. The advancing capital projects are the ones that are going to be before the legislature. They are more topical. They are going to be coming up before the legislature and these are the projects that were discussed at the Advocacy Committee but Priscilla will probably talk about the advocacy of

There are three. One is the infrastructure project which is ongoing, appropriate infrastructure.

The second is the Automotive Technology Center here on the Grant Campus. The signed funds are included in 2022 and construction equipment funds in '23. State aid has already been approved, and you know State pays half, we pay the other half. I mean the County pays the other half, posts bond for the other half to be precise. No changes are being requested.

The Workforce Development and Technology Center expansion on the Grant Campus is the third one. Design funds have been appropriated, construction funds are currently scheduled for this year, State aid is included.

The State has come through again. And the governor's proposed budget, they are included in the budget. If the budget passes, they will be included,

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 but the legislature has already approved the half. No changes are being requested.

Ben Zwirn, who was at our meeting, opined that he thought those three should not face much difficulty with the County legislature but one never knows, does one?

The Automotive Technology particularly, these are design funds and if the design funds are committed, then it would be difficult to draw back from that.

The third type of capital project that Jon spoke about were the ones that are existing that are going forward, but these are the ones we can see the real impact, tangible impact going on now.

The Renewable Energy and STEM
Center on the Grant Campus started construction in '21. The site is cleared and secured behind fencing and sewer piping and the first floor interior framing are complete.

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The roof is weathertight, plumbing, electrical, and mechanical rough-ins, exterior framing, insulation, and windows are in progress, weather permitting. The entire building should be weathertight by next month.

The project continues to track within budget which may allow for additional solar energy generation further reducing operating costs. That is actually very good news. The current schedule estimates substantial completion in August 2022.

There was some debate whether it would open in the fall semester of ' 22 , although with all the things going on, not the least of which is supply chain issues, we may be looking at the spring semester.

A construction -- a second one, a construction contract has been executed for the plant operation building on the Grant Campus. The contractor has mobilized, completed mock-ups, the site

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 has been cleared and is secured with fencing. Excavation work has begun.

Due to the ongoing supply chain issues, the pre-engineered building lead time is an estimated 11 months. Based on the critical path items, substantial completion of the facility is estimated in the summer of ' 23.

The next one, the warehouse building on the Eastern Campus was the most perplexing. As Jon said a number of times, this should be a simple building, steel. It is not complicated. It is not large. A design contract was awarded in November of 2018. Bids were opened in 2021. And here's the bad news. The lowest bid exceeded the budget by 126 percent. No a lot was made from the bid.

I have to say, and I think Gordon and Gemma would agree with me, Jon and his team have shown incredible creativity in their approach. It's only 4,000 square feet with no finishes or

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 plumbing. The College has -- is analyzing potential cost savings from completing the bulk of the requested on-site work through a combination of inhouse and using existing County contracts thus reducing the installation of the pre-engineered building.

You know, I should say something in regard to the one we're going to vote on today. Because of this experience, the contingency item of the budget, line item in each budget, and the inflation are higher than they normally are. 8 percent for the contingency, which is usually a 5, and 5 percent for inflation which is like 2, and 3 so they are adjusting.

Finally, the renovation of Kreiling Hall on the Ammerman, the renovations are complete. The building was issued a C of O, certificate of occupancy, in October of last year. This has been a success story.
Some of us -- I think when Gordon

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 was chair of this committee -- toured it. It was in immutable condition. I haven't been there now, but I'm told it really is outstanding. So that one, Kreiling, is a success story.

A number of trustees commended Jon and Paul Cooper and all those involved for their thoughtful, agile, comprehensive approach during these times of uncertainty and change.

That that's my report,
Mr. Chairman.
CHAIR MURRAY: Thank you so much.
Does anyone have any questions for Jim?

TRUSTEE CANARY: Just a statement. Again, we want to thank Jon and his team. They do an outstanding job in very difficult circumstances to say the least.

PRESIDENT BONAHUE: Please stand.
VICE CHAIR MORGO: I didn't know you were here.

TRUSTEE CANARY: What I wanted to

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also say and stress is that this is by no means unique to Suffolk Community College. This is happening everywhere in the Northeast, the entire north -probably the entire country where this phenomenon is happening with supply chain problems, with contractors now being so busy, not having enough workforce, not being able to put in enough time and effort to these projects, and it reflects in the bid prices. And these are intangibles. You can't gauge. It's like you just got to wait to open up those bids and go oh, my God. Look what is happening now. So again, guys, thank you for that. We're going to continue to try to come up with unique approaches and try to pair these down. I mean I understand you even took the gold leaf overhead doors off at the storage unit. That was a tough one to lose.

