Specifically this is police 3 recognition week and we had a tragic 4 loss of a New York City police officer, 5 Anastasio Tsakos, who was killed on duty 6 by a drunk driver on April 27th. Please 7 keep his young family in your thoughts 8 and prayers. 9 CHAIR MURRAY: At this time I 10 would like to request a motion to 11 adjourn the Board of Trustees' meeting 12 and call the Board of Directors' meeting 13 to order. 14 Can I get a motion? 15 TRUSTEE O'CONNOR: I'll make the 16 motion. 17 CHAIR MURRAY: Gordon? 18 TRUSTEE CANARY: Second. 19 CHAIR MURRAY: All those in 20 favor? 21 COLLECTIVE RESPONSE: Aye. 22 [WHEREUPON THE MOTION MADE AND 23 SECONDED WAS VOTED ON AND CARRIED. THE 24 MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE 25 SUFFOLK COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE WAS

AND REOPENED AT 3 4:08 P.M.] 4 CHAIR MURRAY: I need a motion 5 for approval of the minutes of the April 15, 2021, Board of Trustees 6 7 meeting. 8 Gemma, you want to make that 9 motion? 10 TRUSTEE DELEON-LOPRESTI: So 11 moved. 12 CHAIR MURRAY: Jim, you want to 13 second? 14 VICE CHAIR MORGO: Second, Jim 15 Morgo. 16 CHAIR MURRAY: All those in 17 favor? 18 COLLECTIVE RESPONSE: Aye. 19 CHAIR MURRAY: Any opposed? 20 (No response.) 21 CHAIR MURRAY: The minutes are 22 approved. 23 [WHEREUPON THE MOTION MADE AND 24 SECONDED WAS VOTED ON AND CARRIED.] 25 CHAIR MURRAY: So at this point I 4

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1 Board of Trustees, 05/13/2021 2 would like to introduce Vice President for Business and Financial Affairs, 3 4 Dr. Mark Harris, to present the 5 college's budget and college financial 6 reports. 7 VICE PRESIDENT HARRIS: Thank 8 you, Mr. Chair, members of the board. 9 The income and financial statements --10 VICE CHAIR MORGO: I don't 11 know. I'm sorry. Dr. Harris, excuse my 12 interruption, but I don't know if anyone 13 else is, but I'm really struggling to 14 hear. Maybe if you spoke closer to the 15 mic. 16 VICE PRESIDENT HARRIS: Okay. 17 What about now? 18 VICE CHAIR MORGO: That's better. 19 VICE PRESIDENT HARRIS: The 20 income and expense statements that were 21 presented to the Board of Trustees 22 represent transactions from September 23 through April and these were our best 24 high-level performance estimates. Based 25 on the analysis that we did, we see no

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Board of Trustees, 05/13/2021 that based on the adjustment it's about 10.35 million use of fund balance on paper. However, based on HEERF II we will be able to recoup the \$2.6 million in loss revenue from the State. So really and truly there is no true financial impact to us because we would be able to recoup the \$2.6 million.

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Revenue reduction and tuition and fees is approximately \$5.6 million. The State covers about \$2.6 million but for reimbursement from HEERF for loss revenue is about \$5.9 million. So that's a projection that we have. So the net projected revenue loss for Fiscal 21 is \$2.2 million.

18 Again, with the cost mitigation 19 efforts that we implemented starting 20 Fiscal 20 with a roll over into '21, 21 we're showing personnel services lower 22 by about 11.9 percent, supplies about 23 20.2 percent, and contractual expenses 24 lower by about 10 percent with an 25 overall expense reduction of about 8.6

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So when we look both on the revenue and also the benefits that we have derived from the expense, as well as the benefits that we will gain by use of HEERF, we're showing that we will have a healthy fund balance for Fiscal 21.

