CHAIR MURRAY: I know that Jim is
not going to be joining us today and I don't believe Theresa is either so I think we have everybody although I'm waiting for Kevin, but we'll get started and he can join us.

Gordon, you want to start us off with the pledge?

CHAIR MURRAY: At this point I would like to request a motion to adjourn the Board of Trustees meeting and call the Board of Directors meeting to order.

Gordon, would you like to make that motion?

TRUSTEE CANARY: Trustee Canary making the motion.

CHAIR MURRAY: Shirley, second

CHAIR MURRAY: So we're now back in the Board of Trustees meeting and the first order of business is to approve the minutes of the May 13, 2021, Board of Trustees meeting. We need a motion.

Kevin, you want to make that motion?

TRUSTEE O'CONNOR: Trustee O'Connor making the motion.

CHAIR MURRAY: Kaitlyn, you want to second that motion?

TRUSTEE GAMBINA: I second the

CHAIR MURRAY: All those in favor please say aye.

COLLECTIVE RESPONSE: Aye.
CHAIR MURRAY: The minutes are approved.

At this time $I$ would like to introduce the Vice President for Business and Financial Affairs, Mark Harris, to present the college budget and college financial records.

VICE PRESIDENT HARRIS: Good morning, Mr. Chair and members of the Board of Trustees.

We presented the financials for the month ending May which would represent the transactions from September through May 31st of this year and the numbers that we included in the financial statement are our best projections based on what we're seeing and based on some of the data that we have. Keep in mind that we still have three months for the fiscal year ending

Just a high-level summary of the financials itself. When we look at the income portion of the statement, our tuition and fees is down approximately $\$ 5.2$ million. As we indicated last month, the State did ask us to readjust the budget for this year which accounted for about a $\$ 2.6$ million reduction.

However, because of its nature and its lost revenue, we were able to recoup that lost revenue as part of the HEERF. Additionally and as we do the determination of what those eligible expenses and reimbursements are through HEERF, we will be able to recoup approximately $\$ 9$ million in net loss revenue.

Based on that and given the fact that our summary is doing much better than what we budgeted of about $\$ 1.2$ million, our projected revenue for Fiscal 21 will be above by about $\$ 2.2$ million.

the hotlines a day and fielding these calls that come in and any time students have problems with their WiFi or with their equipment they can very easily reach somebody here at the college who can help them and walk them through any problems they do have.

We did beef up that department so we do have some extra people in there now working on the help desk and so far they have been showing results.

TRUSTEE CANARY: Great. Great.
CHAIR MURRAY: Any other
questions, comments?
VICE CHAIR COVERDALE: Yes.
CHAIR MURRAY: Shirley.
VICE CHAIR COVERDALE: For Lou, just FYI if you didn't know that the broadband signal, Internet access, is a particular problem for residents on the East End so I'm sure it impacts some of our students.

You know, there's really a
problem in Riverhead, Wading River,

When we have our board meeting in August, we will be in a much better position to give you a little more definitive once we have certain other factors ironed out.

So please keep in mind that this number that we presented in financials will change based on obligations and also we need to do a deeper dive into what our doubtful accounts are and see whether or not we need to make certain accruals or reserves for those, but also as we successfully differentiate different operational costs through HEERF and draw down funds our revenue -from revenue loss calculation, our fund balance may increase or may slightly decrease.

So, again, when we meet next time in August we'll be in a much better position to tell you where we think that number is going to be.

And before $I$ get into the resolutions, one other piece I would

Board of Trustees, 06/17/2021 like to provide an update is really the cash flow now mainly from the county. So when we spoke last board meeting we indicated based on the cash flow schedule they would be giving us about a million dollars a week.

Based on their fund balance or their projected fund balance, they have improved that number, increased that number from 1 million to 5 million dollars a week which would mean that they would pay us 1 month earlier. So instead of making their last payment the middle of August, we expect to get the last payment or the balloon payment from them around July 16 th and that puts us in a much better position than where we were last year because they have been paying earlier and they have been paying much more.

Before I get into resolutions, are there any questions based on just the financial data that $I$ just presented?

CHAIR MURRAY: Mark, I do
appreciate the good position that the college is in at this point. We kind of weathered the storm very well through your leadership and Lou's and everybody else in the administration and right now we're in a very healthy fiscal position.

We obviously are going to have more expenses and we're going to have to rely on a healthy position as we open up more in the fall, but you guys have done a tremendous job.

VICE PRESIDENT HARRIS: Thank you.

CHAIR MURRAY: Any questions on the financials?
(No response.)
VICE PRESIDENT HARRIS: Two resolutions that we are presenting. Resolution Item Number 1 for the monthly service payments for Suffolk County for employee health insurance in the amount of $2,803,759.86$.

