13	CHAIR MURRAY: We're out of the
14	Board of Directors and we're back in the
15	Board of Trustees. So at this point I
16	would like to request a motion for the
17	approval of the minutes of the March 18,
18	2021, Board of Trustees meeting.
19	Jim, will you make that motion?
20	VICE CHAIR MORGO: Jim Morgo, so
21	moved.

1 Board of Trustees, 04/15/2021 2 seconding the motion. 3 CHAIR MURRAY: All those in favor 4 please say aye. 5 COLLECTIVE RESPONSE: Aye. 6 CHAIR MURRAY: Minutes are 7 approved. 8 Now we come to our main purpose 9 of today's meeting, and I would like to 10 introduce the Vice President for 11 Business and Financial Affairs, Dr. Mark 12 Harris, to present the college budget and college financial records. Mark? 13 14 VICE PRESIDENT HARRIS: 15 morning, Mr. Chair, members of the 16 board. Thanks for giving us the 17 opportunity to present our Fiscal 21 or 18 Fiscal 22 budget. At this point I would 19 like to walk you through a budget 20 presentation and we did send out the 21 presentation to members of the board. 22 So first part of the discussion, 23 as you recall last month we presented 24 our Fiscal 20 audit which the board 25 reviewed and accepted, but some real

Board of Trustees, 04/15/2021 quick highlights to close out that fiscal year.

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As was mentioned previously, now based on the financials and the audit we presented, we saw about a 2.9 overall reduction in our tuition, and as a result of that we had ensuing reductions in our fees due to tuition reduction but also based on some of the auxiliary revenues that we normally get from services that we provide both internally and externally.

In addition to that and what subsequently reduced our total revenue was the ability that we had to pull in about \$1.5 million of CARES or HEERF I to cover certain expenses but also for student fees that we also reimbursed.

On the cost side we had about a 5.3 reduction in the salaries, personnel services, and also about a 1.7 percent decrease overall benefits, but because of the disruption of COVID we also based on efforts that we undertook we restored

Board of Trustees, 04/15/2021 reduction in our variable expenses by about 7.9 percent.

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And as a result of that and based on the effort by all members of staff, faculty, staff and also administrators, we were able to end the year, even though we had deficit in our revenue, on a positive note. And the next slide I will show you or remind the board and members of how much we added to the fund balance.

Based on our Fiscal 21 year that we're in right now, based on the trends that we're seeing, we're looking at about a 6 percent overall reduction in our tuition revenue and spring being the largest decrease compared to that of fall.

So when we look at the aggregate for the entire fiscal year, we're talking about 6 percent reduction and then correspondingly we would see the reduction in our fees again due to tuition being decreased and some of the

Board of Trustees, 04/15/2021 auxiliary revenues we have.

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The good news to this, however, is our ability to claim eligible expenses out of CARES or HEERF I to offset some of the decrease in revenue that we have. And then in general our cost based on the efforts that we undertook in '20 roll those into '21. We saw a reduction in our personnel services as well, personnel services expenses, as well as the variable expenses also decreased.

So based on the financial report, as mentioned before, we saw an increase to our fund balance of about 4.09 million based on the activities and the actions that we took for Fiscal 20.

And also for Fiscal 21 even though we had a significant reduction in our revenue portion primarily because the State went ahead and gave us a 5 percent permanent cut which is a one time cut in Fiscal 21 which netted about \$2.5 million.

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And then based on what we're seeing in terms of trends from fall and then spring and how spring will close out and then looking into summer, we're saying our net projected revenue loss is going to be about \$5.07 million and then the revenue -- I'm sorry, the fees associated with that both for the tuition fees but also for the auxiliary revenues it's about 891,000.

So total revenue in fees we're talking a \$5.9 million decrease from what we anticipated, but then based on the ability of the college to claim expenses and potential revenue loss, we're saying that for Fiscal 21 we're able to pull down about \$4 million, \$4.057 million. So the net revenue loss that we're projecting for Fiscal 21 is about \$4.4 million compared to what we had anticipated at the start of the budget.

And then in terms of the costs, when we look at both salaries and

Board of Trustees, 04/15/2021 benefits, we're talking about an 8.1 reduction or savings because of the efforts that we have undertaken from Fiscal 20 into Fiscal 21.

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Just to give you a guick highlight on where some of the savings are coming from. As we said, from personnel services but also in reduction in expenses due to us adapting to meeting the students' demands and also reducing some core sections and improving our utilization rate of those sections so that we can meet the seat obligation based on what was agreed on.

