| (9) | CHAIR MURRAY: As everybody on |
| (10) | the Board knows, and I assume many of |
| (11) | the people in the audience realized, |
| (12) | today is going to be the last board |
| (13) | meeting for two trustees. One is Zach, |
| (14) | whose term has expired, and he'll be |
| (15) | replaced, but, his shoes won't be |
| (16) | filled. And the other is Jim Morgo, who |
| (17) | has been a member for how many years? |
| (18) | TRUSTEE MORGO: Almost |
| (19) | twelve years. |
| (20) | CHAIR MURRAY: Twelve years, who |
| (21) | will be stepping off the Board. So, do |
| (22) | you want to join me? |
| (23) | PRESIDENT BONAHUE: Absolutely. |
| (24) | CHAIR MURRAY: First, I guess |
| (25) | we'll talk about Zach for a second. |

He has (4)been a dedicated member of the Board, (5) and has provided insight as to the (6) feelings and issues affecting the (7) students. He has been a very valuable (8) contributor to the Board, and we will (9)miss you. (10)STUDENT TRUSTEE FROST: Thank (11)you. (12)PRESIDENT BONAHUE: Trustee (13)Frost, thank you for your advocacy, for (14)your engagement, for accompanying me to (15)Capital Hill and advocating for the (16)college at our congressional delegation. (17)You have been a great trustee as we've (18)come out of Covid and speaking about the (19)students' experience. And Samantha, as (20)we look forward to her coming in, she (21)has big shoes to fill. Good luck at (22)Mount Sinai, you're going to be a great (23)nurse, and congratulations on your (24)graduation. (25)STUDENT TRUSTEE FROST: Thank

(1)BOARD OF TRUSTEES 6/15/2023 (2) you. (3) [Student Trustee Zachary Frost (4)receiving award.] (5) CHAIR MURRAY: We have a lot to say about Jim and his contributions to (6) (7) the college. He has been a friend of (8) mine, he has been an invaluable resource (9)at giving me the history of the college (10)and the history of the Board and some of the issues that have come before the (11)(12)Board. He has sometimes told me I was (13)completely wrong, but I've always (14)appreciated the fact that he said it to (15)me directly. And I can't tell you how much I relied on him, his advice when (16)(17)there were issues affecting the college, (18)he would be the first person I would call to talk about it. I think he has (19)(20)served the college extremely well, he (21)has fostered the sense of collegiality (22)on the Board, and the ability for people (23)to talk freely, but civilly. And even (24)if there were disputes or disagreements, (25)they were something that we talked

(4)Jim was a -- I can't tell you how (5) much I will miss him from the Board, and (6) how much of a resource he was for me. (7) So, Jim, thank you very much. (8) TRUSTEE CANARY: Yeah, I was torn (9)this morning, do I be complimentary or (10)do I roast him? Jim and I go back a long way, back into the late 80s, early (11)(12)90s, when I was working as the district (13)office manager for State Senator Owen (14)Johnson, and Jim was involved in one of (15)the first -- I think it was the first (16)subsidized housing projects in Suffolk (17)County. It was monumental, and it was (18)quite an undertaking and a task, and he (19)had reached out to our office to try to (20)get some additional funding. I think we (21)had to repave the road, we had to rebuild that road and Senator Johnson (22)(23)was able to get it done. So, Jim and I (24)go back a long way. (25)But for many of you who don't

BOARD OF TRUSTEES 6/15/2023 (1)(2) know Jim and his background, I just want (3) to take a couple of minutes, and please (4)indulge me in just a very quick resume (5) on this guy. Because it is impressive, (6) his dedication to public service. (7) Jim Morgo, currently President of (8) Morgo Private Public Strategies, a (9)private-sector consulting business that (10)specializes in municipal approvals and (11)community acceptance. Jim Morgo was (12)Suffolk County's Chief Deputy County (13)Executor from November 2007 to April (14)2009, he was second in command of the (15)ninth largest county in the United (16)States, with 900 square miles, a (17)population of 1.5 million people. Ιn (18)this capacity, Mr. Morgo had direct (19)oversight of all the County departments (20)consisting of more than twelve thousand (21)employees and a \$2.6 billion budget. (22)This was from a couple of years ago, so (23)increase all these numbers. (24)He came to Suffolk County as its (25)first Commissioner of Economic