But no, seriously again just the statement that this is something that is

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 happening everywhere and it's just something we have to wrestle with and deal with.

CHAIR MURRAY: Thank you, Gordon.
TRUSTEE DELEON-LOPRESTI: Chair Murray, I just have a clarifying question.

CHAIR MURRAY: Sure. Go ahead.
TRUSTEE DELEON-LOPRESTI: The
one-stop center, that very important significant project that we plan for Caumsett Hall, it was my understanding that a similar project needs to be done at the Selden Campus; is that correct? I just wanted to clarify that.

VICE CHAIR MORGO: That is correct, Gemma, sorry.

TRUSTEE DELEON-LOPRESTI: Okay. Great. Thank you.

PRESIDENT BONAHUE: You're exactly right, Trustee Lopresti. And Dr. Rios and I have been having some conversations about that. The idea of the one-stop center is that it will

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 bring all of the student support services together in a very visible way so that students can access all of those services easily.

Right now they are all housed in the Ammerman building. It's not as tricky as Caumsett Hall to go up and down stairs and find your way into the Byzantine hidden depths of the building, but we do need the same type of approach to services at Selden as well so thank you for that.

VICE CHAIR MORGO: That was mentioned yesterday morning, wasn't it?

PRESIDENT BONAHUE: Yes, that's
right. That's right. And we are, I believe, in the current budget we're thinking of this strictly at the planning level and we're going to be working with Paul and Jon on the conceptualization. We're not ready to recommend it as a capital project yet.

TRUSTEE CANARY: One more thing
if I could?

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CHAIR MURRAY: Sure.
TRUSTEE CANARY: Again, it's been
a long time coming and we've we said this before, we'll say it again, the first experience our new students should have on their campuses should not be frustration and just shaking their head and like how do these people have this place set up? This is ridiculous to go to this floor, to that floor, back up to this floor.

It really should have a much better flow and it will have it when we get this all done, but again, just the point that we recognize how critically important it is to have our students have that first good experience on the campuses, and like I said, this has been a long time coming so the sooner we can get this done the better. So we really need to press our sponsors to support this and get it done.

VICE CHAIR MORGO: I had it for four years, but okay.

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 TRUSTEE CANARY: Here, here. CHAIR MURRAY: Any other
questions on either the facilities or capital or any of the other resolutions?
(No response.)
CHAIR MURRAY: So if I can get motions requesting approval of the

College's Resolution Number 2022.01 through 2022.07?

VICE CHAIR MORGO: So moved.
UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Second.
CHAIR MURRAY: All those in
favor, please say aye.
COLLECTIVE RESPONSE: Aye.
CHAIR MURRAY: Any opposed?
(No response.)
CHAIR MURRAY: Motions are passed and the resolutions are approved.
[WHEREUPON THE MOTION MADE AND SECONDED WAS VOTED ON AND CARRIED.]

CHAIR MURRAY: At this point we would like to go to committee reports. I know Budget and Finance we're scheduled March 3rd or something like

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that. Is there anything to add at this point?

TRUSTEE O'CONNOR: No, I do not believe so, no.

CHAIR MURRAY: Student Success?
TRUSTEE FROST: How are you? I'm going to be presenting for Trustee Belinda.

CHAIR MURRAY: Okay.
TRUSTEE FROST: So the
subcommittee meeting was held on Tuesday, February 15th. We reviewed the status of the discussions. Ms. -- let's see. Actually -- I'm sorry.

So essentially the County's
Department of Social Services will
establish a presence on the Grant Campus starting the beginning of March. Zoom access will also be available for students on the Eastern and Ammerman campuses.

The portal is going to be created to coordinate student referrals to the Department of Social Services. We will

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 need to develop an efficient intake process from start to finish so that is still in the works.

We would need a central point of oversight to ensure that we are delivering and administering in a case management style. A student portal will be available behind an access login to ensure privacy and to make sure that our own students are using these services.

Areas such as housing are challenging and we know, we discussed this last month during our board meeting. There are a few good answers to the problem but we're working on
that. We are going to get some resources together.

Access to mental health and wellness resources services will be critical to this so we're going to be putting a resource list for that together as well.

Student Government will assist with reaching out to students so we're

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 going to utilize the three different student government associations and kind of use them to help us do some outreach with this to make sure the students know these services are available and they are utilizing them and even just to serve as guides.

We're also going to be drafting a request form and confirmation of submission that will enable us to direct students to resources within the college and the County. The college's website features a link to an extensive list of student resources so any new resources will be added to that by forwarding contact information and details of that to the Office of Institutional Advancement.

If a student has financial needs, Financial Aid and/or Registrar are automatically contacted so they will be cc'd and they will be made accessible to the student.