So, again, the overall reduction is about 8.1 percent for salary and benefits and about 23.3 percent in our total expenses. So while we also had reductions in our personnel services we also had a decrease of about 11.6 percent in our other variable costs.

That said, based on the reduction in projected revenue and then the savings in cost, we're projecting to

Board of Trustees, 04/15/2021 increase the fund balance by about \$5.67 million for Fiscal 21.

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Slide 5 really shows you the year over year comparisons but moreso in the long term the use of fund balance with Fiscal 18 being one of the most challenging years for the college where we had to use significant amounts of the fund balance.

But what I would like to stress is based on the efforts of faculty, staff, and administrators recognizing the challenges that COVID posed for us and based on the efforts we were able to -- based on really addressing some of the challenges -- add about \$4.09 million. So that's a testament to the recognition that even under very difficult circumstances we worked collaboratively in insuring the financial stability of the institution.

So for Fiscal 22, which is the primary discussion for today, we built the budget based on certain assumptions

Board of Trustees, 04/15/2021 especially when we look at our primary sources of funding.

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So starting with State aid the assumption for this budget is a decrease for funding from 100 percent to 98 percent. So that's what we're putting in for State aid, a decrease to 98 percent.

We're also requesting a 3 percent increase in County funding primarily because of the projected 5.4 percent decrease both in our tuition and fees. So we are expecting to see our Fiscal 21, both fall, spring, and summer with a decrease which will reduce our revenue source and as such we're asking the County to provide the 3 percent funding to help offset that decrease.

Again, and because of the stimulus, the HEERF II, the Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund, the college based on eligibility may have access to about \$9 million of funds to offset some of the costs. So we are

Board of Trustees, 04/15/2021 projecting that based on what we are seeing and based on our eligibility and based on the guidelines that the US Department of Education released, we may be able to draw then about \$9-plus million to help offset the costs and loss of revenue.

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In terms of our cost assumptions we're factoring in about a 6 percent, 6.6 percent increase primarily because the goal is to go back to face-to-face and right now in terms of the schedule we have about a 50 percent face-to-face and 50 percent online for students but on trend work for employees will increase as well.

And as a result of that the college's position is that we will invest in insuring that the resources that we have will provide the support for students and student success because we recognized that during COVID students had to adapt and what we want to insure is that we're providing those services,

Board of Trustees, 04/15/2021 whether or not it's mental health counseling, whether or not it's in tutoring and all other services that are required to help the students complete.

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And then our benefits, we're seeing about 1.9 percent increase of Fiscal 22. In terms of our variable costs we're recommending a 20.3 percent increase and that supports the face-to-face on prem.

And the cost will go towards our instructional support but also for the IT infrastructure support as well. We're talking about computers, we're talking about insuring that the online modality is secure through validation, but also in terms of our plan and maintenance for equipment and other operating expenses that we did put on pause due to COVID, but we believe that at this time it's prudent for the college to invest additional funding to insure that our faculty, staff, and employees have the resources to execute

Board of Trustees, 04/15/2021 the mission and vision of the institution.

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On slide 6, really a graphical representation of part of the factor that we baked into our assumption. So when we look at our FTEs from Fiscal 15 all the way to Fiscal 22, we're seeing that decrease in our FTE and also with our head count.

And for us it is critical at this juncture for us to really put those initiatives in place where we can improve our retention rates on students and that's one of the justifications as it were from before for increasing our auxiliary services as well as the personnel services so that we at some point can stem the slide of our FTE numbers.

Slide 7, the key point with slide 7 that I would like to point out and if we go even beyond Fiscal 20, if you look at the tuition and fees portion, which are borne by the students, it's for '20

Board of Trustees, 04/15/2021 it's more than half of our revenue.

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For Fiscal 21 and 22 the numbers change slightly because of the decrease in student enrollment primarily due to the impact of COVID, but correspondingly as the percentage decreased for tuition and fees, you could see that the percent revenue from miscellaneous or the Higher Education Emergency Fund increased.

So because of the support from the stimulus we're able to offset some of the losses. So it's almost a 1 for 1 percent in transfer from tuition and fees to HEERF to support the college's continued need.

And then for Fiscal 22 we're showing even a bigger decrease where it drops by about 5 percent but the miscellaneous or the HEERF, which is the stimulus, increased by the same amount. So fortunately we have, again, the ability to drawdown on the CARES Act portion or the HEERF portion.