Development and Workforce Housing in September of 2004. As Commissioner, he

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BOARD OF TRUSTEES 6/15/2023 (1)(2) Housing Partnership, it employed (3) eighteen, had six affiliate (4)organizations and had annual budgets (5) ranging between \$10 million and (6) \$30 million. (7) Mr. Morgo taught English for (8) three years to junior and senior high (9)school students at Cranwell Preparatory (10)in Lenox, Massachusetts -- and as we all (11)know, Jim has a special affinity for all (12)things Massachusetts, especially (13)Boston -- and for fourteen years at (14)Bayport-Blue Point High School in (15)Bayport, New York. He also taught (16)English as an adjunct instructor at (17)Nassau County Community College, Suffolk (18)County Community College and Dowling (19)College. And, thank you, Jim, for all (20)these years of you correcting my syntax (21)and grammar, I appreciate that. (22)In 1983, Mr. Morgo was elected to (23)represent the Eighth Legislative (24)District in the Suffolk County (25)Legislature. As a Legislator, he

BOARD OF TRUSTEES 6/15/2023 (1)(2) sponsored landmark legislation calling (3) for a public acquisition of the Long (4)Island Lighting Company, and he (5) established himself as a strong advocate (6) for middle-class homeownership. (7) Newsday named Jim Morgo as one of (8) the 10 Long Island Residential Real (9)Estate "Movers and Shakers." In 2005, (10)he was named by the Long Island Business News as one of Long Island's one hundred (11)(12)most influential leaders. In 2005, 2006 (13)and 2007, The Long Island Press named (14)Jim Morgo one of Long Island's fifty (15)most powerful leaders. He has received (16)many awards from civic, community and (17)business organizations for his (18)leadership in housing and business. (19)Mr. Morgo holds a Bachelor of Arts (20)degree from Boston College, a Master of (21)Arts degree from Columbia University and (22)a professional leadership certificate (23)from the John F. Kennedy School of (24)Government of Harvard University. (25)So I wanted to read this because,

And I look forward to (9)seeing those drafts soon, one English (10)geek to another, so I look forward to (11)going through those drafts soon enough. (12)Thank you, and thank you for your (13)service. You will be missed. (14)[Trustee Jim Morgo receiving (15)award.] (16)TRUSTEE MORGO: Thank you, all. (17)Gordon, you know how when people hear (18)something like that, they say, I'm truly (19)humbled -- I'm not usually humbled. (20)that was really, really good, thank you. (21)I had forgotten about some of those (22)things, and some of them were actually (23)true. (24)You know, I've told some people (25)as much as a year ago that I was going

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> this current board, of all the boards I've been with, is the most cohesive, collegial of any board. It's been terrific working with you guys. congratulation to you, you've been a wonderful trustee. be brutally honest, is; it's nice to when you're compensated. And so, I am going to be still working on, well,

(2) to step down at the end of June; I told (3) you, Chris, a year ago and told Gemma (4)that I was going to be stepping down. (5)And I had one legislator when I told him say, "Well, you can be extended, there's (6) (7) going to be a holdover," and I chose not (8) One of the reasons I finally (9)decided, after almost twelve years, was (10)that -- this sounds like a politically (11)correct thing to say, which I'm not very (12)good at, but, it is true; I believe (13)boards need new people and that we need (14)to have some different ways of thinking. 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And I don't want to go on too long, I want to hear from the athletes here. But it has been an incredible place. And one of the other reasons, to be unfiltered, that I said, I'm just really going to come to an end, because everyone here does an incredible job -but in the last year or so, I was really disturbed by the incivility shown by some members -- few, not many; minority -- but some members of the County Legislature toward our president, and toward, particularly a volunteer in Chris Murray who works very hard as Chairman. And obviously, like all of us, he's not paid. And when I watched the tape, I said, that is not