10 We're not sure what that number 11 will be as of now primarily because 12 there are still some moving parts to it. 13 We have some expenses that we have to 14 determine what they are at the end of 15 the fiscal year and make some 16 reservations for those. So about next 17 board meeting into July we should be 18 able to give you a firmer number on 19 where we think we will end for Fiscal 20 21.

21 In terms of the cash flow, the 22 County has provided us with a cash flow 23 schedule. So tomorrow, the 14th, will make the 3rd payment that we're going to 25 be receiving from the County of a

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Board of Trustees, 05/13/2021 million dollars a week up to June 11th, and from June 11th until about August 4th we'll be getting \$5 million a week with a balloon payment the 1st week in August.

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Please know that this is a significant improvement to the cash flow schedule that they gave us last year because if you recall the last payment that we received from the County was in September of 2020 and they started much later with the payments and we had to really look at where our financial and cash position was to insure that we maintained our liquidity standing.

Before I talk about the resolutions, are there any questions based on the financials that have been presented?

CHAIR MURRAY: Anybody here?
 Anybody on Zoom have any questions?
 (No response.)
 VICE PRESIDENT HARRIS: For Item
 Number 1 in the resolution is the

Board of Trustees, 05/13/2021 standard monthly services payment to Suffolk County for employee health insurance. There is a significant difference with what we're paying this month or the month of April relative to what we paid in March. It's about \$576,000.

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And the 2 factors that have reduced that number 1, the Medicare credit that we get, but also the County apparently, they have been reassessing the premiums per employee per month now quarterly versus yearly and we have seen about a 10.8 percent reduction in the premiums per employee per month.

17 We have a meeting with the County 18 on Tuesday to discuss our budget so we 19 will get some clarification what were 20 some of the primary drivers for the 21 reduction, but regardless we will glady 22 accept those reductions. So if we trend 23 this out say for 12 months, we're 24 talking over \$3.6 million of potential 25 savings.

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CHAIR MURRAY: We don't know at this point whether --

VICE PRESIDENT HARRIS: We don't know at this point. So on Tuesday we will get some better clarification, but for this month about \$300,000 in savings relative to what we paid last month.

Then Item Number 2 it's approving the budget transfer for \$157,000 which is really a re-class so that we're able to pay the direct charges for SUNY for computer software.

And then one other item that was included in the package was reconciliation for transfers related to CARES for saliva testing, \$435,000, and then the PPE due to COVID for \$23,000.

19And then Item Number 9, as I20indicated, resolution to modify the21original Fiscal 21 budget to reflect the222.6 million reduction and the increase23use of fund balance from 7.7 to 10.35.24Those are the 3 resolutions I25have, Mr. Chair.

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CHAIR MURRAY: You had the resolutions in your package. Just want to point out one of the resolutions calls for the extension of approving a strategic plan. Obviously we now have a new president and we want his involvement in developing the strategic plan. So although it was anticipated to be done at this point, we're extending it so that we can get his input which seems to make sense.

13 Any questions on the resolutions? 14 VICE CHAIR MORGO: Just one thing 15 if I might, Chris. At our last meeting 16 we extolled the efforts of the 17 administration, Lou Petrizzo, Mark 18 Harris on this budget, and as I look at 19 the resolution that Mark alluded to the 20 bottom line is just parenthetically Mark 21 said there were a lot of moving pieces. 22 Well, that's really an understatement 23 this year. The different federal help 24 and different regulations and adjusting 25 on the fly.

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We talked about this last time and we praised everyone involved, but what stands out I think, what I know stands out to me and I think everyone else is the fact the 2nd year of freezing tuition.

And the \$5,470 total tuition still makes us the most affordable higher ed in the region. And I might not be able to empirically prove this but also the best higher education in the region. So just to say it again and the fact that we, you know, that tuition has been frozen for 2 years in a row is really remarkable and it says something about our priorities, namely our kids. CHAIR MURRAY: Thank you, Jim.

Anybody else, questions,comments?