So for some next steps we'll be

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 focusing on is creating or is utilizing the academic alert system to reach out to students to determine if there are any underlying issues. So if a student misses a few assignments or classes, faculty could address the academic issues and assess if there are other factors involved and then kind of relay that information from there. So if there is a lack of transportation or a pattern of couch surfing that is affecting the student, that academic alert system is going to be a good starting point for us.

A student may write about their personal experience. Students sometimes write about their personal experiences on assignments or they might talk about it in class. So that will also provide an opportunity for faculty to reach out at this time -- at that time.

We need to get students feeling comfortable about asking for help. That's going to be a cultural thing

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amongst the campus. So if we can establish a culture of it's okay to ask for help and it's okay to talk to your professors that you are having trouble getting to class or you're having trouble eating. If we can foster that environment, I think we'll be in a really good position.

Also mental health services, it would be great if their staff can visit classes and clubs. I think this is already happening, but if we can make this more widespread and if they can visit the classes and clubs amongst the different campuses to talk about the different resources and explain the resources and support that is available to them.

Students studying at Stony Brook University and LIU Post, they need to get internship hours in so we are looking into having them support our college and the staff here so they can fulfill their hours while also assisting

And then developing support materials and helpful information for college faculty. I think we all know the faculty, they are our eyes and ears and they have the chance to see all the different students and meet with all the students. So if they know about our resources that we have available, I think they will relay that to the students in combination with the student government, talking to other students, and get them from all different angles.

And I think we have to remember too that a lot of students, they don't feel comfortable asking for help. They always think there is someone else who is in worse shape than they are so they say to themselves, I don't need anything, but we have the resources here and just making sure that they know that they can use it. So that's Student Success. CHAIR MURRAY: Thank you so much.

TRUSTEE ZARATE: I have a brief question. Zach, thank you so much for sharing that and I think that all those structures that are being put in place to support our students are very important especially when it comes to social and emotional support and trauma-informed practices.

The platform that you mentioned that is going to capture student needs, is that going to be based on student input or both student and faculty input? And is it going to be able to provide data in terms of, you know, what are the support services that are being provided or given to students?

TRUSTEE FROST: Dr. Munsch, can I put this question on you? I'm not too sure how the data is coming in, but $I$ think Dr. Munsch is very involved in this.

TRUSTEE ZARATE: Thank you. And I guess tied to that the question is,

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 are there going to be tiered intervention services that are going to be set in terms of meeting the needs of those students?

INTERIM VICE PRESIDENT MUNSCH:
So to your first question, the survey, intake survey the students will be doing has been developed in draft form. It's being reviewed by our student government associations now to identify if we have missed any critical points. The draft was made by our mental health team because they are the ones who have the most understanding in terms of what needs are coming in. Once that survey has been completed, the student will get an outreach call and the appropriate appointment will get made on behalf of the student, either with the Department of Social Services via Zoom or on campus with our mental health team or potentially the Financial Aid office. Once the process is underway, the

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 next step again is this bigger picture and this potential opportunity to use grant funding to grow this into what $I$ think Trustee Zarate is talking, kind of a more robust system.

This is our first step in trying to identify this work and how we can use this in a way to support students more fully and completely while we get everything organized to do something in a holistic manner.

I'm not sure if $I$ answered all of your questions, but that is kind of the outline of where we're going.

TRUSTEE ZARATE: Yes, thank you. And that is my goal in terms of asking that question because these students have gone through so much during the past two years that this is going to be a long process of support needed for these students. So it's great that you're definitely structuring this long-term support.

The other question that I had

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 was, are we going to make this survey accessible in other languages for students that may still be acquiring the second language?

INTERIM VICE PRESIDENT MUNSCH:
We can certainly make the survey available in more than one language and we can work with our departments to have it accessible in more than one format.

We do have mental health
counselors and the department of social services staff working in a bilingual way. So we will be able to service students with both English or Spanish speaking.

So we will have services available in both languages, but we can certainly make the survey available in both languages as well.

TRUSTEE ZARATE: Thank you very much.

## INTERIM VICE PRESIDENT MUNSCH:

 Sure.CHAIR MURRAY: Gordon?

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TRUSTEE CANARY: The statement I wanted to make was just that in my capacity as the chief of staff for a state senator, I'm seeing an uptick in our district office of people reaching out for help. And it's greatly concerning because federal stimulus money is not there anymore, unemployment extensions are not there anymore.

