DOROTHY REED

Dorothy Margaret Reed is an Assistant Professor at Long Island University and Director of the Journalism Program at the C.W. Post Campus. She entered academia and returned to Long Island following a career in media spanning more than two decades.

Reed grew up on Long Island, in Amityville and Islip, as a member of a prominent family. Her grandfather, Albert Edward Reed, was the first black dentist to open a full time practice on the Island. Her grandmother, Dorothy Reed, established the first NAACP chapter, and her father, Dr. Eugene T. Reed, was well known for his work in civil rights.

She began her career in Richmond, Virginia working for the historic weekly, The Afro-American Newspaper. From there she went to television, working for WTVR-TV as a Reporter and Anchor with the highest ratings in the market. Reed was then hired by WKBW-TV in Buffalo, New York. A year later she was at CBS's flagship station in New York, Channel 2. She was then hired by ABC and relocated to San Francisco where she worked as a Reporter and Anchor at their station, KGO-TV. In the 1980s and early 1990s, Reed worked in radio as News Director and Announcer for one of the highest rated stations in the San Francisco Bay Area market, KBLX.

During her on-air career, Reed was the recipient of many honors including a First-Place, News Division, Mini-Documentary Award from the National Commission on Working Women and two Emmy nominations.

In addition to her career, Reed was active in her church as a Lector and Eucharistic Minister; she was a volunteer cook at Mother Theresa's AIDS Hospice in San Francisco; and she was a Hospice Volunteer for the San Francisco Visiting Nurses Service.

Reed is enrolled in the Ph.D. Program in English at SUNY Stony Brook. She is the recipient of the prestigious Turner Fellowship. She is currently writing her dissertation. She was awarded a M.A. in Writing from the University of San Francisco in 1996. She was Valedictorian. She did undergraduate work at Syracuse University and, later, Howard University, from which she graduated in 1973. She was awarded a B.A., summa cum laude, and ranked in the top ten of her class.

Reed has one child, Jimi Reed Harris, who graduated from the University of San Francisco Law School in May, 2003. She currently resides in Amityville.