21 TRUSTEE CANARY: I have a 22 question for Mark. Mark, in yesterday's 23 Newsday I read the article stimulus aid 24 heading to Long Island universities and 25 colleges and I got confused. I was

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So I wasn't a math major but, you know, they said half of the money needs to go to helping students in trouble, the other half needs to go to outreach, but we can also spend the money to cover institutional costs such as loss revenue, reimbursement for expenses, technology costs, et cetera, et cetera. Well, that's over 100 percent. So a little confusing in this article.

The question: Have we gotten clear guidelines from the federal government on how the stimulus money can be used?

18 VICE PRESIDENT HARRIS: So the 19 article in the newspaper I believe 20 referenced for the American Recovery 21 Program. I think that's the one that 22 addresses.

The way it's structured that portion or that plan students would get half and then the other portion is

Board of Trustees, 05/13/2021 designated for the institution in support of student success.

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The one clarification that I would need to make also with the County because the County has some questions on that whether or not we received the funds.

So the proceeds are allocated for eligible expenses. So once the guidelines from the US Department of Education and then SUNY, who comes in and then makes a modification, are developed and submitted, if we have eligible expenses that meet those guidelines, and also based on calculations that have been developed, demonstrate that we incurred revenue loss, then we're able to draw down those funds.

At no point does the US Department of Education automatically deposit the funds into our account. We have to meet those guidelines. We have to provide support documentation and

Board of Trustees, 05/13/2021 then we can draw the proceeds down.

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Just to go one step further, what the college has done, we have a four-prong approach before we draw down. So based on the guidelines that have been developed, I assess what those are and look at what those potential revenue loss calculations are to see whether or not we meet them as well as the eligible expenses.

I prepare a certification that is then sent to the Office of Legal Affairs to review. If they agree with those items that I am claiming that need to be drawn down, they would sign off and then it gets escalated to the president's office.

When all three signatures are received, a final step would be a person who is designated as an auditor to review everything and once that's done and that person signs off, then we draw down the funds.

So it's never a situation because

1 Board of Trustees, 05/13/2021 2 the funds are designated for use the 3 college gets those funds automatically. 4 We have to meet those eligible 5 guidelines before we can get the funds. 6 TRUSTEE CANARY: Thank you for 7 that explanation. So the auditor, the 8 fourth step in that process, is that an 9 outside independent auditor? 10 VICE PRESIDENT HARRIS: No. 11 That's someone inside that we present 12 the documents to and they review, 13 compare the guidelines, just to make 14 sure and if there are any disagreements, 15 then we will have some discussions on 16 what needs to happen. 17 TRUSTEE CANARY: Great, Mark. 18 Thank you, appreciate it. 19 CHAIR MURRAY: Any other 20 questions or comments? Anybody on Zoom? 21 (No response.) 22 CHAIR MURRAY: So at this point I 23 would ask for a motion to approve 24 college Resolutions Numbers 2021.25 25 through 2021.33.

CHAIR MURRAY: Any questions or 10 11 discussions? 12 (No response.) 13 CHAIR MURRAY: If not, all in 14 favor please say aye. 15 COLLECTIVE RESPONSE: Aye. 16 CHAIR MURRAY: Any opposed? 17 (No response.) 18 CHAIR MURRAY: Thank you. 19 [WHEREUPON THE MOTION MADE AND 20 SECONDED WAS VOTED ON AND CARRIED.] 21 CHAIR MURRAY: Next is the 22 committee reports. I'm going to go a 23 little out of order because I know 24 Theresa may have to jump off. So we're 25 just going to go to the presidential

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TRUSTEE SANDERS: Thank you, Mr. Chairman, and, yes, this may be the last report there, but I wanted to just take a moment in reference to the presidential search to thank all of you. This was an experience for all of us, but front line, you know, the search committee, all of you as board members, the administration, faculty, the staff, and our entire student population and our external supportive community, everyone stayed for the long haul, and it was a long haul, but we got to where we wanted to be which we have selected an incoming president, finalizing all of these details and making sure that he has a warm welcome when he hits the ground here.