If we strip out the Medicare that

VICE CHAIR MORGO: Chris?

VICE CHAIR MORGO: I have -during this meeting two things occurred to me, two related thoughts, and they are important. I hope I can express them coherently. They were really during Priscilla's Advocacy Committee and during Mark Harris's presentation of the budget these thoughts came to mind.

> To provide a little historical perspective, I remember one of my first meetings as a trustee discussing the

That's all I have, Mr. Chair.
CHAIR MURRAY: Thank you, Mark.
Before we go vote on the resolutions, we're going to take the Personnel
Committee report out of order because one of the resolutions to be voted on Item 6, Resolution 2021.40, involves the presidential evaluation process which the Personnel Committee has been working hard on.

I'm going to turn it over to Gemma and if Gemma can give a little bit of a background and report with regard to this resolution.

TRUSTEE DELEON-LOPRESTI: Thank you, Chair Murray. Can you hear me?

CHAIR MURRAY: Yes.
TRUSTEE DELEON-LOPRESTI: I'm

trouble this morning. I actually can't see anyone. I can't switch to that screen to make it large so I'm just going to read a report but I cannot see anyone so bear with me.

CHAIR MURRAY: We can see and hear you.

TRUSTEE DELEON-LOPRESTI: Okay.
Great. Before I read the report I just want to give a background on some of the work that the committee did behind the scenes.

So the committee consisted of Chair Murray, Trustee Shirley Coverdale, myself, and Trustee Kaitlyn Gambina. We really took a holistic approach at looking at the current performance evaluation system and wanted to insure that it met the needs of the trustees and evaluating its only employee, which is the college president, and it was very timely because we have a new president with us and so we also wanted

to make the process very clear to the new president and to insure that he was also part of the process and that he understood it.

So we took a look at several
places for guidance. We looked at what ACCT recommends in terms of policies and procedures. We looked at other community colleges which posted their policies and procedures on their website. We looked at SUNY guidelines but we really kept the basic structure of the current system that we have in place and really just put in some tweaks after really discussing amongst ourselves and other trustees what we thought would be beneficial to change and to modify.

One of the things that we did want to include that was not as stressed as we would have liked was that there be more objective measures of performance, and $I$ am going to ask either Angelica or Ashley to explain a little bit more

about some of the other tools that we can use to measure the college's performance as it relates to the college leaders' performance and what some of those metrics are.

We also wanted to make sure that we captured a true sort of 360 look at how the president is viewed in terms of the outside world and the internal world of the college.

So as you may know, there is a survey that's conducted once a year and in that survey includes the opportunity for members of the community, members of the business industry, community organizations, labor, and students themselves to give input and that survey is conducted by an outside agency.

So we wanted to make sure that that survey, the folks that were being surveyed, captured a wide range and that those people were relevant. So that's included in some of the changes and the updates.

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So I'm going to ask that either Ashley or Angelica give us a little bit more of a feeling as to some of the things we changed in terms of the evaluation process and then I'll read the minutes of the last meeting.

Does that work for you trustees and Chair Murray?

CHAIR MURRAY: Yes.
TRUSTEE DELEON-LOPRESTI: Okay.
Great. While you're speaking, I am going to try to come back to the screen so I can see you.

ASHLEY POPE: You have copies of the policy in your packet.

Some of the more objective measures that we included into the evaluation process incorporate data that the college is already collecting through ohigh (phonetic) and its various offices including progress against goals under the college's strategic plan and key measures and performance indicators and metrics of organizational

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Board of Trustees, 06/17/2021 effectiveness. And that would be progress and achieving institutional goals, measurable institutional objectives, et cetera.

And then, Trustee Lopresti, did you mention the change in student -stakeholder composition.

TRUSTEE DELEON-LOPRESTI: I
didn't go into it fully so please if you would like to elaborate, that would be great.

ASHLEY POPE: So under the existing policy it didn't really reflect the stakeholder feedback that was solicited as part of the process. So the committee looked at data that had been collected and feedback and updated the stakeholders to include robust internal stakeholders including cabinet and the existing stakeholders, external stakeholders such as the county Executive's Office, SUNY, and our legislators. That was updated.

And then the student feedback was

Gordon, did you have something you wanted to add?

TRUSTEE CANARY: Yes,
Mr. Chairman. I just wanted to ask Lou, the donation of the Stryker chairs from the North Babylon Fire Department, you know, that is my home fire district. I'm just intrigued, how did that come about? Did they just out of the blue select us or was there some type of an association with some faculty or administrators on that?

PRESIDENT PETRIZZO: I'm not quite sure.

Alicia, you're shaking your head.
MS. O'CONNOR: So that came
through Joe Fraccalvieri. He's our
plans operations director on the Grant Campus who is affiliated with that fire department and it was presented by the president of the fire department who

a great contribution that the fire district made. That's excellent.