Board of Trustees, 04/15/2021 22 budget will look like, we're saying overall based on the 98 percent for funding, which is still a decrease, we're expecting our revenue to be about \$1.5 million. \$1.5 million based on what we're projecting right now for Fiscal 21.

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And then based on the 3 percent from the County, we're saying it's about \$1.34 million over the prior year with a decrease both in our tuition of 5.4 percent, as I indicated before, as well as the fees, but then we have the ability based on our eligibility to draw then about \$9.9 million from HEERF that will supplement.

And then we would increase spending both on the personnel services side, but also on the other variable expenses side to support services to students as we transition back from online mainly to face-to-face or a mixture of both.

That said, what that puts us or

2	where that puts us is where we're still
3	dependent on use of the fund balance.
4	So based on the Fiscal 22 budget that
5	we're proposing, we're saying that based
6	on the revenue and based on our expenses
7	we're in a position where we will be
8	using about \$4,954,803 from the fund
9	balance and this use we believe will
10	help us again to support student
11	services and student success.
12	So Mr. Chair, members of the
13	board, this is a high-level overview of
14	our proposed Fiscal 22 budget. Are
15	there any questions?
16	CHAIR MURRAY: I'm just going to
17	ask Kevin if he wanted to chip in as
18	chairman of the budget committee and
19	then we'll open it up to questions.
20	TRUSTEE O'CONNOR: Thank you,
21	Chairman Murray. No, I think you said
22	it very well, Dr. Harris.
23	I think what's been presented
24	here, I think we're holding the line on
25	tuition. We're freezing it again.

3	balance. I think it's thoughtful in the
4	way that getting back we will have to
5	have more services for students.
6	So a lot of effort went in and I
7	want to thank the whole team for putting
8	this together.
9	CHAIR MURRAY: Thanks, Kevin.
10	Does anybody have any questions?
11	VICE CHAIR COVERDALE: Trustee
12	Coverdale.
13	CHAIR MURRAY: Go ahead.
14	VICE CHAIR COVERDALE: I just
15	want to comment kudos to Dr. Harris and
16	his team for really holding the line in
17	the most difficult of circumstances, and
18	I think the projected budget for '22 is
19	extremely thoughtful and prudent.
20	CHAIR MURRAY: Anyone else?
21	VICE CHAIR MORGO: Chris?
22	CHAIR MURRAY: Yes, Jim.
23	VICE CHAIR MORGO: This is more a
24	comment than a question too. I'm going
25	to echo Shirley. It's really a

1 Board of Trustees, 04/15/2021 2 remarkable job that Mark Harris and Lou 3 Petrizzo and the entire team was able to 4 get us a 23 percent savings during a 5 very difficult year and it reflects on 6 our ability to freeze tuition for the 7 second year in a row. That says a great 8 deal about our commitment to our 9 students and hopefully the freezing of 10 tuition will attract future students to 11 help our enrollment. 12 Finally I want to congratulate 13 Kevin O'Connor because, Kevin, you took 14 over the budget and finance committee 15 and you brought the surplus almost back 16 to where it was when I took over. 17 you will notice my track was in the 18 opposite of the recent track so 19 congratulations. 20 TRUSTEE O'CONNOR: It's the great 21 team that we have. 22 CHAIR MURRAY: Anyone else? 23 TRUSTEE DELEON-LOPRESTI: Chair 24

comments.

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Murray, I would like to add to the

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3 TRUSTEE DELEON-LOPRESTI: Kudos 4 to the entire budget committee as well 5 as to the accounting staff and to 6 Dr. Harris.

> And also just a shout-out to the Thank you to the staff for all the sacrifices during this difficult time, but it shows the cooperative nature and relationship that the college has with its staff.

> It couldn't have been easy to make all of these changes and I don't believe -- you know, I have a son that goes to this college and I'll talk about it a little bit later, but I didn't see any sacrifice.

> Once in a while I hear, you know, over the video the professors talking about their classes and the quality is just top notch. The passion of the professors has not declined at all. It seems to be it's more passionate than where I went to school where it was

1 Board of Trustees, 04/15/2021 2 private institution, people paying big 3 bucks for it. 4 And even the advisement, the

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advisement department. So the quality has not sacrificed. The student experience from our perspective as a family has been just phenomenal so kudos to the entire staff, really congratulations. To keep the prices so low is amazing.

TRUSTEE CANARY: Mr. Chairman, again, kudos to Mark, the team, the administration, the faculty, unbelievable in a very, very challenging year, and again feel very proud to be a part of this effort.

Mark, I wanted to ask -- I made a note that you had down on one of your charts 20.3 increase in plan cost maintenance IT efforts.