Dr. Bonahue, we are here and ready to receive you and, you know, even this long stretch of going through the process, I guess everything is for a

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did receive a card from the Chancellor. He was very supportive of all the SUNY teams support of our decision, and we're looking forward to all of the great things we're going to do moving forward.

14 So I just want to take that 15 minute. Thank you so much, 16 Mr. Chairman, for your leadership on all 17 of this. I don't think I could have 18 finished this race without you. So 19 thank you so much Chris, appreciate you, 20 and Lou Petrizzo and how you guys pulled 21 everything together. Thank you.

14	So Student Success, Bell?	
15	TRUSTEE PAGDANGANAN: Yes. Thank	
16	you, Mr. Chair.	
17	The Student Success Committee met	
18	on May 4th. Many college offices	
19	contribute to the priorities of our	
20	Student Success. This month the	
21	subcommittee welcomed guest speaker	
22	Dr. June Ohrnberger, a professor and	
23	college director of noncredit English	
24	Language Learners program or the ELL.	
25	The college offers both ELL and	

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Board of Trustees, 05/13/2021 for credit ESL program. The ELL program was started in the 1980s and typically enrolled an average of 1,800 to 2,000 students pre-pandemic. This program is not only about learning the English language but also becoming familiar with the American culture.

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Many students who come into the program initially feel alone and isolated due to language and cultural barriers. This program helps them build personal confidence and a new community network.

These are not typical students. Their backgrounds and variations are broad. Some bring significant education from their home country, some need new skills to advance their employment, some want to help their children learn.

21 And largely -- they are largely 22 Hispanic enrollment at this time, but 23 there are also students from Eastern 24 European countries.

Pandemic challenges include

Board of Trustees, 05/13/2021 access to technology and losing the ability to learn together as a group where they are able to benefit from the support they receive from each other. Students and faculty are very happy to be returning to in-person classes this fall.

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All of the faculty are part-time with master's degree. They are dedicated to their students and annually fundraise to support 1 annual scholarship which is about \$4,000. There is a cost of the program and it is not eligible for financial aid.

16 The college recognizes that the 17 students who are non-native speakers of 18 English require specialized English 19 language instruction and offers 20 part-time and full-time programs at each 21 campus. The program addresses 22 listening, speaking, reading, writing, 23 and grammar.

There is a disconnect in the availability of language support as

1 Board of Trustees, 05/13/2021 2 students transition from high school to 3 the college level. We have all been 4 advocates for high school students who 5 are non-native speakers of English to 6 start in our noncredit program when 7 first enrolling at the college. 8 Word of mouth has been found to 9 be the most successful method for 10 promoting this program. It (Zoom audio 11 fail) advertising and digital outreach. 12 That's my report, Mr. Chair. 13 CHAIR MURRAY: Thank you very 14 much, Bell. Always -- well, you meet 15 every month and you always do hard work 16 and a great job. Thank you. 17 TRUSTEE PAGDANGANAN: Thank you. 18 CHAIR MURRAY: Governance, I 19 don't think we had a meeting this --20 TRUSTEE CANARY: Mr. Chairman, 21 Governance did not meet again this 22 month, but we do think we have a good 23 topic for next month. 24 CHAIR MURRAY: That's good. The Center has been a resource for our students with programs that foster advocacy and connect those issues that may be relevant to our students' needs, values, and concerns.