PRESIDENT PETRIZZO: One for each campus too. That's awesome.

CHAIR MURRAY: Student Success,
Bell?
TRUSTEE PADANGANAN: Thank you,
Mr. Chair. The Student Success
Committee met on June 8th. Guest
speakers this month were Marlena Titus and Dylan Miller, two of the three

Board of Trustees, 06/17/2021 student commencement speakers representing the graduating class of 2021.

Marlena Titus, she attended the Eastern Campus studying communications. She started out as a peer mentor, then became involved in the Honors Club, the SAGA Club, the LGBTQ Task Force, and she also became enrolled in events through the Multicultural Affairs.

During her first semester she did not want to get involved in anything, but through encouragement from faculty and other students she really came out of her shell.

Her reason for choosing Suffolk was because she felt she wasn't ready to leave the Island yet. Suffolk had a program she was interested in and traveling into FIT was not something she wanted to do. She also had taken some classes in Suffolk through her high school.

> Marlena is transferring to

Board of Trustees, 06/17/2021 Hofstra in the fall and will major in mass media with a minor in rhetorical studies. She is concentrating on cultural media and seeing how the various types of media affect different cultures.

She's suggested -- when asked what her suggestions were, she suggested that Suffolk should emphasize the Writing Center, tutoring, and computers lab as resources.

On Dylan Miller, he really did not want to go to college. He planned on becoming a police officer and withdrew when his grades fell. Two months later his brother passed away from an overdose and Dylan emerged from this tragedy with a different life view. He started working out and getting healthy because it was something his brother always wanted him to do. He then started working at Stony Brook University as a patient transporter.

He decided to return to school

Board of Trustees, 06/17/2021 part-time at first retaking the classes he had failed. By the time he graduated, Dylan went from a 1.4 GPA to a 3.8 GPA. He was involved in the Phi Theta Kappa, Honor Society, The Talent Club, and Peer Services. Through his participation in groups and clubs Dylan gained confidence and became a positive influence for his peers. He suggested that Suffolk should continue to emphasize its clubs and scholarship opportunities as both PTK and Get There From Here scholarship ended up being very important to his success. Dylan is transferring to Stony Brook University to become a pediatric physician's assistant.

That's our report, Mr. Chair. CHAIR MURRAY: Thank you so much. It's always good to hear the success stories or the stories of our students and the difference we can make.

The Committee discussed the choices and agreed that they would like to renew the contract with Thomas Volz. DGC O'Connor will reach out to Tom and start the renewal project.

DGC O'Connor also advised the
Committee that a member of the Board of Ethics Committee for the trustees is currently a hold over. The Committee discussed the options and have asked Alicia to reach out to see if the member is interested in renewing their term.
If they do not wish to renew, they will consider other options to find

I'm there for you and I appreciate you having been there for us. TRUSTEE GAMBINA: Thank you. CHAIR MURRAY: Thanks again. The next thing I would like to address, you know, I think it was about two years ago we had a very difficult situation and we had a vacancy, the president of the college.

And we turned to Lou to fill that vacancy which we thought for a few months. We felt confident and comfortable and in a lot of ways put at ease with the situation because of Lou's experience and judgment and steadiness. And then we went through a search and the first search didn't quite work out. And then COVID hit and the unusualness, the difficulty created by

Board of Trustees, 06/17/2021 the pandemic, the challenges to the school, both for the students, for the faculty, for the trustees, the financial situation with the school, it was, you know, it was just a perfect storm of difficult and challenging times. And, you know, without -- I hate to say it, without Lou's presence we would have had a really tough situation but Lou was there. He stuck it out for us. He provided leadership, a steady hand, a calmness, never a panic or any sense that we couldn't get through this, and it was just a godsend. And I know the Chancellor feels the same way. He's spoken how highly he appreciates and respects Lou and Lou's contribution. And over the years we, the school, has weathered the storm very well thanks to his leadership. We're in a good spot financially and otherwise. We have some obviously challenges ahead of us.

We have a new president that

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we're all excited about, but he's being left not a situation where the house is burning down but a situation where the house is very strong and he has some opportunities to do some wonderful things for the college, and so I cannot express my thanks and appreciation to Lou for his service not only as the interim president but even prior to that the years of service he has given to the school.

I know I speak for the Board of Trustees, we went out and got a little token of our appreciation. Lou, why don't you come up? We have a little plaque for you and it says, Lou Petrizzo, in recognition of your dedicated service to Suffolk County Community College Board of Trustees 2021. This is for you, and I also got you a gift card, \$500, to go and have a really nice dinner. Enjoy. It's not quite as much as the last president got, but the situation is different.

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Again, I would just like to give you a wholehearted thanks and appreciation. I'm sure some of the other trustees want to say something and then you can give a little.
(Round of applause.)
PRESIDENT PETRIZZO: Sure. I'm usually on the other end of these presentations.

