4	time I would like to introduce Vice
5	President for Business and Financial
6	Affairs, Dr. Mark Harris, to present the
7	college budget and college financial
8	records.
9	VICE PRESIDENT HARRIS: Good
10	morning, Mr. Chair, members of the Board
11	of Trustees.
12	The financial statements that we
13	present and the incoming expenditures
14	represent transactions for the full
15	fiscal year starting September 1, 2020,
16	all the way through August 31, 2021.
17	For the next few months the
18	financial team will be working on
19	reporting final end dates as well as
20	working with our internal auditors to
21	ensure proper accounting and reporting
22	of all the transactions that we have
23	done within the past fiscal year.
24	Similar to last year one of the
25	challenges that we had as a college, and

I think it's institution-wide, not just us but the other SUNY and I'm sure the CUNY schools, were the reporting requirements because they were so unique because we had that one element of HEERF funding.

We expect that this year will be a little easier because we have gone through a full fiscal year end close cycle including HEERF, but there are still some transactions that will need further clarification from the audit team primarily because the requirement for HEERF II changed somewhat.

So we will be working with them to make sure that we fully understand the reporting requirements as well as work with the Comptroller's office with the SUNY system.

So the numbers in the financial statements are always subject to change based on the guidelines from the external auditors as well as the Comptroller's office.

At a very high level in summary of the revenue and expenses, so for Fiscal 21, if you recall, without grants we budgeted about 205.3 million dollars. Based on what we presented to the board, our preliminary projections for fiscal year is about 222 million dollars and this primarily is because of how we have to treat the proceeds from HEERF, based on the proceeds from HEERF that we drew down.

Please know that without HEERF support and our ability to manage the allocated funds, potentially we would have been reporting a total loss revenue of about 8 million dollars primarily because of the 5.4 million dollars in reduction in tuition and fees and also because the State reduced our budget by about 5 percent or 2.6 million dollars.

When we did an analysis of every single revenue category, we realized that there was about a 16.4 percent reduction in each category. So, again,

Board of Trustees, 09/25/2021 the emphasis is without HEERF funding the discussion today may have been a little bit different.

As indicated before, we've implemented cost mitigation efforts. We still have some of those mitigation efforts in place because it does provide us with an opportunity to really assess how we spend, how we conduct our operations.

To budget personnel service related obligations about 11.7 percent down, and this is for Fiscal 21 based on our projection. The supply items were down 13.3 percent. So when we aggregate the expenses relative to budget, we're about 5.6 percent down.

And this number pretty much has remained steady relative to what we have reported over the past few years, but again, these numbers are subject to change once we have received final external audit review, and in fact our fee work for auditing will start

Board of Trustees, 09/25/2021 sometime around October.

So as we get closer to finalizing the numbers with our Fiscal 21, we will be in a much better position to provide the Board of Trustees a more accurate number for what we think the fund balance number will be to close that Fiscal 21.

Just 2 quick updates with HEERF III. So our Fiscal 21 numbers predominantly or should I say solely include HEERF I and HEERF II. If a 3rd round of funding, ARP, the American Rescue Plan, which is HEERF III.

So the total funds that the college is eligible to receive or utilize by May 2022 is 45 million dollars or 45.3 million dollars. Of that number 22.7 million dollars must go to students and the remaining 22.5 million dollars can be utilized by the institution provided that we meet the eligible guidelines as outlined by SUNY and not US Department of Education.

For the student portion of HEERF the college plans on dispersing 40 percent of that 22.7 million dollars during Fall 2021 and working with the financial aid team our goal is to get the funds out to the students about the 1st week of October.

40 percent of the funding to be dispersed in Spring 2022 and then there is about 20 percent or 4.5 million dollars that we will have to provide additional support to students who have extenuating circumstances as a result of COVID.

One of the things that we're trying to do is see whether or not we can get an extension from the US Department of Education to extend not only the budget timeline for the institutional piece but also the student piece, and that would allow us to be able to provide support to students over a much longer period beyond May 2022.

So for the institutional funds we

can use the eligible -- we can use the eligible funds for loss revenue,

incremental costs linked to COVID-19,

which would include testing for students, faculty, and staff, also for mental health and wellness, and also additional student grants.

And I think critically for us the implementation of what SUNY dubbed as evidence-based practices towards the students. So those are the criteria that the institutional funds can be used for.