19 The Tunnel of Oppression is the 20 Center's biggest program that embraces 21 advocacy, diversity, equity, and 22 inclusion. It is a national program 23 that immerses students to experience 24 various forms of oppression and issues 25 that students may not have been exposed

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1 Board of Trustees, 05/13/2021 2 to with the goal of encouraging students 3 to become advocates for these issues. 4 Diversity conference held on 5 May 7, 2021, discussed ways the college 6 can engage and promote student 7 involvement in the various task forces 8 and committees currently available such 9 as the LGBTQ, undocumented students, 10 Black and African American students, and 11 The Center has also basic needs. 12 connected and partnered with external community organizations in order to 13 14 provide our students with those 15 community resources. 16 It has been challenging to get 17 students engaged virtually over the past 18 In an effort to reach our year. 19 students videos have been created, 20 emails have been sent, and posts shared 21 on social media to highlight and promote 22 participation. 23 Ben Zwirn, college director of 24 Legislative Affairs, discussed the 25 meeting scheduled for the week with the

Board of Trustees, 05/13/2021 County budget office where the college will be asking for the 3 percent increase in the contribution from the County.

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On May 20, 2021, there will be a Zoom meeting with the County and the New York Automotive Dealers Association regarding the construction of the automotive center on the Michael J. Grant campus with the purpose of expanding our current program and the hopes of attracting more students from Queens, Nassau, and Suffolk County.

The New York State Automotive Dealers Association has asked the college to expand the automotive program as the demand for technicians in the automotive industry is needed.

Drew Biondo, college director of communications, discussed with the committee the visual data enrollment map he created, almost like a heat map, which depicts where our full-time, part-time, and early college high school Board of Trustees, 05/13/2021 students are located throughout the country. The tool also shows our virtual student population that exists throughout the world. This is a great resource tool that can be used when speaking with legislators to advocate for the college.

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The committee also discussed the 2021 Suffolk County Legislative Page Program. The 12-week leadership program offers students training and guidance needed to become future government leaders by allowing them to participate in professional workshops and work in various areas of local government. Students are assigned a legislative district and work closely with that legislator throughout the duration of the program.

Though the deadline for the program has passed, the committee discussed working with Student Affairs to promote this program next year. Our understanding is that we had a student,

Board of Trustees, 05/13/2021 Jerome Bost, who actually participated in this program and is now working with the County.

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The Suffolk County Education and Labor Committee met on May 5th and the two items on the agenda both related to grants passed. The next meeting before the legislator is the capital budget meeting on July 24, 2021, where the college will be advocating for the expansion of the automotive program. Having trustees present from all of the trustees committees sends a strong message and advocacy and support to the college.

And the Advocacy Committee was adjourned at 10:58 a.m. Thank you very much.

Under my leadership Suffolk will be the flagship for equity, for student learning, and we will be the engine of community development and workforce development that every community in Suffolk County needs.

It was also important for me to be here today because I heard that it was the first face-to-face meeting and so it seemed like a terrific opportunity to be with you as we maybe begin to

We don't know 6 exactly how it will be written. 7 There was news today from the CDC 8 updating guidance on what folks can and 9 cannot do, but I was wearing when I came 10 in a Sante Fe college mask. 11 (Round of applause.) 12 PRESIDENT BONAHUE: It's my honor 13 to put on for the first time a Suffolk County Community College mask and to 14 15 thank all of you for this opportunity 16 and for your trust. Go Sharks. 17 (Round of applause.) 18 TRUSTEE CANARY: Ed, we have to 19 get you one of the shark hats, the fin 20 hats. 21 CHAIR MURRAY: Thank you. We're 22 excited to move on to this chapter and 23 of course cannot thank Interim President 24 Petrizzo enough but we'll have more to 25 say next month for Lou's service.

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Speaking of which, we now move on to the president's report, Lou.

PRESIDENT PETRIZZO: Thank you, Mr. Chairman and welcome everybody. Good to see you all and good to see you President Bonahue. Pleasure spending a few hours with you this afternoon and I look forward to spending some more time with you tomorrow.

This week has been a very interesting week, the past month very interesting at the college. Governor Cuomo announced on Monday that all State University and City University of New York students who intend to take in-person classes in the fall must produce proof of vaccination in order to attend these classes.

The governor's announcement was short on details but guidance is expected shortly from the SUNY Chancellor to help fill in the blanks. We expect there will be exemptions for students with religious beliefs and

Board of Trustees, 05/13/2021 documented medical conditions. As you know, we presently require proof of immunization for various diseases, measles, mumps, rubella among them.