Nobody who contributes to (10)this institution, from the President to the administration, to the students (11)(12)especially, deserve anything but praise (13)for their incredibly hard work. And I (14)thank the Legislature, the County (15)Executor, and especially my colleagues (16)for giving me the chance to be part of (17)it. Thank you. (18)CHAIR MURRAY: At this point, I (19)would ask Carol if she would introduce (20) some of our guests. (21)MS. WICKLIFFE-CAMPBELL: Good (22)morning, we'd like to recognize Marie (23)Fargo from the presiding McCaffrey's office and all also Timothy Freeman from (24)(25)Legislator Bontempi's office. Thank you

And Mr. Chairman, I'll introduce (5) another guest speaker, because it's not often that we can host a national (6) (7) champion of the college, someone who has (8) done something better than literally (9)everyone else at the same level. (10)today I'm pleased to introduce four such (11)national champions from our college (12)track and field program, together with (13)their coaches. Students, when I call (14)your names, will you please stand to be (15)recognized. (16)Mr. Tariq Earl. Thank you, (17)Tariq was named NJCAA national (18)champion in the 110-meter high hurdles (19)and National All-American. Very good. (20)Malia Fowler, two time National (21)NJCAA national champion in both (22)100-meter hurdles and Heptathlon, the (23)seven-event series of events. She was (24)named the Women's Athlete of the Year, (25)congratulations.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES 6/15/2023 (1)(2) Morgan Keuler, NJCAA national (3) champion in the shot put and two-time (4)All American. (5) And Jaimee Starzee --COACH FRENCH: She couldn't be (6) (7) here today. (8) PRESIDENT BONAHUE: Could not (9)make it, but Jamimee is also national (10)champion in the javelin, and two-time All American. They are accompanied by (11)(12)head coach, Matt French, who is the (13)NJCAA National Head Coach of the Year. (14)He is accompanied by Weber Lord, NJCAA (15)National Assistant Head Coach of the (16)Year. And also Mr. Osad Mesavo, (17)assistant coach for track and field. (18)Students and coaches, (19)congratulations and thanks for letting (20)us recognize you. What an (21)accomplishment, you all have clearly (22)excelled in athletics. I just want to (23)give the Board an opportunity to say (24)hello, I want to ask you an open-ended (25)question, that there's no right or wrong

(5) has your involvement with athletics (6) given you that you're going to take with (7) you to the rest of your life; into the (8) classroom, into your academics. (9)what that involvement in athletics has (10)meant to you. (11)MS. FOWLER: Being an athlete, (12)you don't really know in the end what (13)the end result is going to be, you just (14)know you have to be successful, so it (15)gives you the skill in anything to just (16)drive and persevere no matter what. (17)in the end know that being successful is (18)enough, we can apply that in all ways. (19)PRESIDENT BONAHUE: Thank you. (20)Others? (21)MR. EARL: Being an athlete (22)taught me discipline. I used to wake up (23)every single morning, "Oh, man, I have (24)practice later." But, you know, in the (25)end it all worked out, so.

(7) whether we get it through academics or (8) athletics or some other area of student (9)involvement, it's what we aspire to as (10)we work with students to be sure the students accomplish their goals. (11)(12)guys have definitely accomplished goals. (13)So, congratulations to all of you. (14)Don't sit down yet, because let (15)me introduce one other person who has (16)made this possible, can I -- is Neftali (17)Neftali, do I understand here? (18)correctly that you've been named (19)Athletic Director of the Year as well? (20)MR. COLLAZO: No. (21)PRESIDENT BONAHUE: Well, you (22)should be. Because four times in the (23)past six years, the Suffolk Community (24)College Athletics Program has been (25)ranked as first, second or third among

And seven of (4)the athletic teams, Nef, under your (5) leadership have competed and qualified (6) for their national tournaments. So, (7) congratulations to you, Athletic (8) Director Neftali Collazo. (9)I understand you've just returned (10)from Florida where you were accepting this recognition on behalf of Suffolk; (11)(12)what else what you would you add? (13)MR. COLLAZO: Well, thank you. think we wouldn't be able to be in that (14)(15)position if it wasn't for these student (16)athletes. At the end of the day, (17)everything that we do, both in the (18)classroom or on the field, it's all (19)about them. So, you know, thank you for (20)allowing us to do what we do. (21)again, it's just a great accomplishment (22)for them, it has nothing to do with us, (23)as administrators, it's all about them, (24)so. (25)PRESIDENT BONAHUE: The students