And then before I get into the resolutions, the only update on cash is based on our ability to really manage our expenses and really take a look at how operations is conducted. As of today we can say that our liquidity remains strong compared to previous years where we have had some serious discussions about our remaining liquidity. So, again, our cash position as of today remains strong.

So, Mr. Chair, before I discuss the two resolutions, I just wanted to pause here to see whether or not there are any questions from members of the board.

CHAIR MURRAY: I actually have a question. So from what you said our financial well-being right now is a large part a result of the federal funding that we received and there is no guarantee that in the 2022-'23 budget that funding very well may not be available. Is that a fair statement?

VICE PRESIDENT HARRIS: That is correct. So based on our federal stimulus funding, the college is required to use the funding by May 2022. Our plan is to ask for an extension but given the obligations that we have in terms of student support, mental health, evidence-based activities for students, and a big part of it for us is going to be loss of revenue given where we are based on the disruption of COVID.

2	So in our 2022-'23 budget the
3	answer would be definitely no. Unless
4	the federal government implements
5	another stimulus, the funding will not
6	be there prior to our close this year.
7	CHAIR MURRAY: I think you said,
8	and correct me if I'm wrong, that
9	without the federal funding that we
10	received this year, we would run about
11	an 8 million dollar deficit.
12	VICE PRESIDENT HARRIS: At least
13	an 8 million dollar deficit. When we
14	look at the 5.4 million dollars just in
15	base tuition and fee reduction and then
16	also that 5 percent cut from SUNY of 2.6
17	million dollars, that would be our
18	baseline discussion in terms of revenue.
19	CHAIR MURRAY: So not to be a
20	killjoy, but while things are good now
21	we're going to have challenges next
22	year.
23	VICE PRESIDENT HARRIS: Correct.
24	CHAIR MURRAY: All right.
25	Anybody else have questions?

4	So when we talk about these
5	deficit situations, it always brings to
6	mind, what is our total outstanding
7	amount of tuition arrears that I think
8	was hovering in the 20 million range for
9	the last few years? Do you have a feel
10	for what that is right now?
11	VICE PRESIDENT HARRIS: Well, so
12	right now when we look at our potential
13	write-off for Fiscal 21, we're talking
14	about a bad debt of about 1.2, 1.2
15	million dollars. So the number still
16	remains very high.
17	One of the disadvantages that we
18	have had this year based on the mandate
19	from the governor's office is that we
20 ,	could not send accounts to collection.
21	So we were hampered by that as well.
22	The only good news for us,
23	Trustee Canary, is that we were able to
24	reduce some of the outstanding balances
2.5	for students who were here starting

2	March 2020 and beyond. So we were able
3	to reduce some of the deficit, but the
4	accounts receivable still poses a
5	challenge for us.
6	But my team along with other
7	members of the college are working to
8	see how best to make payment
9	arrangements for some of these students
10	so that they can reduce their balance
11	and so those students have the ability
12	to re-register for classes if they
13	choose to.
14	TRUSTEE CANARY: Thank you.
15	CHAIR MURRAY: Anybody else?
16	PRESIDENT BONAHUE: Question from
17	Trustee Zarate.
18	TRUSTEE ZARATE: I have a
19	question. So when you mentioned the
20	word extension, is this also considered
21	a rollover of funds for the following
22	year?
23	VICE PRESIDENT HARRIS: Well,
24	let's clarify to say we have the ability
25	to spend the funds beyond May '22. So

if we're granted the extension, and

we're hoping that we could get at least

one-year extension, that would give us

the ability to draw down the funds until

May 2023.

The way the funding works is we have to disperse, say on the student side, for example, we have to disperse out of the college's bank account and then we do the drawdown. So based on the budget timeline we could not draw down anything after May 2022 but the extension would allow us to have access to those funds beyond that.

add, I'm not sure if it's the same at the college level but in the P-through-12 level New York State Department of Education tends to oftentimes do grant the extension of the funds to be utilized by the school districts. And it has been done in New York City for many, many years to the point that they have rolled over even 33

3	Department of Education.
4	So I'm just wondering, you know,
5	if they have the same policy when it
6	comes to the college level in terms of
7	allowing school districts I'm sorry,
8	colleges the opportunity to have these
9	extensions and rollovers.
10	VICE PRESIDENT HARRIS: Right.
11	So I think the difference is the US
12	Department of Education has to grant us
13	that because they were the ones provided
14	the funding and not the State.
15	TRUSTEE ZARATE: Thank you.
16	CHAIR MURRAY: Any other

23	the standard monthly service payment to

2,829,218.71, and this is in line with what we have seen for the past few months based on the adjusted rates.