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This past Tuesday, May 11th, was the last day of classes for the spring semester. Believe it or not, spring semester classes are over already and students are currently busy with final examinations.

12 Commencement will be held 13 virtually again this year and that will 14 take place on May 20th. Among the folks 15 who will be addressing our graduating 16 students are Senator Chuck Schumer, 17 Lieutenant Governor Kathleen Hochul, the 18 County Executive Steve Bellone, 19 Presiding Officer Rob Calarco all sent 20 greetings to our students as part of the 21 commencement celebration.

We will be sending each board member a link to the virtual ceremony so you can view the festivities as well. You should know that Chair Murray

1 Board of Trustees, 05/13/2021 2 delivered remarks to the graduates on 3 behalf of the Board of Trustees. 4 Summer enrollment is going very 5 well and very strongly this year, much 6 as it did last year, with many enrollees 7 from our sister SUNY colleges taking 8 courses over the summer vacation. 9 This year thanks to Dr. Beaudin 10 there will be two six-week summer 11 sessions and one eight-week session. 12 The start dates for the first six-week 13 session and the eight-week is May 24th 14 and for the second six-week session July 15 6th. 16 And while it's too early to 17 comment on fall enrollment, it is clear 18 that our continuing students are 19 favoring the remote modalities over 20 in-person classes at this point by a 21 wide margin. We are running one-third 22 in person two-thirds remote. 23 We will continue to monitor this 24 through the summer and hope and expect 25 that it may change with the newly

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46 1 Board of Trustees, 05/13/2021 2 enrolled first-time students when they 3 start appearing in our records. 4 Our vaccination pods continue to 5 operate with the State pod on the 6 Brentwood campus delivering 7 approximately 1,100 shots per day and 8 the County pods operating on Selden and 9 Riverhead campuses. All of these pods 10 are functioning at reduced levels. 11 Clearly the traffic to these pods has 12 fallen off in recent weeks. 13 We have agreed to extend the 14 State's permission to be on the 15 Brentwood Campus through the end of 16 June, but we have made clear to the 17 State of New York and we've made clear 18 to the County of Suffolk that we will need to take back control of these 19 20 facilities over the summer so that we're 21 in a position to deliver the full 22 college experience to our students in 23 the fall and so that we can resume our 24 revenue generating activities in the 25 health clubs, pools, and the field

Board of Trustees, 05/13/2021 house. We're getting many inquiries for a resumption of these services and we believe it's time that we be allowed to do so.

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Our Restart Committee has been working very hard as you mentioned earlier. There are changes coming at us fast and furiously from the governor's office, from the CDC. The Restart Committee will be working on relaxing campus access restrictions now that our infection rates have remained low.

The governor has expanded the number of people we can have in offices and work spaces and we will be adjusting employees' work schedules after the new guidelines go into effect next week.

Although we are relaxing many of the access and space restrictions, we will be continuing with the weekly COVID-19 testing of all employees and all students who come to campus until the Chancellor and/or the State Department of Health relaxes that

Board of Trustees, 05/13/2021 restriction on SUNY colleges. We will continue to be in compliance with all current restrictions.

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On the subject of offshore wind training we are making good progress. The not-for-profit entity has been formed to operate the training center. We will be using that entity in order to protect the college from any liabilities as well as the other entities involved to protect them as well.

13 We have received proposals for 14 training staff and students as well as 15 potential sites for the training center 16 and officers of the training center have 17 been elected, and they will be Matty 18 Aracich from the Building Trades Council of Nassau and Suffolk Counties, Roger 19 20 Clayman from the Long Island Federation 21 of Labor, and myself as the 22 representative of the college until such 23 time as there is a new president in 24 position to take my place.

Orsted and Eversource will also

Board of Trustees, 05/13/2021 be participating in the work of the training center and we hope to begin a train the trainer program in January of 2022.