CHAIR MURRAY: I would open it up to other trustees if they want to say something. Why don't we do the video people? Would anybody like to make any comments?

TRUSTEE CANARY: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. As I look around the room, I think $I$ can say with a great deal of certainty that I have probably known Louis J. Petrizzo, Esq. the most of anybody in this room.

Our time together goes back to 1979 when Lou was first appointed to fill the seat of Lou Howard in the Suffolk County Legislature in 1979. I


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actually helped my wife and I go to our first closing to buy our first little house, if you remember that little deal. So we've had a lot of history, and then of course him coming over to Suffolk County Community College. There aren't enough adjectives to say the thanks and appreciation for the work as chief counsel and then especially for the work of stepping up to the plate as acting president in a very difficult and tumultuous time to say the least. I've always known Lou to be temperate, intelligent, hard working, always willing to lend a hand to all. And again as a trustee -- and then let me say this. I even forgive him for being so disingenuous to me when he talked me into becoming a member of the Board of Trustees, telling me it was only a couple of meetings a year. It was no big deal and it wasn't a big time commitment. So I forgive you.

PRESIDENT PETRIZZO: And you get

TRUSTEE CANARY: Oh, yes. Mileage reimbursement and we were going to get fed. So I forgive you for all of that.

His lovely wife Claudia and the family will have him hanging around more. I don't know if that's a good thing or bad thing, but we might have to talk about that later, but Lou, again, thank you. Thank you for leading, for steering this ship through the field of the icebergs.

Your work over the last couple of years has just been incredible. Thank you for stepping up. We will miss you and you have left this ship in really good shape for the new captain who is going to be coming on board and he's got a world of thanks also to give to you. Thank you.
(Round of applause.)
TRUSTEE GAMBINA: I just want to say thank you, Lou, and while $I$ haven't

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known you as long as Trustee Canary, we do appreciate all your work in the last couple of years I've known you.

VICE CHAIR COVERDALE: Lou, I don't think anyone can stand here and say the things that Gordon said so I'm not going to trespass on his memories, but I want to thank you because when I was appointed a trustee you were my guide.

As somebody said, someone's got to show you where the cow jibs are and you did that for me and unraveled all of the policies and so forth and, you know, also led me to believe that it was going to be easy sailing and it just seemed like the times were what they were and my baptism was certainly by fire I must say.

And I have to thank you for your tenacity and $I$ think the steering of the ship is an appropriate analogy because I think that we would really have to be honest in saying your steady hand at the

Board of Trustees, 06/17/2021 helm has brought us through an incredible tumult and not just COVID.

And the fact that the ship is righted and safe and in good shape is a credit to your capability and your conviction and commitment to this school and its students and it is deeply appreciated and especially your support for community efforts and I appreciate that personally.

So thank you so much. God bless you. I wish you Godspeed in everything that you do and hope that you will be available for that wise counsel from time to time.

PRESIDENT PETRIZZO: Any time you need an interim president.

TRUSTEE O'CONNOR: Trustee Murray, can I speak?

PRESIDENT PETRIZZO: I'm usually on the other end of these presentations so you have to give me a minute to catch up.

First of all, I want to thank the

Board of Trustees, 06/17/2021 Board of Trustees, Chair Murray for having the confidence to give me the keys to the family car. You probably had some trepidation about that at the time but I truly do believe it was a great privilege to be able to serve as this institution's interim president.

I know I said many times that the great work that is being accomplished at this college is really being done in the trenches by the faculty, both inside and outside the classroom, by administrators who direct the work, and by our great AME staff, the folks who answer the phones and greet the families when they come up on open house days, the fellows who are out there mowing the lawn and planting the flowers and keeping the building safe and clean.

And all of that is possible because of the cooperation of the faculty, association, and Donte and the Guild with Sean and AME and Dan. So all praise to them. They really are the

Board of Trustees, 06/17/2021 ones that are doing the work to take this ship and put it on the right course to use your phrase.

It's been an interesting two and a half years. I have to say it's really been an interesting two and a half years. I would have preferred other circumstances, but I think everybody would have preferred other circumstances but we had to play the hand that we were dealt.

Over the past two and a half years we replaced chaos with calm. We put the institution on firm financial footing. We've reformed the hiring and overtime process so that you will never go back to those bad old days again, and we restored a collegial working relationship not only among us, because at times we weren't getting along so great, but also with all of our elected officials. And we did it all while keeping the campuses, the employees, the students as safe as was humanly possible

Board of Trustees, 06/17/2021 in the middle of a global pandemic. So I don't know how you choose to measure success. For me personally when I have to evaluate it, an employee or administrator, $I$ kind of look at the area that they work in and $I$ say is it better now than when they got here. It's kind of simple but it really is very telling with respect to performance.