I'm just concerned about air-handling situations and what SUNY is going to require the colleges to do to bring students back full-time.

Board of Trustees, 04/15/2021 that air-handling and indoor air is going to be a big concern.

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Do we feel pretty confident that we are going to be covering those projected costs? Do we absolutely know what we need to do in all the buildings on all the campuses in order to meet any new requirements for air-handling?

VICE PRESIDENT HARRIS: Yes. So the college has a Safe Start Committee and a subcommittee of that broader committee is the Plan and Operations Committee, and we have been meeting on a biweekly, monthly basis.

So prior to talking about coming back in say fall of 2021, once COVID hit the team really kicked into action following guidelines as outlined by the AOI rate.

So we switched in terms of filters. So throughout the college we have been using a higher grade filter which costs us more money, the MERV 13. So we moved from their lower grade to a Board of Trustees, 04/15/2021 much higher grade. Fortunately we were able to recoup those costs through the CARES Act and now from the HEERF II.

So in terms of air quality we worked collectively with not just the plan operations from each area but also central facility and the campus executive deans to identify what those needs are. There are certain departments that require special air filtration systems and we have met those needs working through our procurement department to expedite the process of getting those especially because we recognize the importance of that.

Other things that we have done to insure that the environment in which our employees and our students work is outfitting whether or not it's offices, classrooms with plexiglass, et cetera.

And based on the schedule that we developed in terms of cleaning we have purchased additional mobile sprayers so that, you know, the team can do their

Board of Trustees, 04/15/2021 good job much more quickly in sanitizing and disinfecting those areas.

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So I think we're in a position based on the infrastructure that we have and the committee that has been working, if there are other changes that come down either from SUNY or the State we'll be ready to meet those seamlessly.

PRESIDENT PETRIZZO: The CARES Act I money was very helpful to us in that regard. We were able to buy those sprayers that Mark referenced and all of the PPE that's necessary to keep employees, students, faculty safe.

So the really primary aid of those institutional funds is COVID and pandemic relief in the first instance and then the secondary issues following that.

So money has not been an issue with respect to providing safety for our students and for our employees and it will never be for us going forward. You know, we'll find the money if we don't

2	have it, but right now it's not an issue
3	and we do have it.
4	CHAIR MURRAY: Anybody else have
5	any questions, comments?
6	TRUSTEE ZARATE: I just want to
7	thank the entire team as well just for
8	keeping our students as their first
9	priority when it comes to this fiduciary
10	decision-making. So thank you very much
11	to all the team.
12	PRESIDENT PETRIZZO: Mark didn't
13	go into it, maybe he can, but there are
14	a number of fees, student fees, also
15	this year which are either being reduced
16	or eliminated.
17	Mark, do you just want to touch
18	on a few of those since they are in the
19	resolution as well and we really haven't
20	highlighted those fee reductions?
21	VICE PRESIDENT HARRIS: Yes. So
22	the resolution that deals with the
23	tuition and fees Dr. Beaudin alluded
24	to the student activity fees which will

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be reduced for the students as well, but

Board of Trustees, 04/15/2021 in addition to that the vehicle registration fee that's one of the fees that the college, based on where we are, has decided not to charge the students there as well.

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So what we have done is really assessed all the fees that we have in terms of where the students are. physical education fee, what we have done in years past each student had to pay but based on what we proposed to the board it's only for those students who will be doing those classes face-to-face. So it's not a blanket charge for every student unless you're taking the classes online -- I'm sorry, face-to-face you would pay the fee.

One of the other fees that will be somewhat modified will be the meal plan fee. So right now and based on how the schedule is, the student who is taking less than the 9 credits will not be paying that fee, but it has to be 9 face-to-face credits on either the Grant

Board of Trustees, 04/15/2021 Campus or the Ammerman Campus.

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So as Lou indicated, not only are we freezing tuition for the students but we're also looking at some of the fees that the students normally would pay and really eliminating those fees for Fiscal 21 primarily because we also have an option through the HEERF funding to look at those fees and relieve the burden on those students as well.

PRESIDENT PETRIZZO: And also the distance education fee. That was a fee that was charged each time a student took a distanced education class. There was a fee that was to compensate us for the management system that's necessary for the DE experience.

We've changed that fee now so that there is one fee for DE no matter how many classes you take. It's not one per class. It's just a charge to help us manage the software expectation of DE.