(4)[WHEREUPON THE MOTION MADE AND (5) SECONDED WAS VOTED ON AND CARRIED.] (6) CHAIR MURRAY: Again, missing (7) some people, Mark Harris has officially (8) moved on, and we appreciate all of his (9)service. But at this time, I would like (10)to introduce the interim Vice President of Financial Affairs, Sarah Gordon, to (11)(12)present the college budget and college (13)financial records. MS. GORDON: Good morning, Chair (14)(15)Murray, members of the Board, thank you (16)very much. As you said, I'm here to (17)provide the financial report. (18)With regard to our requested (19)fiscal year '24 budget, on Monday we (20)received the BRO report, so we reviewed (21)that, an abductive review, there wasn't (22)anything outstanding and we feel that it (23)was an accurate representation of our (24)request, so we are looking forward to (25)next Wednesday, June 21st, when our

BOARD OF TRUSTEES 6/15/2023 (1)(2) budget will go before the County (3) Legislature. And then once approved, on (4)to SUNY. As far as the update for our (5) fiscal year '23, the financial statements that were submitted are (6) (7) reflective of nine months up to May 31st (8) of this year. The report is very (9)similar to last year, to last month's (10)report, overall variance in revenue is (11)about \$1.3 million above our budget, so (12)we have a positive revenue right now of (13)about \$1.3 million. And as far as our (14)cost variances, we're looking at about (15)\$1 million under our budgeted (16)expenditures, so we have about a million (17)dollars in savings there. (18)So with regard to our projected (19)fund balance usage, our budgeted (20)\$3.6 million that was approved, we're (21)hoping to be reduced to about (22)\$11.5 million as of the end of the year. (23)I don't know if there's any questions? (24)CHAIR MURRAY: What do you (25)account for with the costs savings?

BOARD OF TRUSTEES 6/15/2023 (1)(2) MS. GORDON: Most of the cost (3) savings is from turnover savings and (4)salaries, that's probably the biggest (5) area. (6) CHAIR MURRAY: And I guess on the (7) other side, the increase in revenue (8) overall was anticipated? (9)DR. HARRIS: Right, so our (10)largest increase in revenue really has been from our rental and interest (11)(12)income, so with the HEERF money that (13)we've had in the bank, we've been able (14)to take advantage of the rising interest (15)So we've had about a half a rates. (16)million dollars or more over budget in (17)interest income. And then with our (18)facilities usage, and the increase of (19)people coming in and starting again (20)using our facilities, we've seen a lot (21)of increase in those rentals, as well as (22)our noncredit ESL program, which has (23)come way over budget and provided, (24)again, additional revenue over budget (25)for that.

But if it's an officially (18)declared disaster from the federal (19)government, do we get reimbursed? (20)PRESIDENT BONAHUE: Based on my (21)limited knowledge -- and I'll ask Ala, (22)she can add any further light to it --(23)when there's a national designation of (24)an emergency, it tends to open up the

resources to flow to the municipalities,

So my assumption, (4)which is never safe, would be that, yes, (5) when there's a national emergency, those resources tend to follow on. BRODSKY: That's correct, but (10)this particular agreement is just for (11)the college to open up our facilities to (12)the County for use during emergencies. (13)So it doesn't really address that aspect (14)that the County will reimburse the (15)college for reasonable expenses incurred (16)in opening up our facilities and sort of (17)defines what is an emergency, whether (18)it's declared by the County Executive or (19)by the State or by the federal (20)government. So, that's the nature, and (21)it's been in effect for many, many (22)years. It's just a renewal. (23)TRUSTEE CANARY: So we're (24)expanding that to include cyber attacks? (25)PRESIDENT BONAHUE: Please?

MS. BRODSKY: No, the agreement was originally presented to the college for signature in December, and it was partially executed, but in the spring of this year, I was contacted by the County that following their cyber attack, it now requests that any vendor or entity which they enter into a contract with have an additional clause in the contract. Basically saying that if there is a cyber emergency, that partner or vendor will notify the County. that's the only change in the contract that was previously presented to us.