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On the capital project front, Kreiling Hall building is closing in on completion after being caught up in many delays most of them arising out of the pandemic. Kreiling required a gut renovation and we expect to be able to move into Kreiling Hall over the summer and have the building fully available for staff and classes in the fall.

As you leave here today you probably -- as you arrived here probably noticed the piles of dirt over by the workforce development center near the track, and after a very long planning process and many plan revisions to get the project under budget, the STEM Building on the Grant Campus is now under construction.

Given our current economic

Board of Trustees, 05/13/2021 building materials, we will be very closely monitoring the progress on that building as work goes forward. We have a good contractor in place and we have some margin for error in the budget but unknown ground conditions and rising cost of building materials is always of concern to us and it causes us to be very cautious with this project.

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Tomorrow we expect County Executive Steve Bellone to hold a bill signing ceremony at the College's Center for Social Justice and Human Understanding. The bill signing is for the law recently passed by the Suffolk County legislator to facilitate the removal of racist covenants and restrictions from real estate titles and records.

While these covenants and restrictions are not enforceable, there is a cost to removing them from the county clerk's records and this law would waive those fees to do so.

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The College's Center for Social Justice will certainly be an appropriate place for this bill signing. I believe that's going to take place at 11:00 a.m. at the Huntington Library.

And now for the sports report. Our teams have been doing fantastically well this year. They must have been cooped up all winter long and they have a burst of energy. The men's soccer and women's soccer teams will be in postseason play and the women's softball team also will be in postseason play.

We've had other teams that have qualified for postseason play but due to COVID restrictions and cancellation of tournaments, unfortunately they have not been allowed to participate, but go Sharks has been really the saying this year. We have really gotten out there and proven that Suffolk County Community College deserves attention.

Mr. Chairman, that's my report. CHAIR MURRAY: Thank you, Lou.

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TRUSTEE CANARY: Lou, comments before you leave. So the governor's announcement, my phone has been ringing off the hook for the last 72 hours in the senate office with howls of protests. And again with the lack of information and not being able to provide that to our constituents it puts us in a very tough spot to say the least.

And one of the provisos is that the CDC -- I'm sorry, the FDA has to give full approval to the vaccine, not just the emergency approval, in order for that order to hold and we don't know what kind of time frame that's going to be on and whether they're going to do that. We suspect they are going to do that but we don't know.

And again, as you said, we have to get more guidance out of the SUNY board as to exactly how this is going to work, but right now up in the air and again, it puts us in a bad spot in my

Board of Trustees, 05/13/2021 office trying to answer constituents who we don't know the answers to.

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PRESIDENT PETRIZZO: As I indicated, we noted that the governor's announcement was short of detail. We do suspect that there will be a requirement that the emergency use authorization be removed and that full authorization be in place in order for this to go forward.

The problem becomes a timing issue in that there are many students who would need to be vaccinated and we don't know when the emergency use will be rescinded or go to full use.

17 It's also my understanding that 18 that will not happen for all the 19 vaccines at the same time, but they will 20 be approved on the basis of one, Pfizer, 21 for example, and then maybe later 22 Moderna, and then maybe later Johnson & 23 Johnson.

So it's all very vague at this point. We are expecting our fall

1 Board of Trustees, 05/13/2021 2 guidance from SUNY on everything having 3 to do with social distancing, mask 4 wearing, testing, and of course now the 5 vaccination requirement. 6 So we're hopeful that this will 7 come sooner rather than later, but we 8 know that every day that goes by is 9 another day that we lose the opportunity 10 to put in place what we're going to need 11 to do for the fall. 12 TRUSTEE CANARY: Thanks, Lou, for 13 that, and just one more point, 14 Mr. Chairman, if I may. 15 CHAIR MURRAY: Sure. 16 TRUSTEE CANARY: Trustee Canary 17 asking another question. I picked up 18 something you said about having a 19 private entity actually run the training 20 center for the offshore wind training 21 and that struck me because with 22 automotive technology -- we don't have 23 that with automotive technology. And I 24 would assume that that's a dangerous 25 profession, you know, in the shop with