So that's another reduction that

2	is before you today as well. So I just
3	wanted to highlight some of those things
4	because we don't get to talk about them
5	a lot but these are further efforts to
6	control the expenses students have to
7	face in coming to this college in the
8	coming year.
9	CHAIR MURRAY: Any other
10	questions or comments?

13	to say again congratulations and thank
14	you to Mark and Lou and the staff,
15	really wonderful job managing it this
16	year.
17	You think back a year ago today
18	or a year ago March when the pandemic
19	was first starting, and then if you said
20	that a year from now we would be in this
21	type of financial situation, I would be
22	like yeah, right.
23	You know, we all kind of were
24	very concerned as to for the college

and what that financially would mean for

3	to think that a year later seems like
4	the pandemic is getting under control
5	with the vaccinations, we're looking to
6	start more face-to-face in September.
7	We really seem to have turned a
8	corner and financially are in a
9	wonderful position to really take
10	advantage of it and really grow and
11	pursue the college's mission.
12	So all good news, all good work,
13	and I just want to echo the rest of the
14	trustees my thanks to the
15	administration, to Lou, Mark, and
16	everyone at the college.

2 MEMBER PAGDANGANAN:

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Mr. Chairman. The Student Success Subcommittee met on April 14th and as previously shared with the board many college offices contribute towards the priority of Student Success.

This month Dr. Paul Beaudin welcomed our guest speakers who were Associate Vice President John Lombardo and Specialist Laura Galletta from the Office of the Workforce Development. had an excellent meeting yesterday.

The Advanced Manufacturing Training Center offers many training opportunities to develop and upgrade skills necessary to gain a career in the manufacturing field. The center offers several programs such as the CNC machine operator, welding, IPC certification, industrial automation, Mastercam, and soldering, and the electronic assembly among others. Programs offer national and international certification upon successful completion.

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Another one is that we get input from the Industry Advisory Board which helps us to sustain the college's program relevance. Through this industry support and engagement we have become a dependable reliable source for skills gap training as well as for local companies to hire from. The program has also received numerous grant awards and had been recognized with regional and national awards through the years.

A current focus is outreach to our high schools. As an example, the robotics clubs are groups that often possess the skill, ability, and interest to do well in the manufacturing environment.

Regional employers are also eager to work with us and recruit from our program since there are not many colleges that offer anything similar.

Several new programs have shown a real great promise. First, we have a new program to support those with autism

Board of Trustees, 04/15/2021 which focuses not only on training but on career readiness.

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The second is our industrial manufacturing tech program provides insight into many different industries and is ideal for those who are not quite sure which area they want to pursue.

The third one is the boot camp outreach to our post high school students who are between 17 to 29 years old and has been very successful. were able to provide an introduction to manufacturing that included 200 hours of work-related experience.

We would like to find funding to continue this outreach towards our high-school-aged students. There are growth opportunities for this program and the challenges for the program are centered right now on funding for machinery and expansion of space.

And I would like to thank Dr. Beaudin and Laura Galletta for all the great work that they've been doing

Board of Trustees, 04/15/2021 and Dr. Paul Beaudin, Vice President of Academic and Student Success, for attending this meeting to discuss ways the college is utilizing our opportunities at vaccination sites to highlight the college's programs and further spread information to the community.

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Vice President Araneo discussed the new SUNY Suffolk programs discipline videos that were created for the college's website and YouTube channel. Through the Office of Institutional Advancement and with the assistance of the admissions and enrollment management departments, the project was developed to promote the college's programs virtually with the goal of recruitment and potentially increasing enrollment and retention.

The videos also allowed the students and their parents to have a video resource of programs offered at the college. These videos are currently

being used throughout the college and
during the online admission events and
are displayed at the vaccination sites
in all three campuses.

The Suffolk County government
Stop Asian Hate rally also took place on
Saturday, March 27, 2021. The well
attended rally of over 500 people was
hosted by County Executive Steve
Bellone, the Office of Minority Affairs,
and the Suffolk County Asian American
Advisory Board with the purpose to offer
our support to the Asian community and
bring awareness to the recent spikes of
hate crimes against our Asian Americans
nationwide.

Me and Trustee Pagdanganan, who is an active member of the Asian American Advisory Board, along with many local, state and federal government officials and organizations attended the rally.

County Executive Bellone's message relayed that hatred and

Board of Trustees, 04/15/2021 intolerance will not be accepted in Suffolk County. Although Suffolk County has not had much reported activity on any hate crimes against Asian Americans, the Suffolk County Police Department will stay vigilant into incidents not reported because of fear.