Eviction moratorium has been lifted.
And we are now starting to see the results of all this and people are probably in worse shape now than they were before COVID hit. And we definitely have a great need for this type of service for our students. Zach, thank you for that report. And it's very encouraging to see us really grappling with this, really taking this to task and providing this kind of assistance because it is going to be desperately needed, absolutely. CHAIR MURRAY: Thank you, Gordon. PRESIDENT BONAHUE: If I could,

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Mr. Chairman, we heard from Trustee Frost how the Department of Social Services will place a case worker at the Suffolk campus which is most welcomed. I've also been in communication with Commissioner Rosalie Drago about also placing a job developer from the Department of Labor at the Suffolk Campus.

So our hope is that we will be able to not only work on this constellation of issues ranging from basic needs of food insecurity and housing insecurity and mental health, but also to employment in ways that can connect our students no matter what their background, no matter what their involvement with the college with those kinds of services.

CHAIR MURRAY: Great.
Any other questions?
(No response.)
VICE CHAIR MORGO: Did she agree to have a representative?

PRESIDENT BONAHUE: We have agreed in principle, Trustee Morgo. And so as you know, the devil is always in the details. And we're meeting with Carol Wickliffe-Campbell. She's been good enough to arrange a meeting for us for next week.

CHAIR MURRAY: Gordon, I know Governance did not meet.

TRUSTEE CANARY: No, sir.
CHAIR MURRAY: Personnel, I don't believe met. Is that correct, Gemma?

TRUSTEE DELEON-LOPRESTI: We haven't met but $I$ do want to note that beginning in April and May the stakeholder feedback process will commence and so $I$ would like to schedule a meeting with the Personnel Committee sometime in March.

CHAIR MURRAY: We're staying in the flow which is good.

Advocacy, I know Priscilla you met.

TRUSTEE ZARATE: Yes. Thank you,

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 Trustee. I'm sorry, Chair.

So the Advocacy Committee meeting was held on February 14th at 12:30 via Zoom teleconference. Present were myself, Trustee Morgo, Trustee Pagdanganan, Drew Biondo, Ben Zwirn, and Carmen Torres.

During this meeting I shared an overview of the State of State Budget Address meeting which $I$ attended on January 28th. Herein Secretary of State Robert Rodriguez presented the governor's plans for the state budget which highlighted proposed funding and upgrades throughout Long Island.

Ben Zwirn, college legislative affairs, discussed the governor's budget which was an overall positive outlook for community colleges.

A key component outlined in the governor's budget which differs from previous years was a floor funding. With floor funding the college would be held harmless from enrollment

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 reductions. So SUNY will attempt to move to a pre-pandemic enrollment baseline instead of the current pandemic year outline which would allow the -which would allow for approximately 38 million in additional aid across the entire SUNY system.

Childcare funding was another area included in the budget which had not been in the past. So ongoing capital projects within the college will receive funding. Three of those were already mentioned by Trustee Morgo which are the infrastructure, the Workforce Development, and expansion of the automotive center.

In terms of the advocacy, Mr. Zwirn suggested presentations before the Legislative Education Committee with some of the college's specialty programs such as cybersecurity, culinary, and automotive to inform legislators of the various program options at the college.

At the state level, requests to

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 Assemblyman Fred Thiele and Senator Jim Gaughran asking for their support of the governor's proposed budget have been made. The committee held a discussion and agreed that once all budgets were in and decided on the committee will have a better understanding of where the areas of focus should be.

The committee will reconvene in the next month with a date and time to be determined. Thank you.

CHAIR MURRAY: Any questions for Priscilla?
(No response.)
CHAIR MURRAY: Hearing none,
we'll go to -- Facilities we've done so Foundation?

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR DIAZ: Good afternoon everyone, Sylvia Diaz,

Executive Director of the Foundation. I'm covering for Bell who is actually at her retirement party this evening.

Thank you all. Very excited. Speaking of Bell, National Grid has

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 recently awarded $\$ 60,000$ to the Foundation to acquire and install a solar tree at the Veterans' Plaza at the Ammerman in Selden in response to a request made to the Foundation by students in the Environmental Club. Led by faculty advisors Melanie Morris and Carol Malley, our students delivered a great appeal to a panel of National Grid experts and they were spectacular, weren't they, Dr. Bonahue?

PRESIDENT BONAHUE: Absolutely. EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR DIAZ: Dr. Bonahue was also on the call. I guess I would like to take these students with me everywhere I ask for support for projects at Suffolk, but they are just spectacular.

And their enthusiasm was praised by National Grid's experts. And of course again, thanks to Trustee Pagdanganan for seeing the connection between our students' passion and this wonderful funding opportunity.