There is much more 7 danger involved in that occupation, plus there are other entities involved in the 8 9 offshore wind. It's not just us. There 10 are labor unions and other organizations 11 that are involved and for the benefit of 12 all of those organizations a 13 not-for-profit entity I believe makes a 14 lot of sense. 15 TRUSTEE CANARY: And that's 16 pretty much how they have that set up in 17 Norway, Denmark, Sweden where they have 18 a lot of the companies based? 19 PRESIDENT PETRIZZO: Well, if 20 it's not being done by a private 21 company, then yes, you would go to 22 something like that. 23 TRUSTEE CANARY: Thank you. 24 CHAIR MURRAY: Anyone else have 25 any comments or questions for President

Board of Trustees, 05/13/2021 Petrizzo? TRUSTEE DELEON-LOPRESTI: Chair Murray? CHAIR MURRAY: Yes. TRUSTEE DELEON-LOPRESTI: Please let us know when it's an appropriate time to give our remarks about the long and steady hand that temporary President 10 Petrizzo has led, you know, during this time has led the college. I would like to express my thanks but I want to make sure that we do it at the appropriate time. CHAIR MURRAY: Yes. Very much acknowledged and understood. He has one more meeting with us left to go so I was hoping we'll elaborate more on our pleasure and gratitude for him. TRUSTEE CANARY: Thanks, Lou. CHAIR MURRAY: Anybody for roundtable?

Secondly, on Priscilla's report the heat map is very compatible with our efforts with the legislature because it is always helpful when advocating to let them know how many students come from their legislative district.

14 And although we've talked about 15 it previously, the 3 percent increase 16 from the County this year, for a variety 17 of reasons that have already been 18 discussed, should not be a problem, but 19 after many years in many different 20 places it's never a done deal until the 21 County Executive signs the appropriate 22 resolution from the legislator. So I 23 just want to second Priscilla's urging 24 of people attending those meetings. 25 Finally, Bell and I attended

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Board of Trustees, 05/13/2021 right before this meeting -- we had back-to-back Zooms -- the first meeting in a long time of the Long Island Regional Economic Development Council.

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Some of you may be familiar with the council. This is the tenth year of competitive grants for economic development to aid both private sector and not-for-profit economic development generators.

This year there will be \$150 million to be distributed for the year. A difference is that the application process is going to be rolling. The deadline is July 30th.

17 Some of you may also remember 18 that there was -- let me be 19 uncharacteristically diplomatic. There 20 was some disappointment with the lack of 21 participation from Suffolk County 22 Community College in the past. Some of 23 us tried to remedy that. 24 I'm confident with Ed Bonahue 25 that there will be participation.

Board of Trustees, 05/13/2021 Stuart Rabinowitz who is the president of Hofstra is one of the Vice Chairmen -- Vice Chairman, excuse me. Farmingdale is represented. The New York Institute of Technology is represented and the leader of higher education on Long Island should certainly be a representative.

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10 So those of you who head up 11 either for-profit or not-for-profit 12 entities, I really encourage you to get 13 applications in. It's through New York 14 State Empire State Development. Many of 15 you know the regional director Cara 16 Longworth, and Cara is really looking 17 forward to helping and there are going 18 to be seminars on completing the funding 19 application.

20 So I really want -- the 21 Lieutenant Governor, Lieutenant Governor 22 Hochul was at the meeting today. So 23 there should be coverage in Newsday 24 tomorrow, but I would also encourage 25 anybody with an interest to get

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And whereas on April 26, 2021, the SUNY Board of Trustees approved the appointment of Dr. Bonahue as college president effective on a date to be determined and whereas the committee of the Board of Trustees has negotiated a start date, starting salary, and such additional terms and conditions set forth in a written employment contract satisfactorily to Dr. Bonahue.