The following week Senator

Schumer hosted a press conference with a similar anti-hate message. The Advocacy Committee posted an article on the Board of Trustees social media to demonstrate their support and position on these issues plaguing the Asian community.

Drew Biondo, Director of
Communications, concurred stating that
the college's president, Lou Petrizzo,
also issued a brief to the college
community citing the college's support
and anti-hate message.

Students of the radio and TV production have also been vocal with their anti-hate public service announcements and support of all groups

1 Board of Trustees, 04/15/2021 2 to include the Asian community. 3 On April 1, 2021, over 1,000 4 people attended the All in for SUNY and 5 CUNY virtual rally. The Advocacy Committee was one of the attendees. 6 The 7 primary goal being advocacy and 8 investment of SUNY and CUNY institutions 9 by finalizing a budget in support of 10 SUNY and CUNY as well as outreach to 11 leaders for more funding. 12 The County has said in its call letter that college should not ask for 13 14 more than 1.5 percent increase over the 15 County's current contribution. 16 Advocacy Committee will be seeking an 17 additional 1.5 percent from County 18 Executive or County Legislature which 19 amounts to approximately \$675,000. 20 Suffolk County has received 21 hundreds of millions of dollars in 22 federal aid. They gave the college no 23 increase last year even though they 24 indicated they would when they

encouraged the college to adopt the

Board of Trustees, 04/15/2021 County's AME contract provisions for our employees.

In the meantime the college has provided numerous services to Suffolk County most importantly making our campuses and staff's availability as County and State vaccination centers for thousands of Suffolk County residents.

The college's staff have taken cuts in pay and longevity payments and hopefully this has generated enough good to receive the additional funding this year. This funding will go to our students who will see no increase in tuition and cuts in fees.

The Advocacy Committee also discussed potential virtual advocacy opportunities and having an advocacy platform to set forth bullet points which will become conversational topics with our County and State leaders.

I shared an email communication and sample letters created by New York State Affirm which allows members and

Board of Trustees, 04/15/2021 committee organizations to use for the purpose of advocating for funding. It was discussed that a similar letter created by the college can potentially help organize organizations within the college to advocate as well as encourage student engagement and advocacy. type of virtual advocacy can be very accommodating for students who are unable to attend in person.

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The Committee reviewed the draft document of the goals and priorities of the Advocacy Committee and agreed that what had been captured aligns with the mission and vision of the college, the operational plan and institutional The committee agrees that this goals. document will be a live document and will set forth short-term goals as well as long-term goals.

Vice Chair Morgo suggested that the Committee's goals and priorities document be shared with other Board of Trustee members. Having other trustees

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Yes, Mr. Chairman, the big news of the week was Governor Cuomo's visit to the Grant Campus on Monday. I want to thank Chair Murray, Trustees Coverdale, Canary, Pagdanganan, Zarate, and Student Trustee Gambina for coming out and supporting the event. We always love to see trustees coming out and supporting college events. It makes us feel good and hopefully makes you aware of all of the work that we put in to make these events happen.

Once again the college put on a flawless event, showed all of New York State the wonderful facilities we have, the wonderful people, and the community spirit of the entire college.

A big thank you to AVP Rivera and

Board of Trustees, 04/15/2021 our Athletic Director and Special Events Chief Neftali Collazo and their teams for organizing this event and doing it on less than 24 hours notice.

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The governor doesn't give you a lot of heads-up when he's coming and you don't have a lot of choice about what time the event is going to start or how it's going to run. So you just have to get it done and those folks got it done for us and a big thank you for them.

We want to let you know that the college will be or is in the process of distributing \$6.3 million in student grants under the federal funding approved in December of 2020, so-called CARES Act II money.

The money will be going to Pell Grant students based on the formula developed by SUNY systems based on their estimated family contributions on the student's FAFSA forms, and that money hopefully will provide our students with some relief from the pandemic and

Board of Trustees, 04/15/2021 hopefully be of some assistance to them as we go through registration process for summer and fall as well.

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April is student elections month, as Trustee Gambina mentioned, and we do have a new student trustee. The elected student trustee is Zachary Frost.

Mr. Frost is a nursing student. He has taken classes both at the Grant Campus and Ammerman Campus. He's a dean's list student and will be sworn in at the August meeting.

And as Trustee Gambina indicated, she will continue serving her term through May and June with us and we're thankful that you're willing to do that so thank you very much.

Summer and spring registrations have been proceeding. Summer of '21 much like summer of '20 appears to be going very well. We're very enthused by what we're seeing. It's too early to make projections but we're certainly encouraged by the results so far.