And by any measure, any measure, this team of professionals that you have here, all of them from the vice presidents right on down to the folks that are mowing the lawns and cleaning out the bathrooms, all of them have performed flawlessly and have a great deal to be proud of.

I'm happy and proud of our vice presidents and I include Angelica Rivera in there. She's not a vice president but she should be. That was one of the things that I didn't get around to doing but I should have. And we've got a very

Board of Trustees, 06/17/2021 diverse and skilled group. Our Vice Presidents are much more diverse than they were when I got here.

There is something that I've been kind of quietly proud of. We haven't made a big deal of it. I haven't. We haven't issued any press releases or anything of that sort, but we have strong women leaders on each of our three campuses and I don't know if we ever had that in our history --
(Round of applause.)
PRESIDENT PETRIZZO: -- and I just want to say that they are the leaders of those campuses not because they are women but because they are skilled, they are knowledgeable, and they are effective. And I want to thank Donna and Mary and Irene, who can't be with us today, for all of the great work that they have been doing. Thank you all.

So I'm not going to go on beyond that because I know I will leave

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somebody out and I know that that can cause hard feelings and I don't want to do that at this point. Things have been going pretty good here.

Let me just say this, that as I
leave the interim presidency $I$ can say that the state of the college is strong. It's very strong. It's healthy. It's stable and it's financially secure and best of all it's ready for our new president to take us into the future and we'll all be along on the ride. So thank you all.
(Round of applause.)
CHAIR MURRAY: So he's not quite done yet. The next item on the agenda is the President's Report.

PRESIDENT PETRIZZO: Hi. A couple of things, a couple of quick issues. Ben, maybe you can make your way up here and while you do I'll talk about some other issues, but I'm going to ask Ben to give you a report of what happened at the Suffolk County

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Legislature yesterday with respect to the college operating budget.

We reached an agreement with New York State to vacate the pod on the Brentwood Campus. The State has agreed to be out of there by July 14 th and we've signed off on that amendment yesterday, and once they vacate we will be doing some refurbishment to the field house due to all of the traffic that's been in and out of there.

We've also begun talking to and I think we have a tentative agreement with the County to vacate the pod at Selden so we can get control of the Lindsay Building back. That building will also need some minor refurbishment. The County is working on a demobilization to move out of there. They really haven't been using the pod very much in the past couple of weeks, I believe only for about four hours.

The governor made a large announcement on Tuesday. We're trying

Board of Trustees, $06 / 17 / 2021$ to shift through that with the Chancellor. Apparently there are still some issues with respect to what the governor said that apply to most of the private businesses in the state of New York, doesn't necessarily perhaps apply to some of the school districts and higher education and that is because of the CDC requirements which kind of supersede what the governor is doing. So we're working our way through that and we're waiting for some additional guidance to come from the Chancellor and from SUNY and we do expect to see that, if not this week, certainly by the beginning of next week. We're very happy to announce that we may reach an arrangement with the Suffolk County Department of Social Services. I want to thank Carol Wickliffe-Campbell for her work on that. DSS will be having a representative on each campus one day a week beginning with the fall semester to

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Board of Trustees, 06/17/2021 make the services of the DSS available to our students. Many of our students do qualify for assistance in various programs but they are not aware of it. They don't know how to apply and this is going to be putting a representative right on the campus, each campus, one day a week and hopefully this will be a great benefit to at least some of our students.

We also through Mark Harris and Ashley Pope are working to try to use some of the HEERF funds, paren CARES Act Funds, to try and wipe out some of the student debt for the students who were with us from the spring of ' 20 through the spring of ' 21 .

The new guidance that has come out from the Department of Education seems to give us an avenue to approach some of the student debt that was incurred during that time for students who were struggling either financially or otherwise.

Board of Trustees, 06/17/2021 So we're very interested in pursuing that and seeing if we can help our students and perhaps even make it a little easier for them to stay with us through the next fall semester.

We have made our reapplication to the American Bar Association to maintain our accreditation of the paralegal program. Accreditations there run for three years. It's a very detailed and involved process and I would like to thank everybody who worked on that report. It was a lengthy report and it's not exciting reading, but it needed to be done and it was well-done and we're very hopeful that program will be reaccredited for another three years. Since our last meeting there have been two meetings on offshore wind and that process is advancing. We are close to engaging a company to provide a train the trainer type of service where they will be training staff so that we can have a Global Wind Organization

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certification which is the basic health and safety certification that everybody working on global wind needs to have before they can go out on a boat and do any work on any of the facilities. So we'll be doing hopefully that very basic type training early in ' 22 .