Once installed the National Grid solar tree will be the first of its kind on the SUNY campus and the first to be installed on Long Island. The solar tree will collect the sun's energy and return to the grid and provide unlimited charging access for electric devices like cell phones, laptops, tablets, and more. So that's very, very exiting. The New York State Supreme Court has ruled and with the support of the New York State Attorney's Charities Bureau has now authorized the transfer of the charitable gift endowment held by the former Dowling College to the Suffolk Community College Foundation. The transfer of this generous restricted scholarship endowment was the subject of extensive litigation that was informed by myself, Vice President Mary Lou Araneo, Kristie David, in my office, as well as Christopher Williams.

We reviewed hundreds of documents
including the former Dowling scholarship

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 agreements that then needed to be aligned with the current offerings at Suffolk and presented to the court.

Dowling College's legacy of excellence continues now at Suffolk and we will certainly -- this will certainly benefit our students for generations to come.
appreciate the work of Trustee Kevin O'Connor who really played a critical role at the very beginning of this process and stayed with us throughout. So much appreciation to Kevin for doing a fantastic job and supporting us in this. Thank you.

TRUSTEE O'CONNOR: Thank you. EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR DIAZ: The Foundation is also happy to announce the establishment of a new scholarship in environmental science forestry program students on their pathway to success.

And the Three Village Garden Club founded over 100 years ago, is providing

an annual generous gift of $\$ 5,000$ to our students in that program. The members of Three Village Garden Club support the Arboretum in Setauket and provide meaningful scholarships to students also at Farmingdale and Melville High School.

With spring around the corner,
feels like it today, I would like you to warm up and join the college for a virtual wine tasting on Thursday, February 24 th at 6:00 p.m. with Del Vino Vineyards, Northport. And the cost is only $\$ 150$ per person. This is a continuation of some of our virtual events which have been fairly successful. And I think it will be something that we continue to add to our portfolios as things evolve.

You can participate in this event by registering online. I think the deadline is tomorrow at close of business but we look forward to having your participation. Of course our participants must be 21 years and older.

there is going to be a canine cabaret at the Van Nostrand Theater right here at the Grant Campus called Mutts Gone Nuts which is a canine cabaret. General admission is $\$ 15$, discounted for veterans and students under the age of 16 and free admission for Suffolk students.

TRUSTEE FROST: Correct, yes. I should have said that, student trustees, yep.

TRUSTEE CANARY: Got it. That's what I thought. Okay. Thanks. CHAIR MURRAY: Anybody else? (No response.)

CHAIR MURRAY: If not, I'm going

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 to the chair's report which is going to be very quick because $I$ don't really have anything to report, but $I$ do want to just thank all the trustees for, as you see everyone is working and contributing and it's great. It makes things a lot easier. So that's my report, the chair's report. So next will be the president's report.

PRESIDENT BONAHUE: Thank you, Mr. Chairman and trustees. Thank you as always for your contribution of time and service. It's truly impressive all the time that you're putting in for the benefit of our students so thank you very much.

Let me take this opportunity to thank Dr. Ciampa for hosting the meeting today here at the Grant Campus. Let me also recognize our association and governance leaders. Professor Tat Sang So from the Grant Campus Assembly is here. We do not -- I don't see Professor Lizzy McCormick or Professor

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 Nina Acquavita but we thank them for their service.

Dante Morelli and Courtney Brewer are here from the Faculty Association. Thank you for being here. Also Professor Sean Tvelia from the Administrator's Guild, thank you, Sean, whose contract we've just extended. Congratulations. Good job.
(Round of applause)
PRESIDENT BONAHUE: And I also see Josephine Makowski from AME. And have I missed anyone? No. Thank you.

All of us, we got a little card for Trustee Pagdanganan, and Sylvia Diaz is going to run literally from here to her retirement party at National Grid. So if anyone would like to sign the card -- is it going around? That's great.

Thanks to -- I just want to thank our association and governance leaders again as we move into strategic planning and the next semester of strategic

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 planning and discussion of enrollment and instructional practice. Their contributions are always invaluable.

Trustees, as I let you know on Friday, our enrollment as we began the spring semester was down between 10 and 11 percent, but with a late start term beginning on March 3rd, you may remember in the fall we regained 2 percent of our enrollment in the late start term.

And just before this meeting actually, Professor Tvelia from the science department informed me that all the courses he had loaded up for late start, they were snapped up. So, Sean, maybe more courses and keep up the good work because the late start courses do serve quite a lot of students and it's a good way of allowing students not to have to wait until the beginning of summer, but they can get started right now in March.

As I mentioned a couple of weeks ago, no SUNY community colleges are

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 seeing any increase in enrollment right now, but we do have some positive signs with COVID subsiding and you may have noticed that the positivity rate now is about 2 percent as opposed to 20 percent where we were in December.

And with very little serious
illness we are getting back into high schools to do face-to-face outreach on college nights and those kind of activities, and our applications are already up over 600 more right now this year than they were last year.