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On a separate note, fall registrations are showing students favoring remote classes over in-person classes. This is an interesting development for us. We were very curious how that would shake out with the return to fall, but so far students are giving us an indication that maybe remote learning wasn't so terrible after all, although there is still a substantial number of students wanting to come back for in-person classes and we expect probably this mix to change as we go through the year and as new students start coming through the admissions process.

Obviously right now registration is for continuing students, but again, the volume of registrants is encouraging so we are very encouraged by what we see.

Our IT folks will be retrofitting three classrooms, one on each campus, with a hybrid technology which we're

Board of Trustees, 04/15/2021 going to give a trial to in the fall semester. This technology will allow us to conduct classes remotely and in person at the same time. One faculty member will be able to lecture the students in the classroom and the students on a remote connection.

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This is a trial of the technology which will allow us to solve a number of issues, social distancing, and the issue of faculty members teaching less than full-sized classes and the cost associated with that. So we're hopeful that this may produce some benefits that we can expand on going forward.

As you know, we had started a vaccination program for students and unfortunately due to the CDC's recent quidance on the Johnson & Johnson vaccine, the college has had to pause the student vaccination program pending further direction from SUNY and from the CDC. We're hopeful that we can get that program back up and running and get our

Board of Trustees, 04/15/2021 students in for vaccinations sooner rather than later.

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Also last evening we sent around a program that we have been working on for some time, a thank you to our essential workers and our in person classroom faculty, our custodial workers, all of those folks who were here during the dark days and who continue to be here day in and day out making the campus a safe and healthy place for the rest of us.

We have been wanting to get some kind of a message out acknowledging all that they have done and of course with the pandemic and social distancing issues we haven't been able to have that one event where we can bring them all together.

So the institutional advancement folks have done a wonderful job constructing a thank you. It's a little detailed and there's a lot of photos and a lot of flipping through but we tried

2	to get as many folks on there as we can,
3	Public Safety folks and in person
4	classroom faculty, custodians, all the
5	folks who were here in the dark days and

- 1 Board of Trustees, 04/15/2021 2 this in the news particularly with 3 Rutgers University and a couple of 4 others, this issue of them mandating 5 vaccinations. 6 They are mandating vaccinations 7 but obviously only for students that are 8 coming on campus. So students that are 9 opting for the remote learning distance 10 education, they do not have to be 11 vaccinated. 12 So it's an issue that SUNY will 13 revisit after the emergency use is 14 lifted. They're split. It seems to be 15 the presidents are split on whether or 16 not to require it. The institutions 17 that have dormitories obviously feel 18 very differently than some of the other 19 institutions so you may see a split 20 along those lines. 21 TRUSTEE CANARY: Thanks. 22 CHAIR MURRAY: Gemma, did you

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So regarding the online and how students seem to be enrolling in or they have a preference for online courses for the fall, I would imagine like most community colleges the students would find that -- especially students who work, which I believe most community college students do have part-time jobs, and that allows them greater flexibility to schedule their work.

And regarding that pilot to have both an in-person teacher and an online for students, I think that is a wonderful pilot idea. I've seen it where you can then offer a class for multiple campuses.

You know, sometimes students have to commute from two campuses. Now they may not have to do that so I would imagine that would be a great advantage for students.

And also students who have transportation issues. You know, not

Board of Trustees, 04/15/2021 every student has a car. I know a lot of community college students come by public transportation which is not easy these days as you are crammed on the bus. Some of the bus -- the transportation routes might have even been affected by COVID.

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So I think that's a great pilot program to do and hopefully it will be a success.

PRESIDENT PETRIZZO: Well, we have great hopes for it. It's not as easy for the instructor I believe to handle both in person and students in the remote modality. It requires a lot more flexibility on the part of the instructor but the hyperflex camera kind of follows the instructor around so they don't have to so much worry about the cameras, but we do have to be able to pay attention to students in front of them and students that are in the remote modality and that makes it a little more challenging. So we'll see how it works

I was 5 wondering how the faculty in general --6 your thoughts on how they have been 7 adapting to teaching online. 8 I know Suffolk had an advantage 9 over other local colleges in terms that 10 we've already been offering a lot of 11 online classes but how has that been 12 going? 13 PRESIDENT PETRIZZO: Well, I'm 14 going to let Dr. Beaudin talk about that 15 because not only did we have that 16 advantage, but we had the Center For 17 Innovative Pedagogy and that has turned 18 out to be a huge advantage. 19 Dr. Beaudin? 20 DR. BEAUDIN: Thank you, 21 President Petrizzo. We have been very 22 fortunate to have unbelievable people 23 working in our Center For Innovative 24 Pedagogy and they have provided

thousands of seats to faculty over the

And when I say thousands of seats, many faculty went back for multiple trainings. So we have been very lucky to have amazing faculty who took advantage of online training. So I think our faculty did very well and our student success was certainly good for many students.