The 2nd resolution, Item Number 2, are the budget transfers and I would categorize these in 5 totals. The first batch \$57,270, 2nd batch \$26,626, the 3rd batch for 40,000, and then the 4th batch for \$122,376.

And what these transfers will allow is for blanket purchase orders to be standard, standard by the departments and capture them in the right buckets. So really and truly we're just putting them in the right buckets here.

And then the final resolution -the final lump sum for \$15,617 is to
allow for the performance of electrical
work for the auto tech lift at the
Ammerman Campus. Again, the funding is
within the campus, we're just moving it
from the administrative aspect to the
auto shop itself.

Those are the 2 resolutions that

13	the community and to meet so many
14	community leaders. Thank you trustees
15	for being here either face-to-face or
16	virtually and thank you as always for
17	your contribution of time and service.
18	To all of you who were able to
19	attend the reception last night, thanks
20	so much. I think we had a great
21	turnout, as you heard, of government
22	officials and business leaders.
23	And especially as Sylvia
24	mentioned, the automotive group is just
25	on fire We are getting such strong

Board of Trustees, 09/25/2021 support from many of those dealership associations, and they recognize that automotive is really one of our flagship programs and a real source of support for them.

It was also a pleasure to meet last night with foundation board directors, President Emeritus Sal La Lima was present and that was terrific to meet him. I see Theresa laughing. That must be a blast from the past, but it was great to meet him and to hear more, and I'm going to follow up with him to learn more about some of the early days of Suffolk. And I know you will join me in continuing to reach out and connect with community leaders with whom we can partner in student success and community and economic development.

I want to give you an update on the intertwined issues of enrollment and our reopening amidst COVID. As of last week we ended the main part of our fall registration with our headcount and FTE

Board of Trustees, 09/25/2021 enrollment still down 14 percent, 14 percent from the previous year.

In an informal survey taken by college business officers this was among the higher declines in the State. Not one community college reported an increase but some colleges were down maybe only 4 percent, 5 percent, 6 percent. Nassau was down 8 percent. A few of the upstate colleges were down as much as 15 or 16 percent.

As a reminder, we've added more late start fall sections than usual and we hope to maybe modestly pick up some enrollment there, but obviously we need to continue to focus on enrollment as a strategic priority, think about the many different audiences that Suffolk needs to serve, not be reliant just on our traditional full-time high school graduates but look at new audiences that we need to be serving as a college.

We're still trying to understand how enrollment was impacted by the SUNY

Board of Trustees, 09/25/2021

mandate that every student who comes to campus must be vaccinated. We have about 10,000 -- just under 10,000 students in some kind of on-campus class, most of those in for-credit classes, about 500 or 600 in noncredit classes.

But this mandate applies to all of them and the deadline for students turning in their confirmation of vaccination is September 27th. We have worked through that list of 10,000 students. As of last night we were down below 1,000 students in our for-credit classes and we still had a few hundred in our noncredit classes.

So with many thanks to our nursing staff, the Student Affairs professionals, we are just working through that list. The Eastern Campus has been completely cleared and we're close to getting the Grant Campus and Ammerman. We're just really working quickly through the last names on the

1 Board of Trustees, 09/25/2021 2 list. 3 That being said, there has been 4 the possibility that we're going to come 5 to the morning of September 28th and 6 find that we still have a significant 7 number of students for whom we do not 8 have vaccination information. 9 Recognizing this, SUNY earlier this week 10 organized a presidents' call and 11 indicated, Chancellor Malatra indicated 12 that he supports having some grace 13 period, having some grace period 14 especially for community colleges and 15 those of us serving part-time students, 16 commuting students, first-generation 17 students, and that he supports having a 18 grace period. 19 So just last night I received 20 some additional information from SUNY 21 suggesting that even on the 28th there 22 could be a 10-day grace period. This is 23 new information for staff. I just 24 shared -- I just got it last night.

We don't have the exact language

but my hope is that it will be forthcoming today or tomorrow and that rather than automatically deregistering students and putting them in a position where they might be forfeiting tuition and fees, we can envision perhaps some kind of alternate leave of absence policy or commutation of fees to the spring semester. That is a policy of having a leave of absence and then a potential reinstatement.