Thanks to Trustee Pagdanganan we had a meeting with National Grid this week. National Grid is doing some work in the bed of Wicks Road. We had a little bit of concern about that because of our access points, one of our major access points to the Grant Campus is on Wicks Road, but thanks to the information provided by Trustee Pagdanganan we can see that that work will proceed without too much interference with the college so thank you, Trustee.

We were informed yesterday that the college has been designated once again by the Military Times as a best for vets college. So thank you to

Board of Trustees, 06/17/2021 Shannon O'Neill and her team at Vet Services. This is a certification that many vets look at before they decide to select where they want to continue or resume their education. It's a designation that is given to institutions for exemplary service to military connected students and that certainly fits the bill here at Suffolk in terms of what we do.

And finally $I$ want to congratulate Trustee Zarate. Where are you, Trustee Zarate? Congratulations on your new appointment to the Port Washington School District as director of English as a new language. We wish you the best in your new endeavors up there. Congratulations.

TRUSTEE ZARATE: Thank you. PRESIDENT PETRIZZO: That, Mr. Chair, is our report.

CHAIR MURRAY: Thank you. Did you want Ben to -- Lou, do you want Ben to --

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PRESIDENT PETRIZZO: Ben, I'm sorry. Ben is going to bring you up-to-date on what happened at the legislature.

CHAIR MURRAY: Thank you.
MR. ZWIRN: Good morning members, trustees, Chairman Murray, Ben Zwirn, Director of Government Affairs for the college.

Yesterday Vice President Mark Harris and myself attended the Working Group of the Education Committee that was examining the operating budget of the college. As you remember, we had asked for the 3 percent increase in the County's contribution. The County Executive recommended only half of that, 1.5 percent.

In my conversations with the County Executive, I told him that we're not making an end run but we were going to address the legislature to see if we can get their support for it, and he said $I$ understand and indicated also

Board of Trustees, 06/17/2021 that he would not fight the legislature if they felt that they can give us the extra money.

The day before the Budget and Finance Committee met and they did a review of the finances of the County, and the County will end this current year with a budget surplus, a fund balance surplus of $\$ 356$ million and projected next year for over $\$ 560$ million.

So we got zero last year in increase in the contribution because the pandemic hit. We didn't fight it. The college sucked it up. We took pay cuts, lag pay, deferred longevity payments. We did everything we could to make everything right.

And, again, we have to thank
Interim President Petrizzo who I
personally -- the day he's gone is going to be awful for me. I enjoy -- he has an open-door policy for everybody on the staff and you can walk in and talk to

Board of Trustees, 06/17/2021 him about anything and he gives great advice. Even though I'm almost 70 years old, he's still a good mentor to have. Something very unusual happened at the Working Group meeting. After we sat there for about 2 hours answering questions, they decided to take a vote of the 9 members on the Working Group Committee to amend the college budget resolution to increase it to a 3 percent contribution from the County.

Now it has to go before the general meeting of the legislature on Tuesday sometime after 6:30 but I've been with the County or with the college the last 20 years and I've never seen that.

The Working Group said they would not meet a 2 nd time, which they were about to schedule, and all 9 members of the group signed on as cosponsors of that resolution, which means that of the 9 remaining members of the legislature, we need 1 more vote to make that happen.

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And I'm very cautiously optimistic that that will be the case. They recognized a lot of the things that Lou mentioned today, how much the college really contributes to our community especially during the pandemic where our campuses were open, where hundreds of thousands of vaccines were given.

When the police department needed a place for promotions to be done during a pandemic, the college stepped in and did it.

Our IT department worked with the State, with the County to make sure the computers would work while everybody was getting their vaccines. Our student nurses volunteered.

This college, it's an investment that I think the legislators recognize and that investment paid big dividends during this last natural disaster.

Again, never in my lifetime even when $I$ worked for the County did $I$ ever

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see the kind of support for the college that we saw yesterday. So stay tuned. Tuesday we'll have the vote. They have a second public hearing. Generally it's pro forma. Very rarely does anybody from the public participate, but then they usually wait an hour. So sometime after 6:30, 7:30, 8:00 at night on Tuesday hopefully we'll have those numbers in the bank.

PRESIDENT PETRIZZO: Thank you very much, Ben, and thank you, Ben, for the great work you do at the legislature and putting out the fires. Every time we get a call from the County legislator or state assemblyman who is not happy with us, I call Ben and say Ben, come here. We got to talk. Take care of this.

We thought since there is no July meeting that we would give you a presentation on summer session and what has been and will continue to be in the works with respect to the drive for

Board of Trustees, 06/17/2021 enrollment for the fall.

So I'm going to ask Vice President Paul Beaudin and Vice President Mary Lou Araneo to make that presentation to you and at the end of that that will conclude our report.

DR. BEAUDIN: Thank you,
Mr. Petrizzo, Chair Murray, members of the Board of Trustees. I want to thank you for the opportunity to talk a little bit about enrollment for the summer and upcoming fall this morning.