And again as Mr. Petrizzo indicated earlier, some students just are not doing -- the online modality is not necessarily for them but our numbers in registration seem to indicate for a lot of students they still want to pursue online learning.

And I think, Trustee deLeon, what you said about the flexibility is probably a big part of it. So we'll continue to offer face-to-face and we'll continue to increase face-to-face if there is demand throughout the summer, of course, but I think a lot of students

12	Thank you.

18	come to mind concerning the future if
19	we're going to be expanding the online
20	capabilities.
21	On the other end of that wire is
22	the broadband service that comes into a
23	person's home, and do we have a feel for
24	how many of our students have been
25	frustrated with not having a good

Do we have any kind of feel for how that is impacting the students on the online experience?

PRESIDENT PETRIZZO: I wouldn't say we had a poll, but we did offer hot spots to students. We did offer laptops to students. We did put WiFi in our parking lots and tell them they could come into the parking lot and park in the spots of the school, and they believe it or not were doing that, to make that available to students.

I can't say that we've had a lot of complaints about that and I'm not sure that we just haven't heard them or if some of the -- most of the efforts that we have been undertaking have addressed those issues, but we have a great IT staff, we have great student tech representatives who are on hotlines.

We have about ten people working

2	the hotlines a day and fielding these
3	calls that come in and any time students
4	have problems with their WiFi or with
5	their equipment they can very easily
6	reach somebody here at the college who
7	can help them and walk them through any
8	problems they do have.
9	We did beef up that department so
10	we do have some extra people in there
11	now working on the help desk and so far
12	they have been showing results.
13	TRUSTEE CANARY: Great. Great.
14	CHAIR MURRAY: Any other
15	questions, comments?

19	them coherently. They were really
20	during Priscilla's Advocacy Committee
21	and during Mark Harris's presentation of
22	the budget these thoughts came to mind.
23	To provide a little historical
24	perspective, I remember one of my first
25	meetings as a trustee discussing the

Board of Trustees, 04/15/2021 budget, Theresa Sanders said we can't or we shouldn't balance our operating budget on the backs of the students. And that stayed with me for a very long time, but every year, just about every year there was a percentage increase in tuition, we had to.

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And the reason we had to was manifested by the pie chart that Mark showed that showed that although it's statutorily required that the County provide 33 percent of our operating budget and the State provide 33 percent of our operating budget and student tuition 33 percent, if you look at that pie chart, it's not the way and that hasn't happened. So the students have made up for the extra.

Well, the last resolution today, and we didn't talk about it very much, but for the second year in a row we're freezing tuition. I think in the last 20 years we froze tuition 1 other time and we're also decreasing fees and that Board of Trustees, 04/15/2021 really is remarkable, but that rule of each providing 33 percent was more honored in the groups than it was in the observance. It was not done.

But this year in addition, and I don't want to diminish this because this was really remarkable, the cost savings measures that the administration was able to put in that was really key. For anyone who criticized us and our budgeting who said we were spending like drunken sailors, well, that certainly wasn't the case. We certainly have been belt tightening, but also Mark featured the federal commitment through both the CARES Act and the Rescue Act.

I don't remember our ever talking about the federal commitment previously and on a national level. Everybody talks about the importance of community college. For goodness sakes the First Lady is a community college teacher.

So the way that -- and it's massive and I don't want to talk about

1 Board of Trustees, 04/15/2021 2 printing money, you know, with no 3 regard, but the fact that it was the 4 federal government that also came 5 through. 6 You know, I don't want to 7 diminish the State or the County. 8 fact, I'm pretty confident that the 9 County is going to come through with the 3 percent this year, and you do realize 10 11 of course if it doesn't, then everything 12 else is thrown off, but I did want to 13 point out that the federal government 14 did help us this time and I think that's 15 something that we should recognize. 16 And everybody said it already, 17 but our freezing tuition is really a 18 sign of our commitment to the futures of 19 our students and hopefully it will 20 attract new students to help our enrollment. 21 22 Thanks, Mr. Chairman. 23 CHAIR MURRAY: Thanks, Jim. 24 Anyone else have anything for