So SUNY will give some discretion and flexibility to institutions based on the guidance we received last night, and that's welcomed news because no one wants to wake up and have a headline that says X SUNY college or university drops so many hundreds of students. So that's traditional support that we're getting from the system.

I want to give a brief update on a long-term project that the college has been looking at with board leadership and that's the Wyandanch project, the

Board of Trustees, 09/25/2021 Wyandanch Rising Project.

I want to thank Trustee Sanders for bringing me up to speed late in July on the college's long-term efforts to look at the possibility of partnering with Suffolk County, the Urban League, and other stakeholders in a project that could bring some workforce development activity to a terribly underserved part of Suffolk County which is in Wyandanch in the Town of Babylon.

In the last month or so I have been trying to gather more information.

I went over to Wyandanch to see a property where Suffolk could potentially take up residence. It would be a rental so we would need a business plan for why that rental makes sense for us.

Drew Biondo and Vince (phonetic)

Vern (phonetic) went over last week and took another look at it as well. We continue to try to get the lay -
literally the lay of the land. I met with Town of Babylon Supervisor Rich

Schaffer and Suffolk County Commissioner of Labor Rosalie Drago and both of them of course remain committed to this project. It's a high priority for both the Town and the County.

When we met last week
Commissioner Drago shared some
preliminary numbers about the number
of -- the amount of workforce training
that could be delivered. Those numbers
were based partly on unemployed folks in
the workforce roles that they have and
partly on students graduating from
underserved high schools not only in
Wyandanch but in the schools surrounding
the area. Those numbers need to be
updated. They are pre-COVID numbers and
so that really needs an update.

Commissioner Drago and I are planning on getting together again not only to discuss Wyandanch but also in my view, Trustees, a major opportunity for Suffolk is to work more closely with the Department of Labor to identify win wins

2	for clients who need jobs and where the
3	Department of Labor can provide
4	basically vouchers for workforce
5	training that can be applied to Suffolk
6	programs that qualify under EEO. So I
7	think that's a great connection to make.

Also last night I met for the first time County Legislator Jason Richberg. We've reached out to Assemblywoman Kimberley Jean-Pierre and via Trustee Canary to Senator Boyle's office. So, in short, we've exchanged -- I've exchanged emails with Tom Dolan from the Town of Babylon IDA. He's interested in getting together.

We need to reach out to the superintendents, but in short, we have the makings of what will be a truly comprehensive advisory committee of stakeholders that the college can convene and who can support us in terms of a strategy for making this Wyandanch project work.

When Dr. Beaudin left, he gave me

as far as he got a couple of years ago.

He gave me a one-pager of some possible workforce trainings that Suffolk could offer in Wyandanch, but we really don't have a comprehensive work plan.

My hope is that with the support of an advisory committee we can complete a needs analysis, complete a comprehensive work plan, envision what kinds of deliverables we want to offer in partnership with the County. And obviously there is no debate about the need. It's highly aligned with our mission.

And so I registered with

Commissioner Drago that the college
supports the project. We think we can
play a leadership role, but that role
needs to be one where we have many
community stakeholders at the table.

And I'll be grateful, Trustees, for your suggestions and recommendations going forward on how to proceed to make Suffolk's participation in this project

a success.

TRUSTEE ZARATE: I just want to go back to the Wyandanch Rising Project. I think that this is a wonderful project and it is, you know, a project that is very much needed in the Town of Babylon and Wyandanch, especially the school district community.

The school district community has gone through a demographical change where we have close to, you know, 50 percent black and 50 percent Hispanic.

And so this Wyandanch Rising Project when we're thinking about the workforce, I think it's very important that we're looking at people who represent that community to serve and support the students so that we can have academic success and for the students to be able to exit and enter our college hopefully to continue their education.

21	virtual enrollment if they cannot show
22	proof of vaccination? Is that an

24	PRESIDENT BONAHUE: It certainly
25	was in the first week or two of the

Board of Trustees, 09/25/2021 semester. At this point we're now getting close to week four so it's a little bit trickier to just switch a student automatically. My understanding, and I'll ask Dr. Munsch or Dr. Tacke-Cushing if they want to comment on this, at this point it would probably be more advantageous for them to switch to a late start fall class, a class that is going to start at the beginning of October.