And also when we ran the data on students who came to Suffolk for the first time this spring, we had almost a 40 percent increase over last year. So we added more new students this January, significantly more, than we added last year at this time.

So obviously our mutual hope and what we're going to work towards is that continued outreach, not only for traditional students but for our adult

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 learners and -- our adult learners as well.

You also know, I believe, that Suffolk County dropped its masking requirement for County employees no matter what their work location and SUNY seems likely to be relaxing its own expectation for system-wide measures. We expect that SUNY going forward is going to issue recommendations for vaccinations and boosters and masking, but the important question for us is going to be what force those recommendations have.

Are we going to be required to comply with SUNY recommendations on public health, or is SUNY really and truly saying to colleges and universities find the public health policies that work for your region and for your students? You balance access to opportunity with public health.

And as you know, in Suffolk
County this is an issue for some of our

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 students and we're going to obviously as we go forward, we are going to do everything we can to balance safety for our whole community and public health with access for our students.

As you heard in the financial reports, we're still waiting on a formal call letter from the County which will help us shape our own expectations.

The governor's report, as you heard from Trustee Zarate and Dr. Harris, is very favorable to community colleges. And I've given you, trustees who are here in person, one of the handouts that you will see at your place is a handout for advocacy prepared by NYSIC and NYCAP.

That's it Trustee Sanders.
It has the talking points and why the governor's budget is very favorable to community colleges. Trustees, we'll send that out to the whole board. I'll send out that one-pager. It does keep a funding floor in place for the community

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 college system and what's in the governor's budget is a pre-pandemic funding floor which is most welcomed and there are also, as you heard, there are measures that will allow for reintroduction of some workforce education back into the funding formula as well as support for basic needs including childcare as Trustee Zarate reported.

Ben Zwirn told me this morning that mark up on the governor's budget begins in Albany next week and so we'll know more about how much support there is for that budget, but as we go forward as all of you are community leaders and you are in contact with state-wide elected officials, please know that the governor's budget is very favorable to community colleges and you'll appreciate their support.

I sent out the next draft of our strategic plan two weeks ago and I don't know if you've had a chance to take a

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 look at that, but $I$ just want to mention -- again, there is a handout here and we're going to display it online. Steve, can you switch it over for me?

This semester we're focusing on the strategic values that are opportunities for really priority action for the college to look at. The mission statement and vision statement we haven't look at yet. That will probably be the last thing that we do. You will remember that last semester we had quite a great discussion about our values. We've tweaked them slightly in response to feedback that we received from around the college. Our aspirational goals also seem to be in good shape.

So the emphasis this semester will be on strategic objectives and these are the priorities for broad institutional action, broad initiatives that no one office can accomplish but

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 that are going to involve multiple campuses, multiple divisions working together to operationalize these kinds of broadly scaled outcomes.

We've drafted, based on input that came in from last semester's town hall meetings and based on survey responses that came in over the winter, bullets that suggest more specific, more measurable activities, strategic objectives that are aligned with each aspirational goal.

So within open access, again, we're talking about what we need to do is have a more operational and consistent plan for outreach and recruitment in secondary schools, a more comprehensive strategy for recruiting and enrolling adult students and so forth.

In student learning, again, there are several areas of emphasis. The first one under student learning is to incorporate more data on student

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 outcomes into decision-making about instruction and about curriculum and about pathways.

And quite of few of these bullets as well as the bullets in student engagement and success are focused on retention, on keeping the students that we have, having a better understanding of the pathways that they are taking as they move through the college because we all know when we serve the students who are already here, it creates that virtuous cycle that we all want. Those students become our ambassadors. They help the spread the good news of what their experience has been. And that's the way we will build from strength to strength.

We will continue to work on equity, social justice. And Christina Vargas and I have already looked at some possible templates for baseline measures and an annual equity report.
And I continue to work with all

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 of the vice presidents and the campus deans on community-facing work and on really kind of a focus on, as Dr. Harris said, making investments in resource allocation that are aligned with student success.

So for every dollar that we spent, can we anticipate why is this a good investment? How is this helping us move the needle on access, on equity, on student completions, on retention?

And so we're going to try to take a very intentional approach to resource allocation to consistent staffing within the college and really to trying to take a very transparent view of how we make those decisions based on data.

I invite you to review the objectives. Please, they are very much a draft. And we're going to this semester, just like last semester, we have scheduled a town hall meeting at each campus where I will go through those objectives, what $I$ think they

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 mean, how they are based on the feedback that we collected from the community and what we hope that they will accomplish.