As of this morning the summer semester, which is being almost completely offered online, is our strongest summer session in the past 9 years with over 5,000 unduplicated students generating about 1,700 FTEs, and again, we have 19 days left before the summer session 2 begins. So we anticipate that we will surpass and have the highest number of FTEs and students enrolled in 10 years in a summer session.

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I attribute this to the adjustment of the class schedule, the outstanding advertising created by Institutional Advancement, the work of our early college counselors, and the number of visiting students taking courses with us over the summer.

Also as of today our fall head count is 10,200 students generating about 7,400 FTEs. Year to date, some 77 days before fall ' 21 begins, we are trending at 85 percent on head count and 82 percent on FTE year to date.

50 percent of our classes for the fall are scheduled for on campus and 50 percent for online. At the beginning of the registration period we were seeing our continuing students opting for online classes at a 2 to 1 ratio.

Within the past few weeks though, we are seeing a shift with new students opting for both online and on-campus classes fairly equally, and this of course has driven the amount of

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on-campus seats to about 13,000 as of today.

In order to accommodate this shift, we opened an additional 5,000 on-campus seats 10 days ago. I know that you probably want to know how we are planning to diminish the gap between last fall and this fall's numbers. The answer is incredibly hard work being performed by campus and Central Student Affairs leaders, counselors, and personnel.

I would like to take a minute to give you some examples of that work. The campuses are providing advising appointments both online and face-to-face to meet student need. They have extended the hours to include an opportunity to new students to receive an appointment from 5:00 to 7:00 in the evening. Student mentors have been recruited and trained to help new students to build schedules once they have been advised.

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32 faculty volunteers are calling over 3,000 continuing students who have not yet reregistered. Outreach is being made regularly to not only the students from spring ' 21 but to those who were with us in spring '20 and fall ' 20 who did not return and we are welcoming them back to campus. Academic chairs are reaching out to students in their own department who have yet to reregister. I'm happy to say that we are being very strategic in our outreach and the numbers continue to improve a little bit each day.

I would be happy to answer any questions that you may have at this time before I turn the mic over to Mary Lou Araneo whose team has done such an incredible job in crafting our welcoming back campaign.

CHAIR MURRAY: I have one question. Is there any way or efforts to translate what has been a very strong summer session and students to the fall?

Board of Trustees, 06/17/2021 Any way to recruit the summer students that aren't going to fall?

DR. BEAUDIN: Absolutely. One thing you do need to keep in mind is that many of our summer students are visiting students from other colleges. Many of our summer students are also in the early college program and they are high school juniors and seniors taking courses here.

I think it's important to keep in mind too that both our Beacon and our high school early college programs do generate future students for the institution at about 28, 29, percent. We will certainly send something out to our summer students encouraging them and letting them know that we would welcome them back. By and large though about two-thirds of our summer students are students who are continuing with us. So they are expanding their opportunities to take courses, many of them part-time students, to take courses

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through the summer to help them to meet their career goals but thank you for that.

TRUSTEE CANARY: Dr. Beaudin, can you talk a little bit about the changes and improvements that are happening in some of the classrooms in order to enhance the online experience of the students?

DR. BEAUDIN: Yes. Thank you very much, Trustee Canary, and Vice President Azzam-Gomez has been so instrumental along with Steve Clark who is here today with us.

We have a number of classrooms which will be set up as high flex classrooms which will allow us to have students in the room and to have students remotely.

Whether or not those become functional for the fall, we know that they will be functional in the spring in greater number. So we're certainly very grateful to Vice President Azzam-Gomez

Board of Trustees, 06/17/2021 and to Steve Clark for their vision in helping us achieve that and those classrooms will be set up on all three campuses. Thank you.

CHAIR MURRAY: Any other
questions? Anybody on Zoom any questions?
(No response.)
CHAIR MURRAY: Thank you.
DR. BEAUDIN: Thank you, Chair Murray.

VICE PRESIDENT ARANEO: Thank you, Dr. Beaudin and Interim President Petrizzo, Chair Murray and members of the board.

Within Institutional Advancement we develop communications and marketing materials that support the college's enrollment management efforts.

Our creative efforts are led by Associate Dean Drew Fawcett who works closely with Academic and Student Affairs staff as well as Enrollment Management and Admission staff to create

Board of Trustees, 06/17/2021 and implement our messaging across a variety of platforms in order to reach our vary targeted audiences.

Our goal is to generate and drive inquiry from potential and returning students and parents of students and we have been successful in generating those responses.

We begin to market summer and fall starting early in the spring. This year our summer messaging emphasized our new 6 week and 8 week summer options that appeal to students who want to quickly secure college credits that advance them towards degree completion including high school students who would like a quick start as they begin their higher education experience.