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One of the encouraging things that we've seen however is that we started the semester with, as I said, with just under 10,000 students in on-campus classes. That number has not decreased very much. We have lost a few students from those on-site classes but maybe no more than 1 percent.

And so as Trustee Frost mentioned, what we are seeing is just students have been taking their time to get the confirmation of their vaccination in place. Sometimes we have

1 Board of Trustees, 09/25/2021 2 had some backlog in terms of the ability 3 of students to reach a nurse or to get 4 those cards in, but we're really flying 5 through those cards now so we're very 6 optimistic. 7 TRUSTEE SANDERS: Thank you. 8 Thank you. PRESIDENT BONAHUE: 9 I see Trustee Morgo. 10 VICE CHAIR MORGO: Thank you for 11 that report, Dr. Bonahue. It was 12 comprehensive and clear and concise. 13 It was I have one follow up. 14 great to see Sal La Lima last night. 15 He's 90 years old and he's moving well 16 and he was a delight to talk to. 17 Secondly, the 14 percent decline 18 is troubling particularly because it's 19 one of the largest declines among the 20 State community colleges. And you 21 mentioned that you're trying to see if 22 there is a correlation between that and 23 the vaccine mandate, but I would surmise 24 that if there were, it would be 25 throughout the system because the whole

But Zach, talking to your classmates, talking to the student body, is the enrollment decline ever discussed?

anything about that in particular but I also haven't asked. So that is definitely something I'm going to bring up, see if maybe there is a reason why. You know, everyone has brothers, sisters, family, and friends who maybe have disenrolled.

I wonder too if it has something with people finding work. If the students maybe -- maybe work it is taking a priority, and I know right now

They might just 4 be taking jobs that they really need to 5 take in order to pay food, family, and 6 education may not be a huge priority for 7 them at the time. I'm not too sure 8 about that, but it's definitely 9 something I can look into and I'll run 10 that by different SGA campus leaders. 11 VICE CHAIR MORGO: Good. Thanks. 12 Finally, to really echo everyone 13 else about Wyandanch. When Lou spoke about it, I made a point that our 14 15 involvement is deeply consistent with 16 our mission to serve the underserved. 17 So as much as you can pursue that, if 18 you need any other help. It's good that 19 Legislator Richberg was there last 20 night. He represents that area. 21 just think that's really the kind of 22 things we should be doing. That's all. 23 TRUSTEE CANARY: If I may? On 24 that point of getting back into the

Wyandanch Project, it comes at a very

good time. Tuesday night I attended an hour-and-a-half meeting with 4 civic associations from Wheatley Heights, Dix Hills, Belmont Lake Estates, and Wyandanch, about 25 people, elected officials and Legislator Richberg and Assemblywoman Jean-Pierre, Richie Schaffer were there. I was representing Senator Boyle.

And they are starting a new initiative and this is the first time that many civics have come together with this focus on trying to make improvements in the Wyandanch community.

There is a high degree of frustration with something that has been unfortunately almost systemic in the community with absentee landlords or I should say absentee building, commercial building property owners, who don't give a damn about the community and they only care about their own financial picture and they are letting their buildings run down. They are letting tenants in there

2	with unsavory operations that are
3	hurtful to the community.
4	There is still to this day
5	people are still scratching their heads
6	to figure out why there is this
7	widespread loitering in the community
8	where male adults who should be working

13	these civic associations and they are
14	looking for government help and they are
15	looking for a new effort in the

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Last week the senior staff and I participated in a seminar supported by SUNY and the Aspen Institute. We're one of ten SUNY community colleges invited to participate.

The purpose of the seminar is to help cabinet level staff and presidents align their view of college mission with those areas that should be our highest priority goals, student access, student completion and success, and equity.

We had some great conversation about how to apply those lessons to Suffolk and we agreed that we too often get bogged down in day-to-day operations, and that's true for any of us in our jobs, and we need more opportunities to look at the big picture and overall institutional strategy.

And so we agreed as a leadership team to set aside time for ourselves to have a retreat and to focus more on how to better align our work with our

Board of Trustees, 09/25/2021 strategic goals. That can be part of our strategic planning project or it can be parallel to it.

Now, in July I had emailed the board that there is a second part of this SUNY and Aspen seminar series and it is designed for boards. And the purpose is to identify for boards of trustees opportunities to strengthen board engagement in the student success agenda and for aligning the work of the board to achieve student success and equity goals.