This is a little bit harder conversation than the aspirations and the values that we talked about last semester because now we are talking about the actions that we're going to take together, and it may not be the way we've worked together in the past, but there is a merging consensus that these are the themes that keep coming up and so these are the areas that we have to continue to find ways to work together. Thank you, Steve. I just want to say a word about Offshore Wind training because I know Trustee Sanders was able to go to the governor's event last week or was it this week?

TRUSTEE SANDERS: I don't even know.

PRESIDENT BONAHUE: It's all a
blur. It was last Friday I think. It's

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 all a blur.

At the same time that the governor was having a public event in the Hamptons, NYSERDA was at the same time holding, co-hosting a meeting with SUNY on workforce training opportunities related to Offshore Wind.

As you know, Suffolk was early into the mix. As Orstead came to Suffolk County we established the partnership with the fed and with the Building Trades Council and we are obviously an important partner in the nonprofit that we're establishing for training.

At the same time, SUNY is now ramping up an additional pot of money for workforce training initiatives to be carried out through the colleges and universities and they are interested in hearing more from the community colleges and from the universities about how we see ourselves participating in this ecosystem for Offshore Wind.

So as Lou and I continue to work with our partners and the contract that we're putting into place with Orstead, obviously Orstead doesn't want to see the college competing with the nonprofit. At the same time, I think our goal needs to be to try to conserve as much flexibility as possible so that we're not accused of always competing with ourselves.

There are a variety of training opportunities that could be parallel to Offshore Wind and we need not put ourselves in a box, paint ourselves into a corner, choose your metaphor, when it comes to limiting ourselves with other training opportunities that might be available.

A few quick hits, trustees. You heard from Dr. Diaz about our solar tree and I especially just have to call out Trustee Pagdanganan, Trustee O'Connor. Thank you for connecting the dots and showing us that this was an opportunity

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 available to the college.

February, of course, is Black History Month. At your place you'll find -- you may have seen on the Suffolk website, because we have it as one of the features of the main part of the website, but you will see that we have a variety of programs all month at all three campuses ranging from health and wellness to advocacy and empowerment, to recovering and making visible some important chapters from American history that have been covered over and need to be celebrated at this time.

I want to share with you that Trustee Sanders has invited me to be a part of this year's Equal Opportunity Day and Equity Summit, and I'm pleased to join you with the Urban League and the State of Black Long Island and look forward to presenting on the opportunities that we at Suffolk offer.

I want to share with the board that I also had the privilege of meeting

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 with Chief Harry Wallace of the Unkechaug Nation. I enjoyed learning from him about the Unkechaug Nation which is down in the Moriches area. We agreed that we would continue to talk and collaborate about the ways the college can be involved with this sovereign indigenous nation that remains on Long Island.

I would be remiss if I didn't remind you once more that there is an important event coming up on April 8th where several of us have speaking roles and I hope you will keep on your calendar that's April 8th is the presidential inauguration.

It's an important event in the life of the college and an important opportunity to celebrate all the good work that this college does for the community. And so if you don't already have it as a red letter day on your calendars, please add it.

Mr. Chairman, that's my report.

questions?
VICE CHAIR MORGO: I have three
follow-ups. I didn't know that the
governor included the freeze pandemic
floor in her budget. Priscilla
mentioned we talked about it but that is really excellent.

correct. That is correct.
VICE CHAIR MORGO: It's a new
day.
PRESIDENT BONAHUE: Correct.
VICE CHAIR MORGO: In an
alternative universe. The budget is good for us. That's very good.

PRESIDENT BONAHUE: We would have been happy with 98 percent. My understanding is that what's in there is 100 percent.

VICE CHAIR MORGO: That's
incredible. That's good news.
And you might have -- I got the impression that you were saying more

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 than you were saying when you were talking about the Offshore Wind. I may be mistaken.

Is there any indication that there would be limitations of our going to workforce training beyond the ark that, you know, is there an agreement not to compete or anything like that? You're looking at Lou.

PRESIDENT BONAHUE: Within the -we offer a variety of programs, right, related to electronics, emergency medical technician. There are probably others that I don't remember.

Do you remember any of the others?

MR. PETRIZZO: Physical
education, water safety, fire safety, those programs. The issue of noncompete is not with Orstead because Orstead --

VICE CHAIR MORGO: It's with the not for profit.

MR. PETRIZZO: It's with the -it's with Maersk, who is the trainer,

and the trainer has some questions about what we would do with those programs.

And we're working through some language to try to make clear to them that we had those programs before you got here, we're going to have those programs after you're long gone, and we're not really going to be in the business of training global wind organizational people because that is what you do and that's a certification that we don't have. So we're trying to clear that up.

VICE CHAIR MORGO: They are all pre-existing programs and there is no reason they should be inhibited.

PRESIDENT BONAHUE: Exactly. We're not going to stop offering fire safety and electronics because the nonprofit is going to take it on.