Item 4, Mr. Chairman, will confirm the Board's support for a naming agreement that you already know about, this is the \$250,000 donation from National Grid for the STEM building. The donation for the college happened so quickly that the Foundation did not go through its usual process of soliciting a gift and accepting the gift

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Everything is running a little bit late this year with the County, so I would ask the trustees, if they know legislators personally, you might want to give them a call and ask for their support on the college budget. We have really gone far and beyond what we have in the past to make all of the issues before the college well-known before the Legislature. But we have a tuition increase for first time in four years, and all I -- I think the BRO report, which has been forwarded to all of the trustees by Dr. Bonahue is very supportive. Sarah mentioned it, BRO is pretty much in line with everything and

there shouldn't be any -- they should be supportive of the college budget. The County executive has been supportive of it, so hopefully that will go through.

The capital budget is next, it ran late, it was submitted late, they did not put the infrastructure money that we need in the appropriate year, they put it in subsequent years, and we're going to need some of that infrastructure money that the State and the County have promised us to be moved up into 2024. But we have an opportunity before the capital budget is approved, there's an omnibus amendment resolution that's held before the vote, and if we can get five legislators to be supportive of us moving that money up, which I think we should be able to do. People forget that the automotive technology program, which will be fully appropriated hopefully next year, the County executive didn't even put it in the capital budget, in fact he excluded

Let me give you a -- as I promised, Trustees, I promised to give you a summary of where we ended in spring enrollment, and at your places, you have one page with several tables on it, which is a summary of our spring enrollment. This is, of course, this has now been uploaded to SUNY, we're waiting for SUNY's confirmation. you'll see from the handout, both our head count in the first table and the overall FTE, which is the head count, it's the calculation of if all those -it looks like the number of classes taken by all those students. But you can see that they're both up. On the credit side of the house, in the second table, you can see that we showed an increase all categories, in new students, continuing students and so

The biggest increase is in high school dual enrollment students, where I think Suffolk County's families continue to see a lot of value in the Beacon Program and this acceleration mechanism that saves families and students time and money. But as a reminder, those high school students pay only 25% of their tuition, though we do receive 100% of the reimbursement on the back end, but still, it should be noted that we can't simply swap a college student for a high school student, there would be some ramifications for that. But you can see that we are, in terms of FTE, we calculate for the spring as a whole, looking at all students, all terms, we will be up in terms of head count; about 5%, in terms of FTE; just under 5%, in terms of noncredit enrollment, continuing education, notice that number up over 40%. And again, as we come out of the pandemic, as we ramp up our certificate programs, our workforce and

BOARD OF TRUSTEES 6/15/2023 continuing education programs, we see that number beginning to grow significantly.

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I also want you to know the SUNY system is making a bug push to help community colleges by sending what they're calling "acceptance letters" to every family in the state with a graduating high school senior, reminding them that their local community college is an open-access institution, and that they are automatically accepted. you hear from any neighbors or families, "Oh, I got a letter about I'm accepted to Suffolk," it's because the State is sending these letters out. The letters have a QRC code that students can scan, and it sends their application information directly to SUNY, and then through a portal back to Suffolk. We've received thirty-six new applications through this process so far from families we had not yet heard from, so we appreciate the support from SUNY and

master's courses in the area of social work, but that they determined that there was just -- they couldn't find the right student interest, specifically in social work to go forward, and so they are vacating their space this summer. Coincidentally, I also spoke this week with John Nader at Farmingdale State College and he tells me that Farmingdale remains very interested in using the Eastern Campus as a base for possibly offering upper-division courses. they're looking at more general courses for a bachelor's in business and potentially what was new this week was he mentioned psychology. So this would be two very broad areas of baccalaureate interests that we know our students have, and so we're going to continue to explore a possible partnership with Farmingdale, and as a reminder LIU also continues to be in residence here at the

But, the number of recurring students, of returning students, is more than making up for it. So, right now like -- and I said this in my visit to the Legislature, the enrollment number changes day to day depending on the number of students who happen to walk in that day. So we should be careful about day to day comparisons. But as of this morning, our overall look for the fall was up 4%, but it is far too early to tell. That number of new students was down by twice that, the number of new students was down by between eight and ten percent. So we really have to careful about thinking about not getting ahead of ourselves.