For the fall our theme is centered on welcome back message that emphasizes the fact that the college has more on-campus classes available. Using a consistent visual approach our fall marketing is meant to appeal to a

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growing desire to return to normal
including a return to on-campus experiences.

In March we produced a modified college focus publication that helped us share more detailed information with Suffolk County households including news on five new or enhanced programs available to be enrolled in the fall.

Promotion of prior learning for returning adult students, scholarship information, summer semester options, and news regarding the trustees vote to freeze tuition for the second year in a row.

This magazine was also mailed to all regional high schools, libraries, and BOCES facilities in Suffolk County. It's available on our website as an online magazine and I've left a copy for you.

I would like to point out the cover of the publication is our primary fall marketing visual that we have

Board of Trustees, 06/17/2021 replicated for use in other visual platforms.

Externally our messaging platforms include digital, radio, TV, and print. Digitally we're running 24-7 through August. This includes ads on Facebook and Instagram as well as ads displayed on consumer websites that align with content that our target audiences are seeking.

In print we're currently running full-page ads in Newsday including today which I have left a copy of for you. I've marked it there with a blue sticker. The next ad is scheduled for this Sunday, June 20th. We're also running front page Newsday notes with the next one appearing in July.

Our radio campaign places spots across the Island's stations that target our diverse core audience. These spots are scheduled to run through August.

On cable television we're currently running across Altice and FIOS

Board of Trustees, 06/17/2021 networks as well as News 12 through August. This includes video billboards sponsoring News 12 and the News 12 traffic and weather.

We are currently promoting fall enrollment, summer session, and instant decision on our college website home page, and we are periodically issuing e-blasts to parents of high schoolers. The last one went out on June 15 th and the following one will go on July 6th. When a person clicks through one of our digital ads or e-blasts, they are most often brought to our enrollment landing page. This page has been designed to provide information about the college and also allows the potential student or parent to fill out a short form that enables the college to engage with them.

In other cases clicking through brings a person to a specific page or college web micro site that is most relevant to what we are promoting like

Board of Trustees, 06/17/2021 open house or late start.

All of these clicks represent a response to our marketing. As an example of our department's work to generate inquiry, we have tracked our digital engagement from January to May. In total we have had more than 17,000 people click through our ads seeking to learn more up to and including completing an application.

The outreach that Dr. Beaudin mentioned is also supported by Institutional Advancement. We work with our colleagues to create the postcard and messaging that is being utilized as part of this outreach campaign to students who have applied but not enrolled, who withdrew or who were previously enrolled but have not reregistered or graduated.

Internally we work to create a robust web presence and dynamic home page outreach and generate a series of postcards, text messages, and weekly

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e-blasts to reach these cohorts of students and their parents.

At this point we are starting to conclude summer marketing. The fall welcome back approach will continue through mid July when we will shift to promotion of our in-person arena registration and enrollment days which will take us through August.

Thank you. That concludes my report.

CHAIR MURRAY: Thank you.
Does anybody have any questions?
TRUSTEE CANARY: Just a comment.
Again, as this college often does, $I$ am sure we are setting the bar for other SUNY institutions on this incredible effort. Thank you, guys. Thank you to the team.

And this is what it takes today. This type of incredible effort to try to round up the students. It's kind of nutzo, but hey, you have to do what you have to do and we're doing it and thank

Board of Trustees, 06/17/2021 you again.

VICE PRESIDENT ARANEO: Thank you so much and I will share that with the team. They will be very appreciative I'm sure.

CHAIR MURRAY: Thank you.
VICE PRESIDENT ARANEO: Thank you.

CHAIR MURRAY: Thank you, Lou.
So the last thing on our agenda for roundtable is election of the board officers. Gemma graciously agreed to chair the nominating committee again and I believe she's going to give a report or show a report.

TRUSTEE DELEON-LOPRESTI: Yes. Give me a few seconds because I'm trying to figure out my screen again. Just a few seconds.

So Chair Murray and Board of Trustees, I have a report for you today. I have interviewed all of the trustees to see if there was interest in serving as an officer of the Board of Trustees

No other trustees expressed an

current officers and so that would be --
and I'm sorry, I don't have the document in front of me, $I$ can't see anything so I'm sort of winging it.

So the Chair would be Chris

And Item 3 is the resolution of approving the operating budget of the Association for the coming year. This $\$ 4.2$ million budget was prepared after meetings with the campus deans and Barbara Hurst, Association Director of

Board of Directors, 06/17/2021 Business Affairs, and then with Athletic Director Neftali Collazo, Barbara, and myself.

It is just slightly lower than this year's budget and is reflective of fewer expenses for the Peconic Cafe and because, as you will recall, the student activity fee has been reduced for the coming year in line with other fee reductions.