VICE CHAIR MORGO: And we'll also be a cooperating member of the not for profit as we agreed in the contract.

PRESIDENT BONAHUE: Exactly.
That is the subject, yes.

VICE CHAIR MORGO: Thank you. I can't stand subtlety.

The third thing just when you were talking about enrollment, was there anything from the Stony Brook council meeting that --

PRESIDENT BONAHUE: There was. They are out of their lane in terms of transfer enrollment. So they are -their transfer enrollments, they are down 200 this year. And you were right, I did find it. I had to watch it quite a ways in, but $I$ am reaching out to Dr. McInnis, the president at Stony Brook, and I would love for us to have a very visible kind of $2-\mathrm{plus-2}$ partnership where we can do a mutual recruitment for Stony Brook, not one that is co-branded.

I can easily picture -- what is it? The Suffolk Seawolves, Seawolves at Suffolk, the Shark Seawolves, but I could -- I would like to see us do a more visible co-branding, not that we

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 don't appreciate the relationship that we have with every university partner, but Stony Brook is often a specific interest for our students and because they are -- their transfer admissions are down, I hope they should be interested in that opportunity.

VICE CHAIR MORGO: They should be.

PRESIDENT BONAHUE: They should be.

VICE CHAIR MORGO: It will be to their benefit as well.

PRESIDENT BONAHUE: They should be.

VICE CHAIR MORGO: Just
clarification, trustees, I had heard that the counsel that $I$ was once a part of, there was talk about their relationship with Suffolk County Community College on their board meeting on Monday morning. I didn't see it. I suggested to Ed that he get somebody to take a look and I didn't know if my

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 information was correct.

PRESIDENT BONAHUE: It was correct. Thank you, sir.

TRUSTEE SANDERS: I have a question. One of the things that came up when we were all discussing the Offshore Wind was the business ecosystem around the actual wind training. You know, the food and beverage industry and the hotel industry, the housing industry. I mean $I$ think we need to think about some of the things with training, culinary, et cetera because it's going to be a big need in all these other sectors. When we start talking about what is getting ready to come to Long Island, it's going to be a big deal.

PRESIDENT BONAHUE: Especially on the construction side. LIA continues to provide a lot of leadership on the supply chain side of this, right, on the manufacture, construction, maintenance, all of the supply chain elements,

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 because that really diversifies the different kinds of businesses that are going to be part of the ecosystem. I think those are important opportunities and the college needs to continue to look out for those as well. You're exactly right.

CHAIR MURRAY: Anything else?
PRESIDENT BONAHUE: I also left
in your places, trustees, a folder of materials from the Manufacturing Training Center. Under the leadership of John Lombardo and Laura Galletta we continue to do a lot of outreach to companies.

We had been a little bit restricted by the idea that everyone who works for a company who wants to come on campus to take a noncredit course has to be vaccinated, has to be boosted. That is one of the things we need to clarify with SUNY.

But I wanted you to be aware that we have these training opportunities

Please take a look at these because these are important opportunities for businesses in our area and they are also important pathways for us to recruit students who may already be working. CHAIR MURRAY: Any other questions or going to roundtable? Anything for the roundtable?

TRUSTEE SANDERS: Yes. I know
that one of you mentioned it, the Urban League is entering its 47 th Equal Opportunity Day and Equity Summit. It's going to be a full day of workshops and seminars and at the end of the day we're going to be honoring Northwell Health. You know, health in these last two years has been a real system to focus in on and we want to just recognize them, but $I$ also want to publicly thank Dr. Bonahue for serving on the panel for education equity. It's going to be very interesting when we talk about what does that look

Board of Trustees, 02/17/2022 like and what does it mean. And I think Suffolk in terms of pipelining -- I'm a little biased, but Suffolk in terms of pipelining students for the most part through an academic experience that they probably would not have gotten if they didn't start here.

So I'm looking forward to it.

Good afternoon and thank you. Overall the Student Association is doing very well. Student programming continues to increase as students become more engaged back on campus.

The budget that you see represents the first installment of the Spring 22 student fees. The College Association Advisory Council has met this week to discuss the budget. It is important to note that the budget adjustments will be made in order to manage the decrease in revenue as a result and the decrease in student enrollment.

The outreach to the Campus Kids that we discussed last month has yielded an additional nine children to the center. While this is a wonderful opportunity and improvement in our numbers at the center, this is still lower than expected and we anticipate a budget deficit in the center.
The Peconic Cafe is currently

also running at a deficit. This is an anticipated deficit as a result of the enrollment decline and the shift of students in selecting online classes. The campus leadership and the director of the cafe continue to monitor sales to determine how to best proceed in offering campus food service while minimizing loss.
